GERMANS IN AFRICA ACKNOWLEDGE THE KING.

Get to Work for Coronation Celebration to Dispel Impressions Made by Their Pro-Boer Attitude.

Johannesburg, June 21.—Considerable significance is attached to the action of the German community here, hitherto pro-Boer in electing a committee composed of the most prominent Germans to assist in preparing for the coronation celebration. The Germans have published a declaration to the effect that they are determined to dispel whatever unfavorable impression was created among their fellow-citizens by the "exaggeration of the misgivings and misinformation of Germany" and also acknowledging British sovereignty, which, whether they like or not, means personal freedom for everybody.

At first it was thought to be from the Haronian, but the date, April 22, 1902, would not be early enough—Clark's Harbor Coast-guard.

He had been a deacon of the Corn Hill Free Baptist church for many years and took an active part in progressive movements and will be much missed by a widely extended acquaintance.

There are 3,100 Sabbath schools, an increase of 115 in the year, 21,717 teachers, 182,833 scholars, an increase of 636.

There was a serious falling off last year in the members connected with the Christian Endeavor society and a special interest in young people's societies is being taken by a committee of the assembly.

The combined circulation of the eight Sabbath school publications, is 173,377, a great increase.
