



SUMMARY OF NEWS.

ENGLAND.

While the news from almost the whole of Europe is ample and important, we find nothing of deep interest respecting England, if we except the accounts of the state of trade.

The utmost expedition has been commanded to be used to render her Majesty's town residence fit for the occupation of the Sovereign. As "time flies," the Queen has expressed the greatest anxiety to be safely domiciled in town before the end of the month.

Indisposition of Her Majesty.—On Sunday the 12th instant, in consequence of Her Majesty feeling indisposed, the two military bands were not permitted to perform on the terrace,

tinnel desertions, and of its present enfeebled state. Captain Berkeley of the Thunderer, command at Sidon, which is so well fortified as to defy the attacks of 15,000. The Archduke Frederick is also there.

FRANCE.

Louis Philippe opened the Chamber of Peers on the 5th ult. and addressed them at great length. The Speech taken altogether is a good natured one. At 2 o'clock the 3 per cents were at 77 1/2; the 5 per cents at 90 1/2.

No later intelligence from Europe this week. We continue our extracts from papers brought by the Great Western.

We understand that it was decided at the next meeting of the Executive Council, that the Legislature should be called together on Wednesday the 20th January, and the proclamation to that effect will appear in the next Gazette.

PAYMENT OF JURORS.—A Petition to the three Branches of Legislature praying them to enact a law to pay Grand and Petit Jurors for their Services is in course of Signature, and we are happy to state very generally signed by the Inhabitants. We know of no reason why Jurors should not be paid, as well as Members of Assembly or Legislative Committees; many are compelled to come from a distance to serve as Jurors, who do not possess even the means of defraying their expenses, and as the petition avers "that their Seed and Stock have been sold to liquidate the debts incurred while serving in that capacity, we trust that all will come forward and sign a Petition.

POPULATION OF THE COUNTY.

We have been politely favored by the Clergy of the Pence, (W. Hatch, Esq.) with the following statistics of this County, which have been collected from the returns of the persons appointed to take the census. In some of the Parishes the number of persons belonging to the various denominations were not given.

Table showing population statistics for various parishes: Parish of Saint Andrews (807), Parish of Saint Stephen (3405), Parish of Saint George (2423), Parish of Saint James (1155), Parish of Saint David (1609), Parish of Saint Patrick (321), Parish of Pennfield (1043), Parish of West Isle (1129), Parish of Campo Bello (718), Parish of Grand Manan (1003). Total Whole Population of the County, 19,279.

In our paper of the 13th ult., a notice was inserted, requesting that those Ladies who might be favorable to the formation of a Religious tract Society, for the Town of Saint Andrews, would meet at Paul's Hall on the following Monday for that purpose. We are authorized to state that a meeting was accordingly held, and that the laudable object of a large number of ladies was then and there fully accomplished, in the formation of a Society, which it is to be hoped, will be the means of effecting a large amount of good not only in the dissemination of religious knowledge, among those who have not, as the 2d Rule of the Constitution expresses it, "money to purchase or time to read larger works," but also in cultivating a fondness for reading—a privilege which it is to be regretted, is very little esteemed among a large proportion of the labouring classes. The following has been handed to us for publication:—

At a meeting of some of the Ladies of St. Andrews, held this 16th day of Nov. 1840, at Paul's Hall, the necessity of a Religious Tract Society, for the Town and neighbourhood, was taken into consideration, as affording facilities greater than those of any other religious Institution, for the dissemination of the blessed, and important virtues of our most Holy Religion, especially among the poorer classes; it was therefore unanimously resolved:—

- 1st. That a Society be now formed, to be denominated, the Ladies Tract Society for the Town of Saint Andrews.
2d. That the object of this Society, shall be to furnish by the gratuitous distribution of Tracts religious instruction to those who have not money to purchase, or time to read larger works.
3d. That this Society shall consist of a President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary, and a Committee of seven, who shall meet quarterly, on the first Monday of March, June, September, and December, for the purpose of reporting the proceedings of the Society, and of encouraging each other in their labour of love.
4th. That any person who shall subscribe annually, the sum of One Shilling and three pence, shall be considered a Member of this Society.
5th. That as the Saint John Religious Tract Society, is an auxiliary to the Religious Tract Society, 56 Paternoster Row, London; this Society respectfully requests to be considered a Branch of the St. John Society, and as such, resolves to receive its supply of Tracts through that medium.
A President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary, with a committee, were then appointed, Subscriptions made and received, and a supply of Tracts immediately sent for to the Auxiliary Society in Saint John.
We would congratulate the christian public, on the appearance of another Auxiliary to the cause of truth; and beg to express our fervent desire, that in its co-operation with the Bible Society, lately formed here, the Ladies Tract Society may be the means of effecting much good.

At a meeting of the Committee of the St. Andrews Branch Bible Society, it was resolved "That all Clergymen be ex-officio members of that Committee.

The Medal proposed to be presented to Capt. Beloso, of Havana, by the young men of Halifax, for his exertions in saving the survivors of the brig Vernon from Pirates, was received by the Caledonia, it is said to be neatly executed and contains a suitable inscription in English and Spanish.

It is reported in Town, that the brig Gettrude, Griffin, of St. Stephen, was driven ashore at West-quoddy, on Monday last, in a snow storm and became a total wreck, Capt. and crew saved. We understand that she was insured in Boston.
