### FIRST GUN ASSURED FROM CAMPBELLTON

**Over One Thousand Dollars Has Been Subscribed to Machine Gun Fund**

Subscriptions to the Machine Gun Fund are still coming in, the amount now standing over one thousand dollars and much more has yet to come in. There seems little doubt that two guns will be given by subscription and private gifts will also probably give guns, so that there is almost a surety that six guns will be sent from Restigouche County. In addition to the list printed below we are informed that the employees of Miller's Mill will give a day's pay to the fund which will average about \$150.

The master of contributing a machine gun from Dalhousie was brought up at the Town Council meeting there last evening, and interviewing Mayor Montgomery, the Graphic was informed that the question was talked over at the meeting, but action was deferred until a full meeting of the board was held. Mayor Montgomery said there was little doubt but that a gun would be sent from Dalhousie, the matter of collection being looked into by the Council and interested parties.

### LETTER RECEIVED FROM MAJ. ANDERSON

**Mrs. Ferguson Receives Word of Her Son Byron, From Commander of Battery**

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Steven Ferguson from Major Anderson in regard to injuries received by her son Byron.

24-7-15

Dear Mrs. Ferguson:—  
I have been making a number of inquiries. Your son, B. W. Ferguson was a valued member of my battery. At Festubert where we went after leaving Ypres, he was not feeling well, he had symptoms of fever. But as he had been inoculated, we did not expect anything serious. But I had him reported to the doctor and asked the doctor to send him to a hospital if he was not up to the mark, as a change and good clean place would help him as much as anything.

He was sent to a hospital in company with another man who was also sick. On their way to hospital your son was hit by a piece of shell that exploded near them. (The German's like to shell roads). When reported to me, it was his arm that received the blow, but since he was taken to England I have not had the opportunity of finding out the exact details. He lost the use of his arm, but the force of the blow is so great that those big shells that the same piece that hit his arm, might also break a rib.

I am going to tell you one incident of your son's at Ypres during one of the fiercest attacks made by the Germans.

I was using your son as a messenger to carry messages from me to the Brigade (Colonel) and from Brigade here. He had to go back and forth, on foot as it was only a mile across the field or perhaps not more than 1000 yards the way he went. Three of them were under an awful shell fire by the enemy. Ferguson came back with a message for me, his coat was spotted with blood and he looked awfully bad. I asked him what the trouble was, if he was wounded. He said he did not know, three of them had started out with messages for their respective batteries, a shell burst over them, the other two were killed and he was knocked over. I told him to lie down on a blanket and rest and not to think of his sight he saw. He lay down but such suffering. He moaned and talked and got up and down, but the next day he was as good as ever.

He was good stuff and I was glad to have him as a member of the battery. He was one of the Headquarters Party and I therefore saw a lot of him. As soon as I can find out just how he is I will let you know.

There is one thing that you can be assured of, and that is that your son has done his share of duty in this terrible war.

### Young Girl Dies at Camp From the Accidental Discharge of Shot Gun

The young daughter of John Lavoie of Chandler died in the Hotel Dieu Hospital as a result of an accident at Chandler on Tuesday evening. From meagre information received, it appears that Mr. Lavoie had been visiting a neighbors house with his little girl eleven years old. A man about the place was preparing to go to the woods and had a shot gun loaded in his possession. During the evening this man's wife called him to do some errand for her and he stood the gun against the kitchen wall. While he was away the weapon either fell or was knocked to the floor, causing the gun to discharge the full charge of shot entering the little girls left leg. Medical aid was summoned, but it was thought better to remove her to the hospital here, which was done last evening, being brought up to town on Wednesday's train. The wound was a serious one, the bone being shattered and it was considered advisable to amputate the limb. Unfortunately the little one did not survive the operation and died at the hospital this morning.

## FERGUSON'S

### HAVE RETURNED FROM GOOD MUSICAL TOUR

At the several places visited in the counties of Bonaventure and Gaspé, the young ladies were particularly well received, in all giving seven secular concerts during their trip. In addition to the above the ladies gave three sacred concerts in aid of the Red Cross Funds; the proceeds of these amounting to \$60. This amount has been apportioned as follows: Campbellton, \$23.00; New Carlisle, \$13.00; Gaspé \$12.00; and Cape Cove, \$12.00.

We understand Miss DeCorrevont and Miss Ferguson will give a sacred concert in Matapedia Presbyterian Church on Sunday evening the 15th inst. at 8 p. m., when a silver collection will be taken for Red Cross purposes.

### GREAT CHANGE IN ARMY REGULATIONS

**Wives and Parents Can no Longer Stop Husbands and Sons From Enlisting**

Ottawa Aug. 9.—Objections of wives and parents to husbands and sons taking leave without their consent, have been in Canada. The regulations have been changed. When enlistment for overseas service began General Hughes announced that he would take no man from a wife and no junior son from parents without their consent. A regulation was made to give this declaration effect and it has been strictly lived up to during the year of war.

The regulation has produced considerable hard feeling. A good many men, eager to take service, have failed to obtain the consent of their wives. In many cases where they enlisted without that consent, wives have written protests to the department and the men immediately have been sent home.

With minors there has been even more trouble. Boys of eighteen and over, burning to enlist, have failed to obtain the consent of parents. Numbers have run away and enlisted under fictitious names and incorrect ages.

Time after time regiments in training have been combed for fugitive junior patriots. Many boys have been found and sent home, many have not.

In Canada, to-day, there are not a few fathers and mothers grieving for

missing sons, and wondering whether they are in Flanders or under the sod. They know the boy wanted to go and that permission was withheld, that one day he disappeared and search failed to discover him. There has been no card from Salisbury or France from the boy. To-day many parents are wondering if their missing boy is alive or has died under a fighting name.

Had General Hughes been here is it doubtful that the regulations would have been altered, but the change having been made it will stand. The old provision, under which a private could buy his discharge for \$15, has been done away with. It has further been decided that desertion will be followed by court martial and punishment. These changes bring the Canadian regulations into conformity with British practice.



THE ASSESSMENTS

The assessment lists have now been completed and handed to the Town Treasurer for collection. The total assessable value of property in the town amounts to \$2,516,800.00, which brings the rate to \$1.40 per cent.

In conversation with travellers we are informed that the rate here is the lowest they have found in either New Brunswick or Nova Scotia, for which we ought to be thankful, in these days of storm and stress.

It has been claimed by some who have heard this proposal that a working man having no real estate and living in a rented house, whose income did not come up to the exempted sum would pay no taxes.

Mr. Editor:—  
Regarding machine guns for our Canadian Overseas Contingent. Why are the people called upon to supply these guns for our troops by popular subscription?  
When the government decided to send troops to the front in this war, it was stated in Parliament, that they would be equipped in every particular for this service.

Members of our Dominion government have been to Great Britain ostensibly to obtain information as to ways and means for the most efficient manner in which Canada could contribute to the success of the allies. Our Minister of Militia has been in consultation with the imperial authorities in regard to the equipment of our troops. Sir Robt. Borden has just lately been on the field of battle in consultation with the military leaders of France and Great Britain.

Surely the government must now be in possession of sufficient information to enable them to determine exactly what equipment our troops should possess.  
In view of these facts why are these machine guns not being furnished by the militia department along with their other equipment?  
Does our military authorities not see the importance of these guns? If with all the information the department is supposed to possess as to the requirements of our troops, and they do not see the necessity of furnishing these guns, what warrant have private parties got that they should provide them?

That there is a real need for them there is no question and the military authorities must be aware of it.  
No one can minimise the importance of this arm in the present conflict, as well as every other invention that will aid our men to meet the enemy on anything like even ground.

Why then, since the Dominion Parliament without practically a dissenting vote authorized the government to provide all requirements needed for our forces, do they not provide these guns?  
If the government want more money for war purposes, why not call Parliament together and our representatives no doubt will sanction a loan for all that is needed for every purpose in connection with the war.

There are many objects now and more will develop as the war progresses, for the use of all the voluntary subscriptions that can be raised, such as the Patriotic, Red Cross, Hospital, Belgian and other Funds.

We know our soldiers need the machine guns as well as other equipment, all of which should be the very best that can be procured, but let there be some system of supplying these necessary requirements to our troops.  
Public voluntary contributions as a rule are spasmodic at best, and liable to drop off at the time when most needed.

This business of furnishing our soldiers with guns and ammunition is far too serious a matter to be left to popular enthusiasm and should be taken in hand by the authorities, whose business it is, with a determined resolution to prosecute it to a successful issue.

They now have the authority from Parliament. Let the people insist that they do it. Yours respectfully

**A. Y. M. C. A. Worker for the Ontario W. C. T. U. in the Trenches.**  
Among all the men giving themselves in behalf of others and for "The Christ" we can truly say, there will be none more heroic, faithful and self-sacrificing, than Oscar D. Irwin.

We first met Mr. Irwin in Old Knox College, Toronto, where he was preparing himself for the Christian ministry. We beheld him still, as straight as an arrow. His fair face lighted up with a quaint smile, a touch of humor over-spreading all. Though he had just entered college halls at Toronto University and Knox, he was already making good. Rev. J. A. Crouston (his pastor) then of Collingwood, had spoken to me regarding this intrepid youth. By nature he was of a scientific and mechanical bent. Railroad engineering attracted him, but he had to begin on the bottom rung. Thither he had climbed and climbed step by step. When he came to his last exams he was not twenty-one years of age. He was at once given his engine and immediately broke all previous records for speed upon that special line of road.

His run was near his home. One day he took Mr. Crouston with him in his cab and it was then he whispered a longing that had been growing, to study for the Christian ministry. That same enthusiasm soon upon his engine, characterized Mr. Irwin as a student and in one year at Collingwood Collegiate Institute he matriculated for Toronto University. His first student summer days were spent in running a threshing engine upon the prairie—pretty lame work when compared with a railroad engine.

The next time I met the subject of this sketch, was when the Knox College Student Band, of which Mr. Irwin was a member, visited Exeter, conducting one week's Evangelistic services. As one of that group of College men, Mr. Irwin is still remembered for his bright, crisp addresses and his sweet tenor voice in such songs as "I Surrender All, All To Thee, Blessed Saviour," and "Shadow! No Need of Shadows, when at last we gain the Victor's Crown". Were not these prophetic of both the man's future and of his service which he must surely render?

Mr. Irwin is especially fitted for work among young men. He spent some time as assistant in Victoria Presbyterian Church, West Toronto. And, now, though he has one year or more of theology yet ahead of him (having graduated in Arts at Toronto University) where else would you expect to find such a young man? When the Empire is endangered and men are needed in strategic places, we rejoice that Canada has such stalwart men—men "who do not count life dear unto themselves," but declare, "Here am I, send me." The W. C. T. U. is to be congratulated upon having such a representative at the battle front, as Oscar D. Irwin.


