London, April 17 (3.14 a.m.)—Premier Radoslavoff, of Bulgaria, has admitted the possibility of Bulgaria's Impending participation in the war in support of the Triple Entente powers, says the Daily Mail's Sofia corresondent.

BEING MANUFACTURED.

Committee Making inquiry as to Possibility of Filling Order for Russia for Rifles and Ammunition.

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Committee Russia for Rifles and Ammunition.

Ottawa, April 16—A report of the shell committee and the Possibility of Possibility of Filling Order for Russia for Rifles and Ammunition.

It is stated semi-officially this even by the Shell committee and the Possibility of is Mr. David Carnegie, who has had large experience of this kind in Great Britain.

The sport reviews the committee's work in securing orders for the manufacture of shells in Canada, aggregating up to the present time, it is understood, some \$80,000,000, and embracing factories in all parts of Canada. At the present time arrangements are being made at a number of western points to start the manufacture of shells in factories there. The committee reports that all the material being used in manufacture of shells is, with the exception of copper, being mined and smelted in Canada. These materials include the shell cases, brass cartridge eases, primers, cordite, powder and fuses. Thousands of men, who would otherwise be out of work, are now employed in the various manufacturing processes. Nearly 200 examiners and district inspectors have been appointed under the direction of the chief inspector of arms and ammunition, to see that the work is being properly done in each factory. Uniform prices are paid, and arrangements have been made to supply the shell-assembling manufacturers with all the component parts of shells, free of charge. All kinds of shells, up to the 18-pounder shrapnel shells are being manuafctured.

The committee is now working on investigations in connection with the supply in Canada for the War Office of propellants and high explosives, and also the possibility of filling orders from the Russian government for rifie and ammunitions. In addition to the manufacture of several tons of cordite and powder in connection with the present contracts for shells, the Minister of Militia has been instrumental in initiating a new injustry in meanuagature.



This shell was followed quickly by another, and the third struck the edge of the roof of the dugout, making the utensils inside clatter and showering the now crouching party with mud. The officer in charge thereupon suggested tea inside the dugout. The invitation was accepted. Excellent tea was passed around, for the Britsh soldier, especially the officers, wants tea on the fring line as much as at home. 

GETTING COTTON BY WAY OF ST. JOHN

Off-setting this new business, much N. B. lumber is being sent to the States by rail.

Scarcity of shipping and high ocean freight rates are bringing some new business to St. John. It may be of interest to some people to learn that the Yarmouth, N. S. cotton mills have been getting a good deal of their raw material from the Southern States by way of St. John for some time past. The cotton comes to St. John by rail, a car load being about fifty bales. The cars are run to the C. P. R. wharf at Reed's Point and put aboard the Yarmouth which runs to Digby. Formerly the Yarmouth cotton mills got a considerable quantity of raw outton from Boston by way of the Boston boat. When shipments from Boston were landed at Yarmouth they had to be trucked from the wharf to the mills. Shipments soing by way of St. John and Digby in cars can be landed alongside the receiving warehouse of the mills at Yarmouth.

On the other hand the high ocean rates has taken away from St. John some business in handling lumber which it formerly got. A big lumber buyer from New England told a reporter of The Standard yesterday that practically all the lumber he had bought for this season would be sent forward to Boston and other points in New England by rail. The rates given by the railways now are as low or in some cases lower than can be obtained from shippowners, while to offset any difference in freight rates lumber dealers shipping by railway are able to have their consignments delivered by car-load lots at any point they desire. This is not always possible when shipments are sent forward by vessel.
