C. B. C. A.

The Conception Bay Clerical
Association held their Quarterly
Meeting at Bay Roberts this
week. All the Anglican clergy
of Conception Bay were present,
including those newly arrived in
the Bay—Rev. G. S. Templeton,
of Harbour Grace, Rev. M. K.
Gardner of Upper Island Cove,
and Rev. G. H. Seavay, to assist
in the Bay Roberts—Coley's
Point Parish. Rev. Canon Bolt
was also present from St. John's.

Evensong was said in St. Mat-
thew's Church on the 27th, Rev.
E. E. Rusted and Rev. W. A.
Butler officiating. Many parish-
ioners and friends were present.
All the members of the Associa-
tion were robed, and took part in
the service. The preacher was
the Rev. H. V. Whitehouse, of
Salmon Cove, who based a prac-
tical and very helpful sermon on
Isaiah 28:10: "Precept upon pre-
cept; line upon line." He point-
ed out that God's work reveals
a very gradual progress, as in
Nature so in grace. Faith in
God's working was needed in
the face of conflicts, perplexi-
ties, and changing moods of our
age. To the finite mind there is
the tendency to haste in matters
where the growth must not be
forced, but very gradual. God,
to our minds, is not in a hurry.
He need not be—He is eternal.

On the day following—the
Festival of St. Simon and Jude
—Holy Communion was cele-
brated at 8 a.m., the Celebrant
being the Rural Dean of Con-
ception Bay, Rev. E. C. Clench.

After breakfast together at
St. Matthew's Rectory, the first
meeting of this session of the C.
B.C.A. was held. The new
comers among the clergy were
introduced and enrolled.

Previously it had been agreed
to take up for study and consid-

eration the Epistle of S. Paul to
the Ephesians. An introductory
paper on the Epistle was read
by the Rev. E. M. Bishop, after
which consideration was given to
important matters there men-
tioned. At noon a devotional of-
fice was said, and intercessions
offered for the extension of
Christ's kingdom. The former
matters were considered again,
much valuable help accruing to
all present. The afternoon ses-
sion followed the same line, and
at 4.30 there closed what was
testified by all to have been a
helpful and stimulating meeting.
After a very hearty vote of
thanks to all who had so gener-
ously given hospitality, the Ses-
sion closed, and the members de-
parted to their respective
spheres of work. The next
meeting (D.V.) will be at Har-
bour Grace on St. Paul's Day.

**Canadian Elec-
tion Results**

As we go to press we learn
that the latest returns from the
Canadian General Elections,
which took place on Wednesday,
Oct. 28th, were as follows:—
Conservatives, 118; Liberals, 97;
Progressives, 20; Independent,
2; Labor, 2.

The Prime Minister, Mr. Mac-
kenzie King was defeated in
North York and his following re-
duced by 20. The Progressives
have been almost eliminated. So
far they have only twenty seats
where in the last election they
had sixty-five. The election has
turned out pretty much as was
expected. At the present writ-
ing it is difficult to say just what
the next move will be. A com-
bined opposition of Liberals,
Progressives, Independents and
Labor would number 121 and de-
feat the Conservatives by three.
The issue will be known in the
early part of the week.

House of Assembly Proceedings.

OFFICIAL SYNOPSIS

(Continued.)

April 21st. The House met at the usual hour.

PETITIONS.

HON. W. S. HIGGINS presented petitions from Outer Cove on the subject of a winch, from Biscayan Cove on the subject of a launchway. Mr. P. F. Moore supported the petition.

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL introduced a Bill to amend "The Industrial and Provident Societies Act of 1919," the purpose of which was to increase the holdings in such societies from \$200 to \$1,000. The Bill was read for a first time and ordered to be read a second time.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS.

HON. THE COLONIAL SECRETARY replying to a question of Mr. Hickman said: There is no Board of Health in the Colony, all matters relating to this subject being dealt with by the Department of Public Health, which is presided over by Dr. R. A. Brehm, Medical Health Officer. The inspection of food, milk, meats, etc., is undertaken by special Inspectors attached to that Department, whose salaries are voted in the Estimates. Reports are furnished by these Inspectors upon any particular matters which may arise. Health matters in the various Outports are under the immediate care of the respective Magistrates, they being constituted under the Act as a Board of Health. The Government have received no report from the Superintendent of the Child Welfare Association.

HON. THE PRIME MINISTER replying to a question of Mr. Godden said: Mr. Peters, of the Liquor Control, has not been deputed to visit Canada officially.

MR. DUFF asked the Colonial Secretary if it was correct that the Evening Telegram and Daily News were being paid for publishing the synopsis of the debates of the House of Assembly.

THE COLONIAL SECRETARY in reply stated that neither of the papers mentioned was being paid one cent for publishing the debates of the House of Assembly.

HON. THE MINISTER OF EDUCATION (Prime Minister) replying to Mr. Grimes said: The only persons in connection with the Normal School building, other than the teaching staff and janitors, is Mr. Thomas, who was Clerk of Works during the construction of the building, and who is still employed at the rate of \$5.00 a day pending the settlement of some outstanding differences between contractors and the Government. At present Mr. Thomas is engaged in supervising the grading of the grounds of the building.

The House went into Committee on the Income Tax Bill. Some questions were raised as to the definition of Bank loans, and the tax on absentee landlords also created some desultory discussion.

THE COLONIAL SECRETARY on the subject of absentee landlords said it was a case of "Heads I win, tails you lose," and that the landlords always won. In their leases they made it a covenant that the tenant pay all the taxes and this still continued despite the endeavours made by the Municipal Council and the Legislature itself to check this practice. He referred to vacant lands of absentee landlords, that they were holding these waiting for a very high price and not making any improvements on their property and these he felt should be highly taxed. He would strongly oppose any attempt at the abolition of this tax.

Before the passage of the Bill before Committee MR. GODDEN appealed again that the retroactive section of the Bill be made to take effect from December 31st, 1923.

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL while sympathizing with the attitude adopted by Mr. Godden pointed out that the Finance Minister had brought this in as a Budget measure as the revenue was required other-

wise he would support Mr. Godden's suggestion.

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE promised that though the Bill could not be made retroactive all delinquents who owed taxes and also those who had not made returns would be rounded up and that there would be a lot of fun by and bye.

The Committee reported progress and were given leave to sit again to-morrow, in order to more fully enquire into the subject of bank loans.

The House then resolved itself into Committee of the Whole on the Hotel Bill which was passed without dissent and ordered to be read a third time to-morrow.

The Bill respecting the Sales Tax was read a second time and referred to Committee of the Whole to-day.

Orders of the Day being completed the House adjourned until the usual hour Wednesday.

Wednesday, April 22nd.

The House met at the usual hour.

REPORTS.

THE HON. PRIME MINISTER presented the reports of the Select Committee on the Avalon Telephone Company's petition that the Bill be presented.

MR. DUFF demanded that fuller information be given the public as to concessions such as this, which are being continually asked for and referred to recent communications to the press, in which a suggestion was put forward as to the establishment of a Public Utilities Board.

THE PRIME MINISTER pointed out that the subject matter of the Bill was not within the province of the Select Committee, but merely as to whether the Rules had been complied with.

MR. SPEAKER repeated what the Prime Minister had said relative to the Select Committee. He further pointed out that under Rule 303 the Bill would later be referred to another Select Committee to consider the subject matter of the legislation. Nevertheless he felt constrained to point out, that in such matters the Rules should be strictly adhered to.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS.

Answers to questions on the Order Paper were tabled, including Mr. Gray's report on the Dock and on the Old Days Pond Construction Works.

The Commission appointing the Tariff Committee was also tabled. It is as follows:

Proclamation

By His Excellency Sir Wm. Lamond Allardyce, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St Michael W. L. Allardyce, and St. George, Governor and Commander in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland.

Whereas it is desirable that occasion should be afforded the people of this Colony to render thanks to Almighty God for the mercies He has been pleased to bestow upon this Colony during the past year, and to rejoice because of our National blessings; And Whereas Sunday, the Fifteenth day of November, next, would be an appropriate occasion for the said Thanksgiving;

I do, therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that Sunday, the Fifteenth day of November, next, shall be observed, throughout this Colony, as a Day of Thanksgiving, as aforesaid. And I do further order and direct that Wednesday, the Eleventh day of November, next, being Armistice Day, shall be set apart and observed, throughout the Colony, as a Day of Rejoicing and a Public and Bank Holiday, of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at the Government House, St. John's, this 22nd day of September, A.D., 1925.

NOTICE

To Owners and Masters of British Ships

The attention of Owners and Masters of British Ships is called to the 7th Section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894."

75.—(1) A Ship belonging to a British Subject shall hoist the proper national colors—

- (a) on a signal made to her by one of His Majesty's ships including any vessel under the command of an officer of His Majesty's navy or full pay, and
- (b) on entering or leaving any foreign port and
- (c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering or leaving any British Port.

(2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.

At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and leave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel hoists no colours and runs away, it is liable to be fired upon.

Mortimer Green, Esq., and Hon. Harris M. Mosdell, the power of summoning before you, in the name of the Chairman, any party or witness, and of requiring him or them to give evidence on oath, or on solemn affirmation, orally or in writing, and to produce such documents and things as you the said Commissioners may deem requisite to the full investigation of the matters into which you are appointed to examine, and to enquire of and concerning the premises by all, other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

ORDERS OF THE DAY.
The Hotel Bill was read a third time and ordered to be sent to the Legislative Council asking concurrence of that body. The House went into Committee of the Whole on Ways and Means.

MR. WARREN congratulated the Minister of Finance on the showing he made in the Budget, but regarded the speech as being most provocative in its tone, and he felt, most unfair to the previous Government. Every debit was made to the last Government, but no credits were entered for them. He admitted that abuses existed, but an endeavour had been made to correct them. For many of these years, the country suffered with all others from the general economic turmoil. His party had, in an attempt to purge the country of all these abuses, put the present administration in power, and ruined themselves politically. They had instituted the industry on the Humber, which had put the country on its feet, and which had made things very easy for the Colony. This was responsible for the revenue standing as it did to-day. No credit was given for this, but they were criminally negligent in many ways according to the Minister of Finance. He charged that due consideration had not been given the Tariff, which resulted in much dissatisfaction and delay and had since to be altered and duties imposed by it reduced. He had two points of view from which to regard this Tariff; the one as a member of the past Government, and secondly as "the man on the street." He contended that the people of Fortune objected to being taxed to pay the dole in St. John's. They on the West Coast suffered recently from a grave disaster, and lost life and property but gained no Government assistance. The Budget Speech and the actions of the Government had not displayed that they had any definite financial policy. The Leader of the Opposition claimed that fishing had to be conducted on a cheaper basis, yet the Tariff did not if as tabled precluded any possibility of ever paying a bonus on fish. The Government was returned to carry on the administration as a business and to cut out frills. It was the name of along, and yet to-day that faith was gone, but the Prime Minister had not changed. He explained this failure in faith was due to the Esau who was behind Jacob. The country have not expected such a Tariff. They discovered that the roses that had been expected bore thorns. The Minister had contended that the Tariff would only bring in \$450,000, but the fact was that it would bring in \$1,250,000, three times as much as the Minister really required to balance his expenditure, which was unnecessary and unfair. If the Minister wanted this large amount, why did he not say in his Speech that he did want it and explain the necessity for it. In this case there would have been much less criticism. The Government's attitude towards minor or local industries was plainly depicted by the Tariff. Money invested in fisheries gained nothing, but in other industries investment brought many favours. Far too much protection was being given to the Ropewalk and the Tobacco Factory in view of their financial conditions. Criticism on him for dabbling in trade, yet the present Government had engaged in the sealing venture themselves, not as previous governments had done by chartering their ships to private owners. Referring to the "Sagona" as a sealing venture, he raised the query as to whether Captain Little had not endangered his seat under the provisions of "Carter's Purge", as a Government-paid servant. Touching upon the Resolutions, he felt that we were unwise to commence any retaliations against the Forney Tariff of the United States. Other countries were effected by this Tariff and they had considered wisely the wisdom of retaliatory tariffs and had refrained from so doing. No good could be accomplished by taxing exported herring, and this, far from removing the American duty, might lose us a valuable market. In conclusion he said that at the proper time he intended moving an amendment.

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL referring to the legality of a tariff, stated that custom allowed a tariff to be levied when tabled, but it was not law until passing the Legislature as an Act. Hence alterations could not be called illegal. This custom of levying a tariff was the custom adopted and allowed by usage in England and Canada. The Minister was perfectly right in making any alterations according to the necessity for such alterations arose. Any time a tariff would be unpopular and create dissatisfaction amongst various groups. In his opinion the adjustments were made in perfect order and were strictly legal.

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE said if the member for Fortune had been fair he would not object to the criticism. In fairness to him the member should have pointed out that whilst levying an extra million and a quarter increase they were making an equivalent decrease. The total average collections for 1921-22 and 1922-23 showed \$4,086,486. Basing it on these collections the total collections under the New Tariff would be \$4,688,267, giving an increase of \$601,781, whilst the Sales Tax of 5% on the invoice value only would bring in \$1,000,000; thus making a gross increase of \$1,601,781. Deducted from that had to be the less, on putting flour, pork, beef, kerosene, etc., on the free list, \$468,161, loss on the old Sales Tax of 5% on duty, freight, and invoice value \$350,000; and the loss by abrogation of Income and Bank Tax \$694,000; in all a gross decrease of \$1,510,161. The net gain to the Colony being only \$91,620. When this Tariff was made up by the Squires Government it was intended to continue the income tax and all other duties now abrogated in addition to the increases under the new tariff just brought into force.

MR. DUFF felt sure all wanted to see local industries flourish but not at the expense of the country, as it would appear from the Tariff. He pointed out that an increase of 62% on such smallwares as bootlaces was protecting the Cordage Company, for people would have to revert to fishing line for bootlaces. He regretted the duty charged on fruit, which was harsh, for fruit should be readily obtained, and pleaded for a reduction of duties.

THE PRIME MINISTER claimed that figures quoted by the Leader of the Opposition the other day were erroneous. They were taken from the year book and he forgot to include in the old tariff the surtaxes and Sales Tax, etc. He regretted the increase as much as any man in the country. Referring to cordage and tobacco, he felt he should explain the position. For many years the Cordage Company has had to compete, without protection, with imported lines and twines. He wanted to explain that this recommendation had been made by the Tariff Commission, with which he had nothing to do, and had not been done by him because he was a director. The Cordage Company was doing great work and enormously benefiting the country and the trade and had a moral right to have a net protection of 6 1/2%. The Company was a real storehouse for the Newfoundland trade and gave accommodation to thought of by any Newfoundlander. Some year ago when he was Managing Director of the Tobacco Factory

he looked for protection from the Morris Government, otherwise the industry would have failed. To-day the Imperial Tobacco Co. was paying \$450,000 in excise duty to the country; more money than was collected before this concern came into being. They were making money for themselves, but the country was benefitting by it. He claimed that these two industries were the most valuable in the country. The Cordage Company employed 500 people and the Tobacco Company paid out over \$100,000 a year in wages. As far as the Government was concerned it was a great regret new Tariff. He had hoped to be able to reduce taxation, but this could only be done by a decrease in expenditure, which his government would give their whole attention to in the future. He claimed that the dole system was superior to improperly run Government works, and the pride of the people was no more hurt by it than by taking wages and giving no returns. He said their main object in the future should be to decrease all expenditure. He had said before that time would be required for all this to be done, and it would take four years of his term to put the country in shape. During the eight months they had done a lot, but they should not be judged by eight months' work. Rather would the country judge them on their four years work. He was doing his best and giving up his private business to devote his whole time to the government.

Mr. WARREN said that any mention he had made as to the Cordage Company and the Tobacco Company had not been intended, as having any personal bearing upon the Prime Minister's connection with these industries.

HON. THE PRIME MINISTER said that he had given a promise to his party that the protection on lines and twines would not mean an increase in price, as long as the raw materials did not increase, and he wished to promise the same to the House. The Cordage Company had provided sufficient raw materials for a year. He said that when he first saw the report of the Tariff Commission, he noticed a difference of four or five cents between the excise and the local duty on tobacco and \$1.50 extra protection on cigarettes. He immediately insisted that these duties be taken off and no protection given the Tobacco Factory. Further investigation insisted that a difference of one and a half cents in favour of the Company existed on plug tobacco and this was likewise being taken off. This means removing two cents on the imported article and thus giving the Company less protection than it ever had before. Concluding he said the only protection they wanted was that which would prevent somebody bringing something in and putting them out of business. The consumers will not have to pay any more now than before the Colonial Cordage Company had this protection of 6 1/2%.

CAPT. WINSOR was pleased to hear that fishermen would not have to pay any more for their lines and twines. Referring to the Government sending steamers to the ice, the same had happened last year when the Warren Government had chartered the "Sagona." The politicians had packed the ship with their friends and the result was that the men sent were political supporters and in White Bay last year he and others had got good trips but the Sagona's crew would not work the seals, claiming the steamer was owned by the Government and they could do as they wished.

WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in Our said Colony, that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit shall be opened and holden:
* At Brigus, on Friday, the Twentieth and Saturday, the Twenty-first days of November next;
* At Harbour Grace, on Monday the Twenty-third, Tuesday, the Twenty-fourth, Wednesday, the Twenty-fifth, and Thursday, the Twenty-sixth days of November next;
* At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-seventh, and Saturday, the Twenty-eighth days of November next.

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinafter prescribed at each of the respective places as aforesaid, provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that in the event of the Judge who may preside in the said Court being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinafter appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinafter named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and should deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized, to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinafter specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinafter stated as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents, all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols, and all other Officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

N. D. M. HOSPITAL NEEDS ASSISTANCE.

A delegation from the Notre Dame Memorial Hospital Committee at Twillingate, were in St. John's last week interviewing the Government to present the situation which now faces those in charge of the Hospital. Last Friday's Gale

One of the worst south westerly gales ever experienced in this country began about 8.30 on Friday evening last and increased to hurricane force as the night advanced.
