COLONY OF CHINAMEN FOUND IN AUSTRALIA

Hidden Community Numbers Several Thousand, and is Engaged in Cultivating Opium.

SYDNEY, April 22.—A traveller in Northern Queensland, Mr. Hansford, a Melbourne lawyer, brings a story of a hitherto unknown colony of Chinamen in the country near the Gulf of Carpentaria. The news, which has been confirmed, has come as a shock to the advocates of a "White Australia"

SCIENTIST GETS STARFISH TO TURN SOMERSAULTS.

feaches Marine Animals to Acquire Habit — Believes That Closer Training Would Bring Remarkable Results.

BALTIMORE, April 22.—A starfish has been trained to turn somersaults by Dr. Herbert S. Jennings, associate professor of physiology at Johns Hopkins University.

In righting itself when turned on its back the starfish may use any pair from the five rays to attach itself and then, by pulling with this pair, it turns a somersault, returning to its natural position.

Training was directed towards getting the animal to employ regularly a certain pair of rays for this purpose, the experimenter at first not permiting it to use others. Professor Jennings, in a report in the university circular, states:

"By this method it was found that the starfish very readily acquires what may be called temporary habits. Thus in one typical case, in which the starfish was trained to use a certain pair of rays that were never used naturally after twelve lessons, one following the other immediately, the animal was

Sydney Oliver, Who Succeeds Swettenham, One of Brilliant Band of Writers

LONDON, April 22.—The appointment of Sydney Olivier, C. M. G., to the Governorship of Jamaica shows the long distance we have traveled from the days of Governor Eyre. Mr. Oliver is one of that brilliant little band of Fabian Socialists, headed by Mr. Shaw and Mr. Webb, who have made their mark since they issued their historic

Mr. Olivier was colonial secretary from 1899 to 1904, and on three occasions served as Acting Governor. For sions served as Acting Governor. For the past two years Mr. Olivier has been principal clerk in the West African department of the Colonial Office. He has found it possible to reconcile his practice of benevolent autocracy with his theory of Socialistic communism as enunciated by the Fabian Society. Mr. Olivier is 47 years old, and entered the Colonial Office at the head of the list twenty-five years ago. He has publishel a volume of "Poems and Parodies."



VIENNA, April 22—Dr. Paul Pragar, an army surgeon, who has made a special study of methods of identification, recommends that prisoners should be identified by the shape of their palates. He thinks the system far more efficacious than by finger prints.

Dr. Prager declares that the method would be much more reliable than any at present used, for among the thousands of moulds he has taken of the interior of the human mouth he has failed to find two which even slightly resembled each other.

He says that though the teeth alter greatly with time, the markings of the palate remain unchanged throughout life. The individuality of the palate is greater and more permanent than that of any other part of the body, and a detective force which possessed a large collection of mouth-moulds would have a guide infinitely safer than a gallery of finger prints.
