Prince Alexander of Teck Will Be Canada's Next Governor-General --- Elgin Municipalities Renew Request for Extension of Traction Lines ---Great Precaution for Safety of Royal Train Passing Through London--- In Tampico, Mexicans Refuse to Allow Oil Workers to Return to Labors

ONE CAUSE OF VILLA'S REFUSAL

Is Getting On Too Well To Desire Mediation in Internal Trouble, and Is Planning Big Coup.

[Canadian Press.]
Washington, May 7.—Carranza's attitude toward mediation was declared to have been revealed by his official report of a vigorous rebel military campaign, marked by significant victories. His de-clination to submit his country's internal troubles to preliminaries of mediation is based, in part, at least, on rebel successes in a sweeping southward movement, Constitutionalist representatives said here today. While Carranza parleyed with the South American envoys over details of their proposals, three powerful forces were hurled against Federal strongholds. Reports of the results of the movement Carranza transmitted to Rafael Zubaran, interior minister in the Constitutionalist cabinet now in Washington. Summarized today they were:

Notable Victories. Defeat of 3,600 Federals at Penazcos, near an Luis Potosi, with the capture of 1,800 prisoners and quantitied of arms and

Capture of Acaponela, Tepic, 1,700 men surrendering. One million rounds of ammunition and quantities of stores taken. Capture of field guns, artillery and ammunition from fleeing column that evacuated Monterey.

The Carranza reply did not outline to what extent his forces were opposed. In many quarters here that was interpreted as indicating that the rebels encountered little resistance. No casualties on either were mentioned.

After receipt of his chief's report, Mi nister Zubaran was emphatic in a forecast that, within the next month the rebel armies would be investing Huerta's capital. Villa's victorious Torreon veterans were yet to take part in the new movement. It was believed that the rebel military chief would strike next at Saltillo, where Federal troops remained and in the vent of a victory there, that he would hurl his forces at Tampico. Capture of that city would give the Con stitutionalists a port of entry unaffected of arms now enforced the Rio Grande,

Minister Zubaran today estimated that more than forty thousand rebel troops were now in the field.

Capture Confirmed. Washington, May 7.—Confirmation of the capture of the entire federal garrison at Acaponela Tepic, by the constitutionalists forces reached the state department today, in a report from Consular Agent • Keyes, at Rosario.

United States Consular Agent Montague has reopened the American consulate at Canonea. Sonora, according to a report to the state department today from Co Simples. He also reports that 60 American refugees have returend to Canonea and that the movement of American refugees from the south has ceased. Off to the Front.



Why London's Taxes Are High

PART II.

Education and Failure to Provide for the Future Has Helped to Swell the Tax : Rate.

This is the second part of the article on "Why London's Taxes Are High." The first part appeared Saturday. Other articles of the series will appear in early issues.

[Continued From Saturday.] In Saturday's article the public utilities contribution to the high tax rate of London was considered at some lengt' Today some of the other more important phases will be taken up. Possibly one of the most important of these is the educational question. Education is one of the most important sides to modern life. Proper education, not only for those destined for the professions, but for those who will fill the ranks of the industrial world, is demanded. It has to be provided. Government statutes set forth certain rules and regulations regarding the compulsory education of the children or every community, and the municipality has no recourse but to abide by these Government dictates.

Don't Begrudge Money. "No one begrudges the money for edu-lation," has long been the boast of civil-London ratepayers are apparent ly determined that the best is none too good for their children's education, yet even the most superficial analysis proves that education is responsible in no small measure for London's high taxes. London has many demands on its educational appropriation, yet a no inconsiderable portion of this appropriation is deadwood. It is being carried from year to year, mounting higher and higher in amount as the years coll by, and for no other reason than the ack of system.

Staving Off Evil Day. As in the case of the debt consolidation, London has been starving off the evil day of educational cost reckoning, and by its failure to adequately meet the demands of the future, it is faced with a milliondollar expenditure for new schools

Debenture issues, of the past, have been insufficient to meet the requirements of the day. Without a thought to the future. debentures were provided for the construction of new educational plants and the sinking fund has been too small to draw the natural inference as provide adequate protection for deprecia-

Last year, London erected a new school -the Aberdeen—and yet the debenture issue for the old school had not expired. At present London is paying for the oid Aberdeen school, now a thing of history, and for the new one as well. The same will be true of the Princess avenue school when the new addition is placed there and the building remodelled.

Must Be Up-To-Date. of London's school buildings. So far as the building itself was concerned, the Aberdeen school was a good one, but changes in system of educational instruction threw it on the scrap heap.

New and better methods of school work are being evolved all the time. These new methods call for different type of construction from the old schools. In order to keep pace with the times, the old, obsolete schools have to be "scrapped," and the new ones substituted. The Government demands it. Its grants will be cut off unless the building is adequate.

Debentures for the construction of the local hydro-electric system are for a 30-year term. Before the expiration of these 30 years, every pole will be replaced, and practically every wire that was used in the initial services will be torn down to make room for new "copper." but still London will be paying Its share of the first poles and the first wire, as well as the second set of poles nd the second set of wires.

Down at the waterworks pumping station at Springbank, equipment has been replaced three times within the life of the original debenture issue. Failure to provide adequate protection against depreciation and to insure replacement without the added burden of the original cost being still unpaid is then another reason for the high tax rate of London. Years Bring No Wisdom.

Passing years, however, have brought no wisdom to those to whom is intrusted the management of civic affairs. With the realization of the shortcomings of its predecessors, the present administration has copied them all, copied them with the that London of tomorrow will realize,

Road construction of the most haphazard manner, and local improvements paid for from the general rate, have added their quota to the present high rate of taxation. Prior to the introduction of the frontage tax in the assessment of local Improvements, the expenses of all pavements, sidewalks and so on, were met from the general rate, instead of the more equitable manner of charging the property benefiting with the majority of the cost. Like many another municipality, every nunicipality, it might be said, London has had its civic waste that has run into thousands of dollars annually. Countless instances might be cited of temporary improvements that have been made for which the city has nothing to show. Instead of looking ahead to the future and building on a permanent foundation, the improvements of the past have been more or less of a temporary character. The result has been that the ratepayer has been saddled with a large additional expenditure for which he has but a small return for his money, and which represent fittle or nothing at the present time.

What Indiscriminate Repairs Mean. In referring to this phase of the high tax rate, the construction of the public omfort station on the market square might well be considered. More than \$6,000 has already been expended on the ouilding, which, in the estimation of the majority of the ratepayers, has been little nore than useless. Indiscriminate graveling and repairing of the streets, where permanent pavements would have meant money in pocket for the ratepayers, introductions of "fads" and "follies" by those who have been in power, failure to properly look after the sale of city of London bonds and debentures, and a thousand other things, might be classified as 'municipal waste." People suspect anything at all on the slightest pretext. I deny that there are or ever were 40 smallpox cases, as it was reported yesterday. There are only eight smallpox cases in London, and they are all in the Cove Hospital. It is absolutely impossible for evidences of smallpox to be doubted," declared Dr. Hutchinson. "As soon as a doctor sees a case, it is turned over to us immediately."

"Five years ago I agitated for the vaccination of everybody, and I pre-dicted that if this were not done we should have just such a wave of dis ease as there is at present, in a mild! form.

According to Dr. Hutchinson, not one of the eight smallpox patients have been successfully vaccinated, and most of them not at all. "Because the city let the vaccina-

tion question slide, they are paying a lot of money and getting a lot of poor advertising today," he stated.
"The eight patients are from all parts of the city," concluded Dr. Hutchinson, "there would not be any, if they had been vaccinated."

Labor Council Delegates Answer "Whiskey Row" Attack.

MINISTERS ALSO SCORED

Mr. Eadie Says They Have Been Labor's Friends—Expect Temperance Advocacy.



EL GRECO.

HE celebration last month in Spain of the three hundredth anniversary of the death of El Greco, the great Span ish painter, is a reminder how standards of art and literature.

Fifty years' ago artists were careful pulled off before an election. about an exact realism of detail. Technique was important, assuredness and serenity essential. Tennyson was loved for his smoothness and suavity, and now is almost hated for such qualities in some

At first the critics said "grotesqueness," "breakthe taste of the irregular, even of the awkward, if it has in it a demonic energy of thought and impulse. We-want a work to be alive and alert rather than settled getting somewhere rather than being there. It must be rather arresting and stimulating than even right or orthodox. It must have a jump in it, though it pain, a "punch," as the sporting men would say, no dawdling or scented aestheticism. Let it be queer, if you please, or topsy turvy, or half-mad, so long as it makes you think.

Well, El Greco is called a modern man three centuries early. He is no milk and sugar artist, obeys the modern commandment, "Thou shalt not commit mere pretiness." The wise in matters of painting rank him with the biggest and best, Rembrandt, Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo. Who would have thought it in Ruskin's flambovant days?

The case of the Englishman, Blake, is somewhat similar. Critics patronized him rather, in the last century. Now all rush to do him reverence both as poet and as painter. Those queer old engravings of his are the thing to admire, above realism and pre-Raphaelism. "Tiger, tiger burning bright" is more than a nursery rhyme, and they are all quoting his line about "building Jerusalem in England's pleasant land," and trying to do it, too. Times



Orange Cups.

Cut the oranges in halves and remove the pulp and juice. Mix the orange pulp with an equal quantity of seeded malaga grapes and bananas cut in small pieces. Fill the "cups" with this mixture and, when ready to serve, place a cone of whipped cream on top of each. Grapefruit may be used instead of oranges. Prune Whip.

Cook the prunes slowly until they become plump and soft. Press through a strainer and sweeten slightly. Add the hot prune pulp to the well-beaten white of an egg, beating constantly. Prune whip baked is called prune souffle. Apricots. peaches or apples may be used instead of

Uses of Lemon Juice. Lemon juice is an excellent cosmetic. If the face is bathed in water into which a few drops of lemon juice have been squeezed a delightful feeling of freshness and cheerfulness results and the skin is soft and velvety.

The mouth has a clean and wholesome feeling when the teeth have been brushed with water and lemon juice. It is an ex-cellent tonic for the hair, and the juice of a good-sized lemon stirred into a wellbeaten egg will make a very good hair wash. It should be rubbed into the roots of the hair and along the ends.
