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### The lost Snuff-Box.

It was a lovely morning in June.

The fleecy clouds seemed both loth to glide

crime! Favoured by Fortune,—praised,

promoted,—the Queen's Commission confer-

red on me for deeds of daring!—uplifted from

my low estate, to rank with the high-born of

my country—and now about to sit at table

with the noblest, the fairest, the bravest of

the land! My day, begun in obscurity and

darkness, is setting in sunshine and glory!

Gather on this day threatening storm! darker

and fiercer!—and let me read, in thee, the

picture of my life reversed!"

(Old man! old man! your eve has not yet

come.)

Great Conflagration at St. Louis.—By a  
telegraphic despatch, accounts have been re-

Louis, on the 17th inst. consuming half the

stroyed. The loss is estimated at \$2,000,000.
