THE ONTARIO HOUSE.

Winding Up the Business of the Session.

Mr. Meredith and the Premier on the School Question—The Opposition's Parting Shots Fail Short.

It was after 2:30 o'clock Friday morning when the separate school debate closed. There was some discussion as to whether or not the House should then adjourn and hold a session in the afternoon, but some embers objected to going on during Friday, though the Attorney-General and the leader of the Opposition both avowed they had no scruples on the subject. After a short recess the supplementary estimates were given notice of and passed, and the Treasurer introduced a bill embodying the railway resolutions, which were read the first and second times without discussion.

Upon the motion to go into Committee of Supply on the bill, Mr. Balfour moved in

that Provincial aid should also at the same time be granted to deserving railway projects in the older counties.

The amendment was lost 31 to 50.

The debate on Mr. Craig's bill respecting the language of instruction in public and separate schools was continued by Mr. Meredith, who discussed the question for over an hour. He resented Mr. Ross' reference to Mr. Craig's loss of his convention, and spoke of that gentleman in the highest terms as a pure and high-minded Christian gentleman. He denied that the Opposition were endeavoring to stir up strife, and charged in return that the Liberal party were endeavoring to alienate the French-Canadians of Ontario from the Conservative party. He insisted, however, that he did not care what might be the result of this policy of the Opposition. It was intended for the best. Mr. Meredith closed by defending Mr. Craig's bill in detail and in arguing that that honorable gentleman had been perfectly persistent in his course throughout.

The Attorney-General, on rising shortly before 2 o'clock, was greeted with loud cheers. He said that at that late hour it would not be becoming on his part to occupy the attention of the House very long, nor did the speech of his honorable friend, heated although it was and excited, and impassioned as its delivery no doubtwas, contain much that required an answer. Nothing could be gained by proscribing the French language in the schools, but a great deal was to be gained if they recognized to a certain extent the use of that language. 

"Anything is good enough to make swill," and the American beer-drinker has begun to realize that there are other and our barley season is usually short, and begun to realize that there are other and Our barley season is usually short, and theaper ways of making beer than from the hot, and dry, so that the grain has not the malt of Canadian barley. There has been some increase in the growth of American barley recently, more especially in the Northwestern States, but this does not account for the falling off in the demand for Canadian barley and the decline in its price. The fact appears to be that experiments nade with corn have shown that beer may appointment. be made much more cheaply from that grain han from fine and bright barley, and as the beer-drinker is not a man of nice taste as a rule, the brewers have concluded that a more flourishing business is to be carried on by using corn than using barley. They have had two years of experience now, and the act that Canadian barley has fallen from 65 to 45 cents per bushel is evidence of the atifaction which corn-brewed beer is giving to their customers. Circumstances of this kind cannot easily be changed, and even if the duty of 10 cents per bushel imposed by the United States was kept on, the farmers of Ontario could

not afford to grow barley at the price it is likely to command. With the duty off and with free access to the markets of the continent they might hope to realize a small profit upon the cost of production, but not more than 10 or 15 cents per bushel at the outside. Let the United States, however, impose a duty of 30 cents per bushel, as nmended by the McKinley Committee, and the outlook will become utterly hope less. Ontario barley will then be shut out of the United States as effectively as if a stone wall a hundred feet high were built up between the two countries, mounted and guarded for its whole length day and night by six legions of customs officers. Had the Canadian Government shown a disposition three or four years ago to treat with the Government of the United States for the establishment of free




