

THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT  
OF THE  
INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

In presenting this, our Thirty-Fourth Annual Report, to our subscribers and friends, we desire to express our devout gratitude for the past and express the hope that the year just entered upon may be still more fruitful in good works.

Sewing has been provided for 171 women during the year, and \$4,519.39 expended in payment of same.

The workers, classified, are as follows:—Episcopallians, 94; Presbyterians, 32; Methodists, 17; French Protestants, 9; Baptists, 7; Congregationalists, 4; unclassified, 4; Italians, 3; Salvation Army, 1.

The Annual Bazaar, held in December, realized \$4,052.12. This Bazaar is our principal means of disposing of the accumulated stock, garments being brought in at the rate of 300 per week through the winter.

The amount realized at the Fancy Work Table, viz., \$351.29, was expended in purchasing clothing to distribute among the different charitable institutions and individual poor, thus performing a double charity. This should prove a great incentive to further help in this direction.

The Annual Spring Sale took place this month and realized \$483.15. Over 6,000 garments still remain to be disposed of and we earnestly appeal to all kind hearted friends to help us to reduce this accumulated stock and thus enable the Committee not only to carry on, but greatly extend their benevolent aid.

Through the generosity of friends our workers were all provided with Christmas dinners and gifts of clothing. A full list of contributors is appended. A kind friend sent in \$40, and another \$30, to provide summer trips for some of the poor women, and still another helped us to provide coal and wood for 18 families. Mrs. John McDougall kindly provided "A Tea," in March for the inmates of the Old People's Home at Longue Pointe, also to the women-workers. A thoroughly enjoyable afternoon was spent, one and all express-

ing their gratitude for this gleam of sunshine shed on the routine of daily life. We are deeply indebted to the Rev. J. Edgar Hill, Rev. C. J. James, Rev. Donald Grant, and the Rev. Thos. Renaud, for short services held with the women while waiting for their work on Friday morning.

The Old People's Home has been regularly visited, and we rejoice to know that our aged poor are so well cared for. We desire to thank most heartily the ladies of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's Church Ladies' Aid Societies for visiting and inquiring into the needs of the applicants, and for much practical help given.

In many cases reported upon we have found it necessary to supplement the amount paid for work by help from our Gratuity Fund, and we take this opportunity to heartily thank the kind donors to this fund.

We are grateful to the Management of the General Hospital and Jones Convalescent Home for orders given; also to ladies who send us in orders for their clothing, and thus enable us to provide more remunerative work for our competent workers.

The "Rooms" have been painted and decorated, and we desire to cordially thank Mrs. Gault and Messrs. R. C. Jamieson, Alex. Ramsay, Colin McArthur, Robert Munro and Robert Mitchell for donations in kind for the same.

Miss Rhind, our able Superintendent, remains in charge, fulfilling the duties of her office in a most faithful and efficient manner. We would again thank most heartily all those who, by the generosity of their contributions and donations, have enabled us to carry on our work. Specially would we mention the generous collections from the different churches and the many who, outside of our own Committee, gave practical aid at the time of the Bazaar.

We would also extend our sincere thanks to Messrs. Bentley & Co. for printing, Messrs. Burland & Co., for tickets; editors of "Gazette," "Star," "Witness," and "Herald," for insertion of notices, and to all who, in any way, have helped us in our work.

## CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

### NAME.

The Committee shall be called "The Ladies' Committee of the Industrial Rooms, and of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge."

### OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be two-fold :—

First.—As the Committee of the Industrial Rooms. (a) To provide employment in needlework to as many poor people as possible, in their own homes, irrespective of age, nationality, or denomination. (b) To visit these women in their homes, and one morning in each week to hold a mothers' meeting. (c) To sustain a provident Gratitude Fund, in order to encourage the workers to save their earnings, and to afford relief in extreme cases.

Secondly.—As a sub-committee of the Board of Management of the House of Industry and Refuge. To provide regular lady visitors, who shall inquire into the condition of the inmates regarding health, comfort, cleanliness and general well-being; and who shall make such suggestions, from time to time, as they may deem advisable for the greater efficiency of the Institution.

### OFFICE-BEARERS AND COMMITTEE.

The Committee shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, to be elected annually, and of members chosen from Protestant Churches of all denominations. There shall be a separate Executive Committee of the Industrial Rooms, consisting of a directress and members chosen from the General Committee.

### MEETINGS.

The meetings of the General Committee shall be held on the first Wednesday of every month (unless there is good reason for a change), from October till May. The Annual General Meeting shall be held on the first week of April, at which reports shall be received, office-bearers elected, auditors appointed, and such other business transacted as the interests of the work may demand. All meetings shall open with prayer.

### DUTIES OF OFFICE-BEARERS.

The President or Vice-President shall preside at the monthly meetings, and preserve order thereat. In the absence of the President or Vice-President, the Committee shall have power to elect a substitute. The treasurer shall have power to receive and take charge of the funds, and to deposit the same in trust for the Committee of

the Industrial Rooms, in one of the Savings Banks of the city. She shall also present an annual statement to the General Committee. The Secretary shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the meetings, prepare and present an Annual Report, and perform all necessary duties of her office.

#### GENERAL COMMITTEE.

The General Committee (including President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretary, of whom five shall form a quorum) shall have the general supervision of the affairs of the Association, with power to make such arrangements as shall increase the number, profit and interest of all its members. Anyone desirous to propose a new member shall give notice a month previous to election by ballot.

#### SUB-COMMITTEE.

Sub-Committees may be appointed from time to time for particular objects.

#### HONORARY MEMBERS.

Honorary members may be elected at any regular meeting, by a two-thirds majority of the members present. They shall enjoy all the privileges of ordinary membership, except those of voting and of holding office.

#### MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee of the Industrial Rooms shall meet every Friday morning at ten o'clock, for the purpose of giving out work, etc., and for the general transaction of business.

#### DIRECTRESS.

The Directress shall have the responsibility of regulating and managing the details of this department.

#### MODE OF APPLICATION.

Any person desiring work shall bring a letter of introduction from her clergyman, or from some other responsible person, and apply on Friday morning between the hours of ten and twelve.

#### VISITORS.

All applicants shall be visited in their homes by ladies appointed to this work, who shall report on or before the following Friday, as to their need and circumstances, and these statements shall be duly registered.

#### NOTE.

No alterations or addition shall be made to this Constitution without notifying the Secretary of the proposed change; the said notice shall be given in writing, and shall be presented to the Committee at the next general meeting.
