The Moderator announced that he had associated with himself Rev. T. S. VanWart and Licentiate F. C. Hartley, as a Committee on Preaching arrangements.

Rev. J. Wesley Clark, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report :

BROTHER MODERATOR AND DEAR BRETHREN :

From the various parts of our denominational field we are this day assembled to celebrate the Saviour's praise; to gratefully review our experiences of the past, and to hopefully look forward at 1 pres and since ener to n been pron

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toward the responsibilities and duties of the future. Then with one heart and voice let us unite in thanksgiving to Him by whose mercies we are permitted to meet again in our General Conference.

The history of the Christian Church is a most glorious fulfillment of the prophesies and promises of God. From the primitive days until now, she has steadily and conqueringly marched on, (notwithstanding the predicted persecutions), and Christendom today has greater territory, influence, and power than ever before.

Concerning ourselves, and our work as a denomination of Christians, we should rejoice that God has continued His blessings with us through another year; that He has honored the faith and answered the prayer of His people, whose labors have resulted in the salvation of souls, and in otherwise building up the Kingdom of our Lord and Master. Numerous indeed have been the manifestations of our Father's love towards us. Spiritually many of the Churches are better and numerically they are stronger than a year ago. Our losses, however, have been many. Death has been doing its work. Several of the leading and official members of our Churches have passed away, some of whom had for many years been known for their faithfulness and loyalty to God and the Church, and for having "earnestly contended for the faith once delivered to the saints."

J Especially is it our sad duty to record the death of two of our beloved and aged ministers: Revs. Robert French and Jacob Gunter. Both of these dear brethren did pioneer work. Both of them fought many battles for God, achieved many victories, and finally triumphed over the last enemy; which is death, and peacefully entered into rest.

FIRST DISTRICT.

The annual session of this District was held with the Church at Arthurette, on the second Saturday of July last. The Divine presence was graciously manifested. The Lord's people rejoiced and were glad; sinners were drawn to God, some of whom have since followed him in the ordinance of baptism. The constant, energetic labor of Rev. J. J. Barnes, which have been continued to most of the Churches in this District through another year, have been signally owned of God; and he has considerably realized the promise, "that in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."

His regular pastoral work was with the Churches at Bath, Bumfrau, and Perth, in each of which were gracious revivals of religion. Strength came to many that had been weak; faith increased and grace grew in the hearts of those who had worked and prayed. Sinners cried out unto God for mercy, and were made happy as, passing through the straits of regeneration, they entered into the light and liberty of the Gospel.

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At Bath the Pastor baptized eight, and added them to the At Bumfeau, sixteen were added by baptism, and four-Church. teen by letter. Six were added by baptism to the Church at Brother Barnes also visited the Church at Wright Settle-Perth. Here his labors were blessed, and souls were converted. Seven were baptized and received into membership with the Church.

Rev. C. F. Rideout has resided within the limits of this District during a part of the year. The Churches and Settlements which have been visited by Bro. Rideout have been encouraged and helped.

Licentiate F. A. Currier has cared for and spent all of his time during the year with the Churches at Arthurette and Long Island. Three have been added by baptism to the Church at Long Island.

Six of the Churches have had pastoral care during the year. The same number have regular weekly prayer meetings. Seven hold monthly Conference meetings. The average attendance at the prayer meetings, including the six Churches, is178.

Concerning the non-reported Churches of this District we have received no information. We presume, however, that they are very low and weak, and that they afford a good field for earnest missionary work.

Samuel Moore and Stephen Barker were appointed Delegates to General Conference.

SECOND DISTRICT.

This District is composed of twenty eight Churches, all of which are situated in the County of Carleton. Twenty-five of them reported at the annual/meeting, which was held with the Church at 7th Tier, Jacksontown, on the last Saturday in June.

All the meetings were good. The spirit of revival was with many of God's people; and all in attendance were encouraged to go on, proving faithful until death.

The Woodstock and Third Tier Jacksontown Churches have had the pastoral care of Rev. C. T. Phillips. Both of these Churches greatly enjoy the services of their pastor. To each of them have been added by baptism one, and one by letter to the Third Tier Church. The members of this Church were revived and strengthened by some special meetings conducted by the pastor, and assisted by Rev. C. F. Rideout, in the month of March last.

Tracy's Mills and Knoxford Churches have had the astoral care of Rev. J. W. Clark. Two have been added by baptism to the Tracy's Mills Church, and seventeen by baptism to the Church at Knoxford.

Licentiate A. McNintch has ministered to and cared for the Churches at Gordonsville, Coldstream, Windsor, Knowlesville, and Rockland. The pastor held special services with several of these Churches. The Lord favorably looked upon the effort, and blessed it in the return of wanderers and the salvation of sinners. Eight were added by baptism and one by letter to the Gordonsville Church. Nineteen were added by baptism and eight by letter to the Coldstream Church, and five by baptism and three by letter to the Rockland Charch.

Rev. Thomas Connor has had pastoral care of the Seventh Tier Church. Bro. Connor is getting old, and though not able for much special work, has regularly and faithfully preached to them the Word of Life. His labors with this Church have greatly benefitted the members; and though no additions have been made during the year, they are thankful for the grace given them, and are praying that more of God's blessing may come to them.

The Charleston Church has had regular and faithful service from its pastor, Rev. E. B. Gray. Bro. Gray held some special meetings with this Church, and though no additions by baptism or letter are reported, good was done in the additional strength given to the members.

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The Brookville Church has been cared for by Rev. Henry Hartt. One was added by baptism, and five by letter.

Rev. S. W. Shaw has been pastor, for the past year, of Victoria Corner, Somerville, and Connell Churches. None have been added to these Churches during the year, but they are united, and confident in the hope that ere long God will pour out His Spirit upon them.

Lower Brighton, Hartland. Upper Brighton, and Pembroke Churches have enjoyed the labors of Licentiate W. R. Reud.

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10 These Churches, which have prospered during the year, commend very highly the spirit and work of their young pastor.

The Third Woodstock Church has received attention and care from Bro. L. G. Slipp.

Waterville and Palmer Settlement Churches have had no pastor, but occasional visits have been made them by Revs. C. T. Philips, E. B. Gray, and J. W. Clark.

Foreston, Waterville, Jacksonville, and Lakeville Churches sent no report, and evidently are in need of missionary or pastoral attention.

Fathe" Sipprell still lives, and though not lacking a decade to complete a century of life, still manifests interest in the success of the denomination.

The number added to the Churches of this District during the year is, by baptism 54; by letter 18; total 72; less by decrease 54 : net increase 18.

THIRD DISTRICT.

This District held its annual meeting with the Lower Canterbury Church, on the third Wednesday in September. Of its twenty-one Churches fourteen reported at the annual session, which is the largest number ever reported in any one year.

Central Southampton, Upper Hainsville, Campbell Settlement, and Lower Canterbury Churches have received the pastoral care of Rev. Gideon Swim. Two were added by letter to the Central Southampton Church; twelve by baptism to the Upper Hainsville Church ; and one by letter to the Church at Campbell Settlement.

Rev. Dr. McLeod completed twenty-two years of pastoral work with the Fredericton Church in July last, since which time this Church has been without a pastor. Three were added by baptism and two by letter.

The Douglas, Marysville and Nashwaak Churches have been cared for by Rev. William Downey. The pastor, assisted by Rev. Dr. McLeod, conducted a series of special meetings with the Marysville Church, the result of which was the encouraging and strengthening of the Church, the return of wanderers and the

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salvation of sinners. Of the large number of convertions thirtynine were baptized and added to the Church, and sixteen were added by letter. One was added by letter to the Douglas Church.

Rev. J. Noble has given pastoral attention to the Douglas Church. Dumfries, Prince William, Bear Island, and Lower Queensbury. Brother Noble added one by baptism and one by letter to the Lower Queensbury Church.

Licentiate R. W. Carpenter labored three quarters of his time with the Church at Stanley. One was added by letter.

The Kingsley Church sent no statistics, but report prayer meetings held, and labor occasionally given them by Licentiates Bonnell and Carpenter.

The District Clerk states "that several of the unreported Churches have ceased to exist; that removals, schisms, backsliding, and death, have each and all had much to do with the loss of visibility of these Churches."

Five pastors labored in this District during the year, and all of them did efficient work.

District License was granted Brother R. W. Carpenter.

To the Churches of this District have been added, by baptism 55; by letter 24; total 79; less by decrease 54; net increase 25

FOURTH DISTRICT.

This District held its annual meeting with the Church at Tracy Station, on the third Saturday of September. Of its fifteen Churches fourteen reported at the annual session.

The Churches at Blissville, Patterson Settlement, and Mill Settlement, have continued to receive the constant and faithful labor of their pastor, Rev. W. H. Perry. Six were added by letter to the Patterson Settlement Church, and one by baptism to the Mill Settlement Church.

Rev. G. W. Foster has had the pastoral oversight and care of the Churches at Fredericton Junction, Tracy Station, and Little Lake. Brother Foster has this year again been blessed in his labor with the Churches of his pastorate. A gracious revival of religion was enjoyed by the Church at Tracy Station, affording them much strength and encouragement. Thirteen were added by baptism and one by letter to this Church.

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The Geary, Waterville, Victoria, and Upper Gagetown Churches

have received the labor of Rev. John Henderson as pastor. None have been added by baptism or letter.

Licentiate H. A. Bonnell has labored with the Churches at Rusagornish, Waasis, and Lincoln. No additions have been made by baptism or letter.

The Church at Oromocto has had no pastor, and no ministerial visits are reported.

The Greenfield Church sent no report.

Twelve of the Churches have monthly conference meetings, and seven of them weekly prayer meetings.

As to the spiritual condition of the Churches in this District, I am unable to report. The official statements forwarded me were exclusively statistical.

The number added to the Churches of this District by baptism is 14; by letter 7; total 21; less by decrease 23; net decrease 2.

FIFTH DISTRICT.

This District reported sixteen Churches at its annual session, which was held with the Holderville Church on the first Wednesday in July last.

The First and Second Greenwich, and First Kars Churches have had the pastoral care of Rev. J. A. Robertson. Two were added by baptism, and two by letter to the First Church, Kars.

Brother Robertson and Licentiate L. Cosman have together extended care to the Third Hampstead Church. The District Clerk, referring to this Church, says, "I cannot form any decided opinion of their spirituality." If the lack of statements touching their activity indicates their visibility, then, as in some other cases, they must be rather inactive.

Rev. J. G. McKenzie continued to extend pastoral care to the First Hampstead Church until the last session of General Conference. For the following six months they were without a pastor. Early in April the services of Licentiate L. J. Perry were secured. Brother Perry is referred to as having faithfully and zealously labored. This Church has suffered loss by death. The late Stephen Smith, who for twenty-five years occupied the position of senior Deacon, and who was a faithful Christian and a good man, was removed from earth to Heaven.

The Second Hampstead and First Johnston Churches have

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been cared for by Licentiate L. J. Perry. The first named report the outlook to be good, with a strong under current of spiritual life, an increase in the attendance at conference meetings, and an interesting and flourishing Sabbath School. The second named report the Church to be prospering, through the highly appreciated labors of its pastor, Brother L. W. Perry, and from visits by Rev. J. G. McKenzie, and Rev. W. H. Perry. This Church has a second preaching station at Lake View. A fitting mention we all knew and dearly loved. He was a faithful and devoted member of the Church, loving all who loved our Lord Jesus Christ, and always being interested in the success of our denomination. God in His wisdom has removed him from us, and we pow in submission to the mandate of our Father.

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isly ion ood Rev. O. N. Mott has labored a quarter of the time as pastor, with each of the Fourth Hampstead and Second Johnston Churches. The First Kingston Church, which is reported as being low spiritually, but which has a few faithful ones, has been without a pastor until the last District Meeting, since which time Rev. O. N. Mott has been with them.

The Second Kars, Sixth Wickham, and First Westfield Churches have received and enjoyed the faithful pastoral labor of Rev. J. N. Barnes. One was added by baptism to the Second Kars Church, and two by baptism to Sixth Wickham Church.

Rev. T. W. Carpenter has been pastor of the Fourth Wickham Church during the year. This Church was favored with an extensive revival during the past winter, when seventeen were added by baptism, and seven by letter. The interest among the members continues to be good.

But few changes have taken place with the First Church at Wickham. They report visits from Revs. J. G. McKenzie, J. N. Barnes, and T. W. Carpenter. Brother McKenzie accepted pastoral duties with them until Conference.

All the Churches in this District hold monthly conference meetings, while less than one-third report weekly prayor meetings.

The number added by baptism to the Churches of this District is 24; by letter 7; total 31; less by decrease 29; net increase 2.

SIXTH DISTRICT.

This District held its annual meeting with the Church at Upper Millstream. Of its thirty-two Churches twenty-five reported.

Penobsquis, Sussex, Lower Millstream, and Dutch Valley Churches have been regularly cared for by Licentiate F. C. Hartley. The religious interest in the Churches of this pastorate is interestingly good. To the Sussex Church have been added by letter six; to the Lower Millstream Church one by baptism, and letter six; and eight by baptism and one by letter to the Dutch Valley Church.

The Lower Millstream Church deeply mourn their loss by death of Deacon William Heine and Brother George Musgrove. And the Sussex Church is in mourning on account of the death of their senior Deacon, Brother George L. Slipp.

or their senior Deacon, Brouch the day astoral charge of the Apohaqui, Rev. William DeWare has had pastoral charge of the Apohaqui, Norton Station, Midland, and Long Point Churches. No additions have been made to any of the Churches of this pastorate during the year. The pastor's pulpit efforts are highly spoken of.

The Third Moneton and Taylor Village Churches have received the pastoral attention of Rev. A. H. McLeod. Six were added by baptism to the Taylor Village Church.

Cornhill, Coverdale, Petitcodiae, and Rockland Churches have each regularly received the faithful and earnest pastoral labor of Rev. A. C. Thompson. Three were added by baptism and four by letter to the Cornhill Church; fifteen by baptism and four by letter to the Coverdale Church; and one by baptism and seven by letter to the Petitcodiae Church.

SEVENTH DISTRICT.

All of the fourteen Churches composing this District reported at the last annual session, which was held with the North Head Church, Grand Manan.

The Waterloo Street Church, St. John, still continues to enjoy the pastoral care of Rev. J. T. Parsons. To this Church have been added by baptism two, and by letter four. The pastor and the Church are earnestly and unitedly working for God and humanity.

Rev. G. A. Hartley continues to be the successful pastor of the Church at West End, Saint John, (formerly called the Carleion Church). The spirit of revival has been with thisChurch nearly all the year. A goodly number have made a profession of their faith in Christ. Sixteen have been added by baptism and eight by letter.

The Church at Wilson's Beach has enjoyed the earnest labor of Rev. J. Perry as pastor, who has labored with them all of the time during the year.

The North Roads Church, Campobello, has had no pastor for the year, and was not fully reported. They have sustained a loss by the death of two of its members.

Rev. C. F. Rideout spent the first part of the year with the Church at Beaver Harbor, and Rev. F. Babcock the remaining part of the year. Though none have been added by baptism or letter, the work of faith done by these brethren will surely bring glory to God.

The Churches at North Head, Seal Cove, and Grand Harbour, have received the pastoral attention of Rev. T. O. DeWitt. Bro. DeWitt also visited the Church at Castalia. Two have been added by baptism and one by letter to North Head Church, and five by baptism and one by letter to the Seal Cove Church.

Licentiate Irvine D. Harvey, who resides at White Head, has

extended care and given labor to the Church on that Island. The West Isles Churches, situated at Fair Haven, Chocolate

Cove and Northern Harbour, have been added to and otherwise strengthened by the much appreciated visits and earnest labor of Revs. A. H. McLeod and W. R. Burr, and Licentiate David Long, Five were added by baptism to the Fair Haven Church ; thirteen by baptism and four by letter to the Chocolate Cove Church, and one by baptism and two by letter to Northern Har-

Rev. B. H. Nobles has faithfully attended to his pastoral/duties bour Church. with the Church on Victoria Street, St. John, The interest in this Church is good ; the congregations are large, and the services are spiritual and helpful. Brother Nobles baptized three and added them to this Church during the year.

The number added by baptism to the Churches of this District is 47; by letter 21; total 68; less by decrease 447.; net decrease

This terrible decrease, I may say, has been caused not by 379. deaths and removals only, but mostly by the revision of the Church books at North Head and Seal Cove, when the names of many

were dropped, who had gone out from us long ago. All of the Churches in this District report monthly conference

meetings and regular weekly prayer meetings. Monies raised for support of Ministry, \$3,717 00 Current Church expenses,.....

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The District voted to recommend General Conference to consider the propriety of arranging, as far as possible, a plan to hold (throughout the whole Conference field) protracted, or old time three day meetings.

The total number of Churches comprising the several Districts is 145, of which 117 have reported; 108 of the Churches have had regular pastoral care. The total number added to all the Churches by baptism is 278; by letter 126; total 401.

It is true that the number added to the Churches is not as large as in some previous years, but our success has not been small, neither have our blessings been few. That two hundred and seventy-eight souls have been regenerated; that many wanderers have returned; that union and peace abound; that our one purpose is the salvation of sinners through Jesus Christ, are facts which should produce within us the profoundest gratitude to God.

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Our survey of the field which our Heavenly Father has given us in trust, suggests to our mind that the branch of work which we call "Home Mission," should be more than ever vigorously prosecuted; that such of the Churches as are strong should liberally contribute to the support of those that are weak; that more attention be given, and much prayer be made, for those who in their weakness are struggling for life amongst us. Our possibilities and responsibilities are equally great. May we be abundant in faith and in works.

PRESQUE ISLE, Oct. 3rd, 1890.

To the brethren and sisters of the Free Christian Baptist General Conference, assembled at Millstream.

GREETING :-- I send to you in this brief report the fraternal greetings of the Maine Free Baptist Association.

It is a source of regret to me that the circumstances are such that I will not be able to meet with you as I expected.

The Maine Free Baptist Association was incorporated by an

Act of Legislature, February 26th, 1889. The first meeting was held with the Main Street Church, Lewiston, Maine, Sept. 17 and 18, 1889.

As an Association we are but as yet in our infancy. The second Annual Meeting being held in the Essex Street Church, Bangor, Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 and 2, 1890.

The object of this Association is to do the work of the three yearly meetings in one Association.

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Each of the yearly meetings have already discontinued their organization, and united in the Association for a more general and

Rev. O. W. Waldron of Saco was chosen as State Sceretary one year ago, and has been laboring among the Churches of the State, looking after the interests of the weak Churches and assisting the pastors in their work as best he could. We feel that this part of the State work has been attended with a good degree of success. Our State work is carried on by collections from Churches, but more particularly by individual subscriptions.

The Quarterly Meetings remain the same as formerly, and report to the State Association instead of yearly meetings as before.

Our Churches in some Quarterly Meetings are well supplied with pastors, while in others there is a lack, and in many fields there has been no regular preaching for some length of time.

Im many of our Churches the meetings are well attended and interesting.

The four Quarterly Meetings in the western part of the State,

which were formerly known as the Western Yearly Meeting, have raised \$500 in the past year for the support of an evangelist

Several new Churches have been recently constructed and dedicated. Some have been extensively repaired. One at Caribou is under process of construction and expect to dedicate soon. Several of our Churches have made large accessions to their membership. In the past year several have united with the Presque Isle Church. Sept. 21st, by request, I received twentytwo persons into the Sprague's Mills Church at Easton.

The principal object of our State Association, we feel assured in saying, is to assist our weaker Churches in securing ministerial care. We feel there is no work of greater importance to us than Many of these Churches are struggling for life, and unless they can get it they will be entirely lost to us as a denomination.

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We, as a people, are giving more attention to the evil of intemperance than ever before. We believe the liquor traffic of our land to be the greatest curse we have to contend with. I think I speak the sentiments of our people when I say that the liquor traffic in our midst is the greatest foe that confronts the Church of God to-day. We are looking to our government for laws which shall prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors in our land.

Now, in closing my report, I ask the prayers of Free Christian Baptists of the New Brunswick Conference for God's blessing upon our State work. We hope to receive a messenger from your body to our next annual gathering. C. W. FOSTER.

S. L. Peters, Esq., Corresponding Secretary of the Executive for Sabbath Schools, submitted the following Report :

BROTHER MODERATOR :- The Committee on Sabbath Schools, in presenting their report for the information of this Conference, desire to express their sincere regret that it is not as complete as they think it should be, from the fact that we believe it ought to register the returns of every school in our Denomination in this Province. From unofficial sources we learn that there are quite a number of schools that have failed to so report. Still we are Yest to

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quite sure that all the obstacles which now appear in the way can, by persistant effort, be removed, and therefor we are hopeful.

We have tried to meet the wishes of Conference by compiling such information as we believed would enable you to have a full grasp of the condition and extent of our Sabbath School work.

Beginning with the First District we find two schools in operation, with a membership of 166 pupils. These schools are evergreen, and the fact that they report twenty souls converted is surely a good evidence as to the character of the work accomplished. Whether all or any of the other six churches in the district have schools we are not able to say, but from the fact that the district only reports one school for the years '86, '87 and '88, we feel that all have reported that have schools. Should our surmises be correct, it certainly presents a very inviting field of labor in this department of Christian work.

The Second District reports fifteen schools, with a total membership of 787. Two churches report no schools, leaving ten churces not heard from either by your Executive or the District Clerk with whom we communicated.

The Third District has reports from seven schools to its credit, with a total of 528 pupils enrolled. Six churches not heard from either through the District Meeting or by your Committee.

Returns from the Fourth District show eight schools in working order, with an enrolment of 487 pupils, leaving seven churches not heard from. Officialy your Committee are reasonably certain that more schools exist, and regret very much that we cannot give the facts and place them to the credit of the district.

The fifth District makes returns of nine schools, with a total of 312 pupils enrolled, leaving ten churches with no reports of schools. Application to the District Clerk failed to encourage the Committee to hope for additional reports.

The Sixth District returns twenty schools in operation, with a total membership of 920 pupils. Seven churches report no schools, leaving three churches not heard from. The report of the Norton Church School is included in the twenty referred to, but is not included in the tabulated statement, as it reached us too late to be inserted.

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his nite are The Seventh District sends reports from eleven schools, with a total membership of 1085. Two churches report no schools, while the church at North Head and Northern Harbour are not heard from.

Having thus presented the facts as briefly as we felt justified in doing, permit us to call your attention to a few points in connection therewith.

1st. We note with pleasure the very gratifying increase of

Sabbath School Literature in our schools. Turning to the Year Book of 1886, we find that out of 97 schools then reported, only 16 were using books. The present year 1890, 23 schools are using them; an increase of 44 p. c.

In 1886 only 6 schools used papers, in 1890, 12 schools; increase 100 p. c.

In 1886 only 16 were using both books and papers, this year 30; increase 114 p. c.

In 1886 only 22 schools were using the International Lessons, this year they are to be found in 51 of our schools; increase 132 p. c.

Again we find that of the 97 schools reported in 1886, only 16 were everygen. This year 29 are reported as everygen; increase 13, or 87 p. c.

Your Committee also note with much pleasure the large percentage of our schools that are cheered and encouraged by the presence of their pastor. When we take into consideration the large circuits in which many of our ministering brethren are called upon to labor, and the care of two or more Churches on the Sabbath, it is indeed cheering to find so large a percentage who can arrange to be present. We regret to say, however, that the attendance of our lay members is not so satisfactory. Is it, my Christian brother and sister, because we do not have as many lesiure moments on the Sabbath day as our ministers? many of whom travel many miles and attend their services. Clearly that is not the reason. Is it a fact that the duty of the lay members of our Churches is entirely discharged when the meeting is adjourned, which elected the Superintendent and Teachers of the school. Think you, our inactive brothers and sisters, (we will not say disinterested) that they do not need your presence and your prayers. Your votes, no doubt, placed them in those positions of trust and great responsibility. Is it fair to leave them to carry the burdens and discouragements alone? They are labouring to win souls to Christ, to extend the kingdom of our Lord, to point out the way in which the burden of sin may be removed, and hearts made to rejoice in Christ's overwhelming love. Surely this is the work of the whole Christian Church, and not of a select few. The cry comes up from ninety per cent. of our schools, we want more teachers, and greater support and encouragement from the members of our Church ! Shall this go unanswered ? Rally, Christian brothers and sisters, to the help of our Sabbath School workers. Gladden their hearts by your presence, your assistance and your counsels, and the dear Saviour will reward you.

There is just one other matter to which we desire to refer before we close this report.

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Ever since the organization of this Conference, sixty years ago,

it has stood pledged to the principles of total abstinence from all intoxicating drinks. Of the many religious bodies in this Province none has taken a more noble stand in defence of those principles.

Your Committee are unanimous in their opinion that this work should be extended in the direction of our Sabbath Schools, and so far as it may be possible to secure the active co-operation of all our schools in the furtherance of those principles.

To secure this co-operation we recommend that this Conference do cause to be prepared, suitable pledges, to be presented to each Sabbath School for signature by the officers, teachers and scholars of the school. Those pledges to be the property of the schools, and sufficiently ornamental to warrant them a place on the wall of the school room. We make this recommendation because we believe it to be consistent with our profession, and to throw around our young people a mantle of protection from the ravages of the liquor traffac.

This Conference has always recognized the great importance of Sabbath School work, and for the last twenty years have made it one of the distinctive features at its Annual Sessions. In conjunction with other evangelical denominations we have reason to feel encouraged at the progress being made.

Your Committee feel sure that they voice the sentiments of this Conference in extending a very hearty welcome to the members of the Prov. S. S. Association who are here present this evening. The great love of our dear Saviour has drawn many active Christiains to this field of labor, whose hearts go out to help all who can be brought within the reach of the Sabbath school circle. Through the efforts of this Association, New Brunswick has been brought in line with the great International System of Sabbath school efforts.

May we each obey the Master's call-"Go ye also into My vineyard."

The Conference having balloted, Bros. J. W. Clarke, G. A. Hartley, C. T. Phillips, J. McLeod, D. D., and William Peters were declared duly elected members of the Executive for the ensuing year.

Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., from the Committee on Temperance, submitted the following Report :

BROTHER MODERATOR: — The temperance reform moves on. Many and great obstacles are in its way—habit, prejudice, money, self-interest, political partyism—but in spite of all it is making progress. Each year marks decided advance. In every civilized land the fact is now recognized that the drink traffic is evil—a menace to the individual, the home and the community, and ought, at least, to be checked and limited. In our own country the conviction that it should be prohibited is steadily becoming stronger. There is an evident increasing impatience of halfmeasures, and the demand for radical treatment of the question is likely soon to be made, with an emphasis that cannot be mistaken nor denied.

The Free Baptist record on total abstinence and prohibition is without a flaw—at least so far as the deliverances of Conference are concerned. Long before other denoninations were dealing definitely with the question this Conference was doing so, incurring, doubtless, a degree of ill-will, but being faithful in the face of all prejudice and opposition.

The position of the denomination, declared in church covenant, by off repeated resolutions of Conference, from the pulpits, and in the organ of the body, is :--

(a) That every Free Baptist church member is a pledged total abstainer from intoxicants.

(b) That every member must give the help of his positive influence to the temperance reform, and further the movement for prohibitory legislation by every means in his power.

(c) That it is the duty of every Free Baptist Minister to give earnest advocacy from the pulpit and platform and in every way open to him, to temperance and prohibition.

(d) That moral sympathy and support, and the personal help and influence of all its members are pledged to officers of the law and others who are endeavouring to enforce the Canada Temperance Act.

(e) That it is the duty of all good men, rising above selfish and party considerations, to give their support only to such candidates for representative positions as guarantee, by their character and pledges, that they will advocate and support advanced temperance legislation.

We cannot claim that all the members of our churches, or even all who may at one time or another been members of this Conference, have been consistent with the temperance and prohibition principles of the denomination. But we do declare that all whose course has been inconsistent therewith are held to have antagonized by their course the often expressed and strongly affirmed convictions of this body, and to have thereby hindered its purpose, and we hereby affirm our convictions that whatever member of the Free Baptist Church does in any way aid in the use and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes is clearly out of line with the principles and practice of this Conference.

With the principles and plastice of and resolutions of the We reaffirm all previous declarations and resolutions of the Conference on this vastly important question, and pledge ourselves anew to the fullest sympathy with and the most earnest endeavour in behalf of every movement to overthrow and utterly destroy the drink traffic.

While we have nothing but words of cheer for the various temperance organizations which are doing such good service, we believe that it is especially the duty of the Church of Christ to be foremost in the crusade and unceasing in efforts for the removal of the great curse. The church that joins hands with the vile thing is doomed, and deservedly so; the church that makes any compromise with it—that takes its money, is silent about its abominable character, or courts and tolerates its friends—has fallen from her high position, trails her garments in the filth of sin, and puts Christ to shame in the presence of His enemies. The church, as the individual, that in any way, by any means, for any consideration, on any plea, obstructs or aids in obstructing the progress of temperance work or the enforcement of temperance laws, is an ally of is an its

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of the drink traffic, shares the responsibility of all its horrible doings, is guilty of grievous sin against God.

In political action we know no party as such. We are against any and every form of legalizing the deadly traffic; we desire its utter and absolute prohibition. And we are for whatever party or union of parties will soonest secure such prohibition. We do not advise our people to support this party or that party, but to support, irrespective of party, men who are out and out prohibitionists.

We want entire, absolute, eternal prohibition of the rum trade. If the Liberal Conservatives give it to us we will thank them; if the Liberals give it to us we will thank them; if the third party men give it to us we will thank them; if it comes by the best men of all parties working together we will bless their union. What we want is not the triumph of one party or another as such, but the triumph of Christian conscience in the delegalization and utter suppression of the hideous, hateful thing, which, established in our midst, makes such ghastly havoc.

Re-affirming, with all possible emphasis, the position taken by the Conference from year to year on this subject, we again declare that the attitude of the Free Baptists is that of uncompromising opposition to the drink traffic, to every form of its legalization, and to every politican or other person who gives it any support or countenance; and that we are pledged, in the most solemn manner, as a denomination and as individuals, to do everything in our power to secure prohibition.

Rev. G. A. Hartley, from the Committee on Education, submitted the following Report :

Report on Education.

In submitting the Annual Report on Education, your Committee is pleased to be able to say, that, a steadily increasing interest in this subject, and especially in higher and ministerial education, is showing itself amongst all classes of our people. One of the good results of our excellent public school system is seen in the growing thirst in our young people for advanced learning. There seems to be no good reason now why any child in this country should go without the advantages of a good common school education. Indeed, quite a per centage of our young people may, and should have the benefits of a Seminary course, though many may be unable to attend College or a Theological school. While we think it highly desirable that all the people should be educated, we think it quite as important that the whole of each pupil should be cultured. One fault in much of the education of these times, is its one-sidedness. It cares for the intellect but neglects the heart. The religious as well as the intellectual should be developed. Mere intellectual education cannot make a man better morally. As it is a matter of every-day observation, that intellectual culture and moral culture do not necessarily co-exist, your committee feels that we cannot too strongly emphasize the importance of educating our children in Christian schools and under christian influences. Attention should be

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eral ort: given to Bible study, and to those personal accomplishments so desirable in educated Christian people. There is nothing in the knowledge of classics, mathematics or chemistry, that can purify the heart or convert the vicious into the virtuous. The moral and religious in education is of the greatest importance. Any learning that leads along a path, at the end of which the soul misses God, or the study of any science that cuts loose from Jesus Christ, should be repudiated. Hence the great worth and the advantages of an institution conducted on Christian principles, and where the pupils can have all the comforts and influences of a Christian home, as they have in our own school, the Union Though not a Theological Baptist Seminary, at St. Martins. institution, it makes consecutive Bible study and moral culture so prominent in its work that it must commend itself to the confidence of all parents who value the moral and religious training of their children. Such schools are a need of this age, not for ministerial students only, but for all classes who desire a good and symmetrical education.

and symmetrical erucation. As no religious body can hope, in these days, to attain to any great degree of usefulness, without the assistance of liberal scholastic culture, we feel encouraged and believe the denomination is being strengthened by the accession to our ministry of some young men who have spent years at the schools in preparation for their life work. The outlook for the future is also brightened by knowing that a number of others are now taking the Seminary course at St. Martins, while one other young brother intends to leave home in a few days for London, England, where he expects to study in Spurgeon's College.

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Your Committee thinks that all young men who are looking towards the ministry amongst us, should be encouraged, and when neces ary should be helped in acquiring a liberal education, if at all possible, at least so far as our Seminary course provides. we admit that a young man of good natural endowments can educate himself, the question is, would this be right and best? Is it wise to allow such young men to take upon themselves such burdens ! If a young man takes time to carn the money needed to educate himself, it will require additional years to complete his studies, and just such years of a valuable life as the denomination cannot In every way it pays afford to lose from ministerial work. to assist worthy, needy students. May many of our young men of common sense, sound judgment and deep piety, hear the voice of the spirit in the chambers of their souls, calling them to the work of preaching the gospel of Christ, and may the men of means amongst us, as clearly hear the voice of God calling them to assist such young men through the schools.

Your Committee is pleased to be able to report so favourably of the Union Baptist Seminary. The work done last year is highly satisfactory. The school more than paid its own expenses. All the students of last year who are attending school any where this year are back to St. Martins.

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The experiences of the school have satisfied its friends that coeducation can be successfully carried on. Not a single case occurred during the year, giving the least trouble between the young men of one end of the bullding and the young women of the other end. There are now more than a hundred pupils in attendance, with others to come soon.

The only drawback to the prosperity of this school is the financial burden it carries. The balance of the construction debt is quite large; too heavy to be allowed to longer rest upon the shoulders of a few faithful friends of the institution. An appeal has been issued by the Board of Directors, to the Churches of the denominations owning the property, asking that an amount equal to one dollar from each member be raised. This would pay the whole indebtedness and at once relieve the burdened Directors.

Your Committee desires to urge the consideration of this appeal, and hopes this Conference may be able to devise some way by which our churches can be reached and this amount secured. We hope our people may soon get the weight of this matter on their hearts, and that there may be found amongst us those who will soon give donations towards the liquidation of this debt worthy of the denomination.

We would strongly urge our people to patronise the only Seminary in which we have any denominational interest. Free Baptists should, by all means, when sending their children to a boarding school, send them to St. Martins.

sions, submitted the following Report:

Home Mission Report.

BROTHER MODERATOR - An appeal was made at our last General Conference in behalf of our Home Mission interests which, I am glad to say, met with a hearty and most generous response. A number of the members of our Churches attending the General Conference, feeling the importance of Home Missions, pledged their several Churches to amounts that in the aggregate reached the sum of five hundred dollars, thus placing at the disposal of your Executive a larger amount of money than in previous years, enabling them to assist a much larger number of Churches, by giving them mission labour, or assisting them in sustaining pas-

No less than thirty Churches and preaching stations have, durtoral oversight. ing the past year, been assisted in maintaining regular preaching for the whole or part of the time. Prayer and Conference meetings that had gone down, have been re-established and kept up. The ordinances have been administered, while Sabbath School interests, and house to house visitation have been carefully looked

The First District has, for years past, been the least able, from after. the weak and scattered state of the churches, to maintain stated ministerial labor. Your Executive was able last year to report a marked improvement in the spiritual condition of this District. Under the faithful and efficient labours of Rev. J. J. Barnes, many of these weak interests have become almost self sustaining, and there are gratifying evidences of continued growth and enlargement. The outlook was so favorable that your Executive deemed it advisable to put one of our young men on that District for the entire year, to assist Bro. Barnes in supplying its spiritual need. Licentiate Frank A. Currier was chosen for that mission, and he has labored the whole year, principally with the churches on the Tobique River. His labors have been highly appreciated and gladly received. His preaching stations were Arthurette, Reed Settlement, Long Island, Foster's Cove, and other settlements on the River. He reports to the Executive having made

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six hundred and sixty-three pastoral calls, preached one hundred and twenty-two times, attended fifty-two prayer and conference meetings, and collected for the mission \$160.20. We are glad to report that this District is looking up, and bids fair, in the near future, not only to be self-sustaining but in a position to help others. The amount raised by the Churches in this District for the year was supplemented by a grant of two hundred dollars from your Executive, to enable Bros. Barnes and Currier to spend all their time in building it up. Under their labour forty-three were baptized, and seventy added to the Churches.

The Churches at Geary, Victoria, Waterville, and Gagetown, were assisted in re- taining the services of Rev. John Henderson, whose labor among them was timely and profitable.

Rev. John A. Robertson and Licentiate Lemuel Cosman, under the direction of the Executive, formed a circuit of the Churches in Kars, Kingston, Jerusalem, Oak Point, Hamilton Mountain, and Brown's Flat; engaging to supply stated labour to them for the entire year. As they were unable to give these brethren sufficient support the Executive made them a grant of fifty dollars. They have been helped and encouraged, and some of them have been blessed with conversions and additions.

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Rev. J. N. Barnes was granted fifty dollars to expend in labour among our Churches in Kings County. He labored regularly among our weaker interests, greatly to their encouragement and profit.

Licentiate Rogers was employed by the Board for two months during his vacation. He labored acceptably at Gagetown, and with other Churches in Queens.

Rev. John Perry spent the year with the Churches on Campobello Island, and your Executive made those Churches a grant of fifty dollars to enable them to retain his labours. Bro. Perry's labours were pleasant to him, and of profit to the Churches.

In consequence of deaths, removals, and schism, a number of the Churches on Grand Manan Island had become weakened and discouraged, and your Executive deemed it advisable to make a grant of one hundred dollars, to enable them to secure the labour of Rev. T. O. DeWitt for the past year. Bro. DeWitt has labored faithfully, making a circuit of the Island, and his labor has been blessed of God. A goodly number have professed faith in Christ and followed Him in his ordinance, and others are only awaiting Bro. DeWitt's return to do likewise.

The Church at Beaver Harbour, assisted by your Executive, engaged the services of Rev. C. F. Rideout, who remained with them part of the year, when Rev. F. Babcock was sent by the Board to remain with them until Conference.

The work of your Executive has been, for the most part during the year, extending aid to the Churches and pastorates to ensure them stated preaching and constant care. They feel assured that the grants made have been wisely and economically appropriated, and of incalculable benefit and encouragement to struggling inter-In some instances the salvation of the very life of the ests. Church has depended upon the small assistance afforded.

We close the year's work with devout thanksgiving to Almighty God that we have been enabled to extend help to so many Churches. But we are constantly reminded by the Macedonian cry that salutes our ears, " Come over and help us," and the bending heads of the ripened grain that we see covering the fields on every side, that our work is not yet done, scarcely commenced. If we would gather in this harvest for God and our denomination, we must not relax our effort nor hold our hand. We ardently hope the enthusiasm of last year will be intensified in this, and more will be accomplished for our home work than ever before. An appeal was made by your Executive to the Churches, and sent in circular form to Churches, Ministers and Officers, urging the claims of the Home Mission interests upon the prayerful consideration of all, and asking for contributions. Some of the Churches responded promptly and generously, making our hearts glad with words of comfort and cheer ; but others, and far too many, failed to allow the appeal to impress them, and made no response. Some, it may be through simple neglect, put the matter off, until the appeal and its claims were forgotten.

Your Executive would like to press, with renewed emphasis, the declaration of last year, that there was never a time in our denominational history when it was more necessary to give special aid and careful attention to our Home Mission work than now. While we are expending thousands in Foreign Mission workand God forbid it should ever be less-we should at least spend one thousand dollars this year to build up our struggling interests God has committed to us this work, and we should as. sume the responsibility cheerfully, and do it. As the Executive expressed it in their appeal, "We should do this work for the sake of the cause which is so dear to us all, and to which we owe so much & do it for the strengthening of the interests now in our charge, and for the perpetuation of principles and experiences which we cherish; do it for the blessing of those who, if not reached and helped by us, will be wholly uncared for; do it for Jesus' sake, whose we are, and whom we love and serve."

Foreign Mission Report.

BROTHER MODERATOR: — This year has been one of marked Christian activity, and of corresponding progress in Christian evangelization. Every branch of the Church of Christ is, in a fair degree, alive to the importance of pushing the Kingdom. Never was there so general and hearty obedience to the commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," as now. "Thy Kingdom come" is the fervent prayer of more hearts more men are saying "Here am I, Lord, send me,"

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a a a a a a s l e r and more money is consecrated to Christ's work in the world than ever before.

Reports from every part of the Mission field are most cheering, and give promise that soon, very soon, will come the time when "great voices in Heaven" shall say, "the kingdoms of this world are become the Kingdoms of our Lord, and of His Christ, and He shall reign forever and ever."

From the part of the Mission field occupied by Free Baptists, encouraging accounts are received.

The report for the last year says that when all the facts about the work done and progress made are examined, the most appropriate expression is that of the Psalmist, "Praise the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me bless His holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul; and forget not all His benefits." It con-

"The hand of the Lord has been good upon us. There has been a healthy growth in nearly all the churches. Many of the native brethren have found a new meaning to the Christian life, and are entering into more joyous and efficient service."

One of the good signs is the spirit of evangelism amongst the native Christians. The report says : "For some time the native churches have been considering the matter of the support of a Home Missionary. They began to collect money, and to pray to God to raise up a man for the work. This He has done in one of the native preachers. This brother had often said, before the movement among the churches began, that he felt that the Lord was calling him to be an evangelist. Now he has resigned his salary under the Mission Board and has become the evangelist of the churches on one half his former salary. Wherever he has visited the churches they have received a blessing. This is one of the most encouraging things in connection with the year's work. India is to be evangelized by native agents, and it is a joy to see them rising to meet the needs of their fellow countrymen." Another cause for thankfulness mentioned in the report is "the increasing interest of the home churches in the India work." The inspiration of home sympathy and prayers is felt, and gives strength and courage to the far-away workers. They hope that the day may soon come when individual churches in America will have branch churches in India. Their confidence of the success of their work is expressed thus :-- "All the promises of God are ours, and we firmly believe that He will not fail us, nor forsake us; and that this whole field is to be filled with His wor-

It is gratifying to know that the missionaries who represent this Conference in the India field have been in good health during the year, and have been abundant in labors which have been largely blessed of God. The report of Mr. Boyer is appended.

The Executive regrets to inform the Conference that the amountasked of the churches for the year's work has not been received. The Treasurer's report shows the exact amount of the deficit.

We cannot afford to permit the work to suffer from lack of money. What we have undertaken to do is not more than we are able. Indeed the amount asked of the churches for the year is much less than we think they should devote to this branch of The denomination has, in round numbers, 11,000 comwork. municants. Is what we have undertaken an adequate expression of our love for Him "whose we are and whom we serve," and of our concern for His Kingdom ? Our missionary enterprise and zeal should steadily enlarge. Undertaking less than we ought, we do less that we set for ourselves. And may not this smallness of venture, indicating small faith and lack of consecration, account for feeble home activities and the consequent meagre God calls His people to the largest and best possible results. He calls us. Obedience to His call is our life. service.

The Executive desires to urge upon the Conference the importance of :

(1) Carrying out the plan by which the amount to be raised (\$1200) is apportioned to the Districts, and by them apportioned to the churches.

(2) Of sermons on missions, at least quarterly.

(3) Of monthly missionary prayer meetings in the churches.

(4) Of the distribution of mission literature and information concerning the great work.

(5) Of frequent and systematic solicitation of contributions in all the communities.

God has made it obligatory upon man to keep this day holy, and every person who does unnecessary work, neglects to attend a place of worship when in his power, practices social visiting, pleasure seeking, or any kind of amusement in thought, word or deed, or transacts any manner of business, is a violator of this divine command.

2. Your Committee regret that no more regard has been paid by our people to the oft repeated recommendation of this body, 4 that the burial of the dead be, so far as possible, avoided on the Sabbath day, as it often involves much labor, and also very great inconvenience to ministers and the people of their charges.

3. Your Committee most gratefully acknowledge the existence of stringent law in regard to the observance of the Sabbath, but deeply regret that in some instances this law is not more vigorously enforced.

4. Your Committee also believe the running of trains on the Sabbath is in a great measure unnecessary, and would suggest that this Conference endeavour to exert its influence to have it done away with as far as possible, and would urge upon all christians the importance of not patronizing such trains except in cases of the most urgent necessity. We believe, in most cases, the running of Sabbath trains can be avoided, and is a direct vielation of the command: "Thou shalt remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy."

We furthermore believe that the running of trains on the Sabbath is a great injustice to the employees of the Government and company railways, and is a plain breach of the commandment: "Thou shalt do no manner of work on the Sabbath day, thou, thy son nor thy daughter, thy manservant nor thy maidservant, nor the stranger within thy gate."

DEAR BRETHREN :—A telephone received late last week informed me that I was chairman of a deputation from the late Baptist Convention at Yarmouth to your Conference, but the state of my health would not admit of my going in persen, and the telephone came too late for me to consult my colleagues. I must therefore be personally responsible for what I have to say. I have much pleasure in sending you the hearty greetings of the Convention, and hope your Conference will be one of great interest.

The desire on our part for organic union is undiminished. 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

Report of the Corresponding Secretary of The Woman's Mission Society.

MRS. PRESIDENT AND SISTERS :-- Another year has passed, and it becomes my duty to lay before you my Annual Report. As we review the past we are led to exclaim : What hath God wrought ? Fifteen years ago this Society was organized in this place. With 6 fear and trembling our Sisters began this work, believing they were divinely called to it. While some were sanguine for us, others looked doubtingly on ; but God has been graciously pleased to own our work, and the little one has grown to be a thousand. We have now seventy-seven Societies or regular contributing churches; a District Society in every District, and, as I said last year, we every year get nearer our ideal-a Society in every Church in our Denomination. During these years our Society has raised over nine thousand five hundred dollars. In the field we have a Missionary equipped for the work, a native preacher, Bible women, and schools, all doing work of which only eternity will reveal the results. And while we sometimes have things that seem to hinder and discourage, yet we feel like rejoicing that we have been permitted to accomplish what we have. We are gratified to-day to have our dear Sister Heine-our first President -with us, while sadness fills our hearts that our dear friend and sister, Mrs. E. M. Keirstead, who was the first Secretary, is passing away, leaving the Church militant to join the Church triumphant. How many who then took a deep interest in this work, have gone before.

> "Part of the host have crossed the flood, And part are crossing now."

Does it not become us then, to be in earnest, and have our work well done? For it will soon be said of us, they too have gone. Our work, under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Boyer, has been faithfully done. Basudeb is still at the Bible School. Our na tive preacher, Daniel Naik, is doing well. Mrs. Boyer says: "Danny is improving greatly, and is doing a great deal of good. He is a man of excellent judgment, and always at his work." The Bible women, under Mrs. Boyer, are efficient workers. Will give you directly extracts from their reports. Of Miss Hooper's work I need not speak, as I have a full and complete report from her appended.

While the past year may not have been as successful as some years, yet we are not discouraged. If God is for us—and He assuredly is—who can be against us?

MRS. M. FENWICK, Auditor. Millstream, N. E., October 6, 1890.

Mrs. March, representing the B. W. M. Society, being present, was called upon, and listened to with much interest while she gave a brief report of the rise and progress of their missionary interest in India, embracing a period of twenty years. Eight women have been sent out during that time, and though some of them have married since going out there, they are none the less missionaries, and are doing a great work for the Master. She said that the Woman's Society had helped to do all the work that had been done for the Telugus. \$53,000 have been raised during that period by the women. Six years ago the societies were united under their present name. This year they have pledged themselves to raise \$5,000 for Foreign and \$1,000 for Home Missions. She advised personal canvass by the sisters, and said that that was the only way to success. She said that if 52 missionaries should be sent to the Telugus, that there would be 50,000 souls for each to bring into the kingdom.

Rev. Wm. Miller, speaking for the N. S. Women's Society, told us, among other interesting things, that they had been educating two prospective missionaries, but unfortunately they failed to pass the required examination in the matter of health. He spoke encouragingly, and was listened to with much pleasure.

Music followed while the collection was being taken, Mrs. Whitfield McLeod kindly presided at the organ.

Mrs. C. W. Weyman read Mrs. Boyer's report, and a Letter from Mrs. Boyer's native Bible woman, also Miss Hooper's Report, as follows:

Mrs. Boyer's Report.

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS :-- The two Bible Women, supported by the N. B. Woman's Society, have been at work during the entire year. They report monthly the number of hearers, the villages visited, and the subjects of their reading and conversation. They are usually welcomed, but occasionally women say that they have no time to listen.

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In February of this year I took charge of the seven Hindoo Girls' School, formerly superintended by Miss Ida Phillips. The girls in this school take the course of study prescribed by Government, and in addition the study of the Bible and Catechism. There are twelve teachers, and nine female servants, whose duty it is to go to and from school with the girls, keep the house clean, etc. Of the twelve teachers seven are Christian women. The enrollment is nearly three hundred, mostly Hindoos, but also a few Mohammedans. The schools are supported by Government and municipal aid here, and by an appropriation from the Women's Board. The cost is about 100rs. per month, or about \$35.

The children can only attend School a few years, on account of their marriage customs; but during that time they are able to get sufficient knowledge of the True Way to convince them of the foolishness of idolatry. They are always particularly interested in the Bible lessons, and their questions and answers are to me the pleasantest part of the school work. I must not close this June of this year among our native Christians. Never in the histhe other stations too the good work has been going on. Already many have been added to the Churches, both from the Christian community and from Hindooism.

Letter from Mrs. Boyer's Bible Woman.

My DEAR :-- By the mercy of God, and through your prayers, I am well and happy, and I hope you are likewise. The Omniscient God knows all these things. We do not know each other, but Mrs. Boyer has many times told me about you, and has probably told you about me. Be that as it may, I am writing this that we may become acquainted. I am getting assistance from you for the work I am doing in God's name. It would be well indeed if you were here to see it. Although you are far away from me, and I am not doing this work in your sight, I am doing it in the sight of God. But what can I tell you about my work ? Mrs. Boyer has probably told you all about it. Accept my nomascars, and pray that I may do the work faithfully, that the Kingdom of God may increase among the women, and that many may believe in Jesus, like Lydia of Phillipi. My family send you their nomascars. My husband is pastor of the Balasore Church. His name is Joseph Fullonton. You may have seen his name in the Annual Report. I have one daughter and five The daughter is married. The eldest son, Ragani, is attending the English Government School. Gereesh, Soteesh, and Oteesh attend the Mission School, while the youngest, Akehya, has not gone to school yet. Will you pray for them that they, having reached manhood, and having learned to read and write,

MY DEAR SISTERS:—These statistics have been placed at the top to give you a compact idea of the work. The results are not all we could wish. In some respects the numbers are comparatively less than last year. This is due to my absence from Balasore for several months. Yet tears of joy and thankfulness fill my eyes to-day as I try to tell you of the experiences and work of the past year. Surely it has been crowned "with lovingkindness and tender mercies." The "crooked" has been made "straight," and the "rough places plain"; so my song is, " Bless the Lord O my soul." Last year my report to you was from the old Zenana house, where I had been carried so ill in March; this year from "Elim Cottage," the home you have so generously provided.

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Part of October and all of November and December was spent away from Balasore, sharing with Dr. Bachelor, senior, and dear "Auntie" a home in Darjecling, feasting eye and heart on the grandeur of the Himalays, and drinking in the frosty life-giving We got home in January, just in time to have the pleasure air. of helping entertain members of the Yearly Meeting. After Y. M., we found the house needed immediate repairs. The beams overhead were so eaten by white ants they were in danger of falling. There was no alternative; the beams had to be replaced by Work moves slowly in India, so for months we were new ones. in the midst of lime dust, the noise of hammering, and confusion indescribable to one who knows nothing of Indian houses. These details are given so that you may know that much of the work of the year, though really necessary, was not direct missionary work.

Of the four schools, Swaraswatepur, Chunpur, Janquinj, and

Brahmoonia, Janquinj is the most discouraging. For this school and Swaraswatepur a monthly grant of rupees five each is received from the District Board. The head man of the village of Janquinj is a bigoted Brahmin. He objects to the religious teaching in the school, and misrepresents matters to the District Board, and secretly maintains a steady persecution. The school and the grant would have been given up long ago were it not for the pleading faces of the little girls. "They are only girls," so what does it matter to their Hindoo parents whether they are taught

At Brahmoonia the people have built a school house. They seem greatly interested in the work. The old man in whose house the school was begun has died. I believe his faith was in our Saviour. He told me he had often heard the Gospel, and be-

At Chunpur—till we went there—no little girls had ever been taught to read. They ran from me screaming with fear when they first saw me. They had not till then seen a white face. The little ones now really give the most ready answers from the catechism, which is tanght in all the schools, and which tells the simple plan of salvation.

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Swaraswatepur always strengthens my faith, when all else seems to weaken and try it. In the house where the school has been taught, the shadow of death has again fallen heavily this year. Many times the fear has come to my heart that they would feel, as Hindoos always do, the gods were visiting them in anger for allowing their little girls to be taught.

The old man who made the pilgrimage to Gya has entered into He rallied, but never fully recovered from the effects of rest. the pilgrimage. Never did we go there but he drank in eagerly every word we said about Jesus; when leaving, it was "Come again soon. I want so much to go to your house, but I am too weak to walk." This old man's son, (Boodhi's father,) is now the head of the house, and of the large family. An incident which occurred there the other day, will serve to illustrate how God's love and Providence have proven better to us than our fears. We waded through mud and water to the village to see about either renting a house or building one for the school. The verandah of the court-yard where the school has been held so long was needed to shelter cows. Boodhi's father met us; this is what he said : "I will give you land on which to build ; or, I will rent my 'thakoor ghor.'" We went to the idol house and saw the boy priest ministering to the idols. Listen to the language of the owner of the house : " I shall not keep this priest and his idols any longer ; for two years I have fed and clothed him, and given

him two rupees per month, to attend on these idols, and what good has come of it?" "Kitchie nie!" (Nothing.) "My father has died; my brother and my sister-in-law, and such a lot of trouble has come to us." That very day the idols were sent away, openings were cut in the walls to let in light and air, and now, instead of silly mutterings over dumb idols, the mud walls re-echo to the songs of praise sung by the children to the one true God. The little Brahmin priest, a boy of about ten or twelve, is a pupil in the school. I am caring for him, and although he has been warned by a number of Hindoos not to "go near her, she will make a Christian of you," he comes often. Gently but surely we hope to lead him to Jesus. Pray for him. His name is "Dovitari."

Boodhi, (of whom you know), is to teach the women, in her Zenana home, to read. Thus has the "cloud" we dreaded been "big with mercy."

In the Bible work we have had steady encouragements. A little persecution and opposition would no doubt show the true results. Four women have been employed—Uma, Kokoi, Gelha, and Suni. For several weeks Kokoi has been unable to leave her home, her children having been stricken with a bad type of fever, which prevails in the Christian village. A little babe has also come for her to care for; so it will be some weeks longer before she will be able to attend to Bible work. Gelha is a quiet, Christian worker. She now goes with Uma. Suni is too timid to go to many places alone, so until Kokoi can go with her, I take her under my especial care. She is a good woman, and helpful.

James Singh, (Gelha's son) a young man of irreproachable character, and a quiet Christian, is employed as a Catechist. He is a great help in going to the schools just now, when the water is too high for me to cross the rice fields. He also attends the bazars and markets to sell books and talk with the people about Jesus. James has just come in with a beaming face, to tell me that Janquinj school is in a better condition to-day. The teacher seems in earnest about his work, and the little ones very attentive to the religious teaching, and so pleased with the picture story. The large Scripture pictures sent by Fredericton Sabbath School are such a help in all our work.

How much we should like to be able to tell you of so many hundreds of conversions this year, and of many baptisms, as the result of our work. This is the trying part of woman's work, so much of it is hidden in the zenanas of the better class and in the huts of the poor. We can only rest on the Word, "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." Deseaso

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REPORT OF REV. A. B. BOYER, To the F.C. B. Foreign Mission Executive for 1889-90.

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DEAR BRETHREN: — I herewith hand you the report of my work for 1889-90. That God has kept us in a good degree of health during the year, and has blessed our work, is reason for deerout thankfulness to Him. We have to confess with sorrow that we have not seen thousands converted, as we would like to have seen, but notwithstanding this, the last year has been one of the best, if not the best, in the history of missions. During the last six months only, nearly fifty people have been baptized, the majority of whom are from the heathen. One of this year's converts, Lakeman C. Panda, was a Brahman preacher of this place, but is now preaching Christ. His conversion has given us a good deal of notice and persecution, which I trust may result in good.

Ganga Dhara Rath, the converted Brahman, whom I mentioned in last year's report, is still at Bible School, and is said by the Principal to be getting on well. Basudeb Singh and Natoo Singh are also there. We hope that in time these boys will be useful workers for the Master.

Last year I employed some laymen, who, though unable to preach, can talk and distribute books. I call them catechists. A catechist has just now brought a man who wishes to be a Christian. He is on the veranda now waiting for me.

My bazaar and village preaching have been carried on as usual and with good results. Last week I was at Singla, a place in the country, 24 miles from Balasore. Most of the people there were glad to hear the good news, but some of the older people objected that it would be wrong for them to leave the way of their ancestors. At that place I stayed in a native mud hut for seven days, with a horse and two oxen in the next room, and no door between. At this place one of my catechists, Bisu Dass, is stationed.

We have disposed of a great many books during the year, largely owing to the financial help we have received from "Alpha,"

One feature of my work during the year has been an effort to enlist the Christian young men as workers without pay. We have a society something like the Christian Endeavor Societies of America. Some of the boys carry on Hindu Sunday Schools, and others distribute tracts and books This seems to me like a

very hopeful work. One of the prettiest sights I ever saw was a Christian lad teaching Hindu boys about Christ in a Sunday School he had established in a heathen village.

The Balasore Christian S. S. is still in my hands. It has 250 on the roll, and an average attendance of 180. It contributes four rupees (\$1.50) a month to the support of a native evangelist. I have been appointed to prepare S. S. lesson leaves in Oriya for the S. Schools in this district. This takes up some of my time, but it is not an unpleasant task, and very helpful to the schools. I am glad to be able to report that although Bessie was so ill last year, she is so much better now that we have abandoned, at least for the present, the idea of sending her home. Our second daughter, Aurilla, is not well, but we are hoping that the vacation trip we are about to take to Burma will be of much benefit to her. This vacation trip is taken under the sanction of the Indian Committee, and will be the first we have had in our four years stay in India.

We still believe that God called us to India, and that he is pre-We ask for your prayers paring us for better work in the future. that God may bless our work abundantly.

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APPENDIX D.

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THE BASIS OF UNION.

DOCTRINAL STATEMENTS.

THE SCRIPTURES.—The Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments have their authority from God alone, and are given to us by divine inspiration. They are a perfect, supreme, infallible and sufficient standard of faith and practice.

Gon.—There is one true and living God. He is an Infinite Spirit, self-existent, omnipresent, omniscient, omnipotent, good, wise, just, and merciful; He is the creator, preserver, and sovereign of the universe; He is inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all honor, confidence and love. In the Godhead there are three persons in one—The Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, who are equal in every divine perfection, and who execute distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

CHRIST.—Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is the person of the Trinity, who, by virtue of his sacrificial work, is the world's Redeemer, and the Savior of all that believe. He is at present the intercessor of his people at the right hand of the Father, and is to be the judge of all men.

THE HOLY SPIRIT.—The Holy Spirit is the person of the Trinity, by whom all saving, comforting and sanctifying power is exerted upon human hearts.

STATE AND FALL OF MAN.—Man was created sinless. By his own disobedience he fell into sin. Through his fall into sin, an evil nature was transmitted to the whole race, revealing itself in actual transgression, and bringing all under the reign of condemnation and death.

ATONEMENT.—The perfect life, the vicarious death, and the resurrection of Jesus Christ, have removed the obstacles in the way of the Holy Spirit's regenerating power and of the Father's forgiving grace being extended to the sinner, and constitute for every believing soul an all-prevailing plea and sufficient ground for righteousness before God.

REGENERATION.—In regeneration a new life principle is begotten in the soul of man by the Holy Spirit. through the Word of Truth, producing a disposition to joyful obedience to Christ and to holy conduct in life.

REPENTANCE.—In repentance, the sinner, having seen his sin, being moved by the energy of the Holy Ghost, is led to grieve for, and hate it as an offence against God, and, apprehending the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, he lovingly returns to God to walk in the way of His commandments.

FAITH.—Faith is a conviction of the intellect that God will perform all that He has promised, and an implicit trust of the heart in Christ as a personal Saviour. It includes a hearty concurrence of the will and affections with the whole plan of Salvation as revealed in the Gospel, and is a condition of justification and of cleansing from the pollution of sin, and of all subsequent Gospel blessings.

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JUSTIFICATION.—Justification is an act of God, wherein He accepts as righteous the sinner, to whom is imputed the perfect righteousness of Christ, on the condition of faith alone.

PERSEVERANCE.—We believe that persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes real Christians from superficial professors. If any who have been born of God, altogether lose the grace received at regeneration, there is for them no renewal unto eternal life.

This does not mean, however, that the regenerate may not become backsliders.

SANCTIFICATION.—The Scriptures teach that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, Christians are made partakers of His holiness; that it has its beginning in regeneration, and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, in the continual use of the appointed means—the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH.—We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day or Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public, and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

A GOSPEL CHURCH.—We believe that a Church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by His laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that the only scriptural officers of a church are Bishops, or Pastors, and Deecons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus. In a more general sense, the word church is used to designate all whose names are written in the Lamb's Book of Life.

BAPTISM.—This is the immersion of believers in water, into the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, in which are represented their death to the world, the washing of their souls from the pollutions of sin, their resurrection to newness of life, the burial and resurrection of Christ, their resurrection at the last day, and their engagement to serve God. vill onvaion ent

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o the eprefrom , the e last THE LORD'S SUPPER is designed to commemorate the sufferings of Christ, and to represent in the use of bread and wine the communion which saints have with Him and with each other. Every baptized believer in Christ, being a member of His body, and a part of His visible Church, has not only a right to partake of the emblems of His body and His blood in 'the Communion, but is under obligation thus to commemorate His death.

DEATH.—At death our bodies return to dust, our souls to God who gave them. The righteous, being then perfected in happiness, are received to dwell with God, waiting the full redemption of their bodies. The wicked are cast into Hades, reserved unto the judgment of the great day.

RESURRECTION.—There will be a general resurrection of the bodies of the just and of the unjust ; the righteous in the likeness of Christ, but the wicked to shame and everlasting contempt.

GENERAL JUDGMENT.—There will be a judgment of quick and dead, of the just and unjust, on principles of righteousness, by our Lord Jcsus Christ, at His second coming. The wicked will be condemned to eternal punishment, and the righteous received into the fulness of eternal life and joy.

CHURCH POLITY.—Article I. The voluntary principle underlies the whole church polity of the New Testament. Each Church is independent, but the Churches are interdependent. All the power the more general bodies have over the less general and the individual Churches is to advise, and to enforce advice with the strongest moral motives. In case a Church, or the Churches composing a less general body, depart from the belief and practice of the denomination, it shall be the right of the more general body to Article W

Article II.—Each Church, as occasion may require, shall have the right to appeal to the more general body for the help of their advice and moral influence, of to call a council from other Churches. If a Church, torn by dissensions and heresy, decline to seek assistance of this kind, it is the right of the more general body to send a delegation to assist the Church as far as this may

Article III.—Any Church should be very careful in granting a license to preach. Every license, to be valid, must be signed by the Pastor and Clerk of the Church granting it, and countersigned by at least two neighboring Pastors, after an examination of the candidate's qualifications.

Article IV.—When a Church desires the ordination of a brother, a council from as many of the nearest Churches as will secure the attendance of at least five ordained Pastors, with a suitable number of laymen, may be called, or the more general body be requested to attend to the matter.

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
