Off the mouth of the harbor the Senece's tow line was transferred to the D. G. S. Stanley, which ship had been instructed to meet the American derellot craft. Shortly after 10 o'clock the Stanley, assisted by the tug Scottman, anceceded in towing the derelict to Sandy Cove, Dartmouth.

The Senea received orders to search for the derelict and sailed from New York, Sept. 5, with the intention of taking the capsized vessel in tow for the nearest port. This morning divers went down to examine the vessel at Sandy Cove, and ascertained that the name of the derelict was the Lottle R. Russell, of New York. She was owned by Russell & Compton, of Bridgeton, N. J., She was built in 1895 at Bridgeton, N. J., and is 283 tons net and 305 tons gross. Her length is 122.8 feet long, her beam 32.6, and 9.9 feet deep. The Russell lett Charleston, S. FARMING IMPROVES. More Scientific Methods Spreading Over Ontario.

In this refulgent summer time t farmers of Ontario are a busy let. T crops are immense and they have to garnered. Old Man Ontario has all garnered. Old Man Onterio has all he can do and more, in some counties. In fact, he is crying in vain for help. He misses the hired man. It may be some comfort to know that son and daughter, who responded to the call of the west and the lure of the city, are doing well but he certainly does miss the hired man.

Without considering what has become of H. M., whither he has hiked nor why, it may be stated that his absence seriously cripples the farming industry of; this most populous and wealthy province of the Dominion of Canada; that there is a decided dearth of operative help on the farms. The tide of immigration affords no relief. Even the picked farm laborers selected in the Old Country by representatives of different Outario county organizations are captured by Canadian city contractors before they reach Ontario's farms. All efforts to import laborers have proved failures. Other and slower means are necessary to a satisfactory development of this wonderful contentment with country life and check the decline of the rural population is a matter of education.

population is a matter of education. To Further Agriculture.

Becently Ontario received \$195,000 as her share of the new federal agricultural sid grant and it was decided to utilise the larger portion of the grant in amplifying and making permanent the summer school for teachers at the Gusph Agricultural college. The departments of education and agriculture are co-operating in holding of special courses for public and separate school teachers and inspectors and for science teachers in High Schools and sollitile crime.

In Ottawa a mashine has been perfected to make shingles out of disearded tin came. After being rolled straight the can is put through a corrugating mashine. Then it is put through a weatherproofing process, and then into a vest containing a substance like tar. The tin, while still wet, is dipped in asbestoe which readily adheres to the far-like coating. Shingles so made are asid to be more flexible and lighter than the wood or corrugated steel articles, and they are produced in various colors. No nails are used in fastening them to roofs, the rolling process shaping them so that they are held in position by the corrugations.

CRIME IN NEW ZEALAND. Secause of Certain Deterrents The

Isn't a Great Deal of It. "We have hardly any crime in Ne Zealand," says an editor and lawyer who has lived many years in that country and who is now in the course of a lifty around the world. "I attribute it to the strength of our laws and the law-abiding spirit of the people, for the most part. Then there is another deterrent. It is the surety with

for the most part. Then there is another deterrent. It is the surety with which arime is punished.

"If a man hav committed a murder in New Zealand he does not lie in fail for a year fortwo, as I am informed sometimes happens in other countries. We make an effort to bury him within two weeks after sentence has been imposed. With us a man may do pretty much as he likes so long as he does not interfere with the rights or interests of anybody else. The moment he does he comes in contact with the law.

"I cannot think of a single case of murder in our country in the last 20 years in which the murderen has not been caught and hanged. We limited the severest penalties in every case. The rank of a man or his wealth are never in his favor in a count of law. It can precure film nothing except high-priced lawyer, perhaps. The excuse of insanity and the testimony of a corps of well-paid medical experts do not avail much. There is no appeal from the verdict of a court in a murder case, unless the judge himself thinks the verdict of the jury is against the evidence. Otherwise the conviction must stand.
