Mrs. Achenburger, seated in the wagon, grabbed the lines, and endeavored to frestrain the frightened animals. In crossing the walk at King street one of the horses fell, throwing Mrs. Achenburger clear over the dashboard.



The city hall deal was not closed last night, although the proposition of the Royal Bank to rent the property to the city for the sum of \$3,800 free heat and exemption from taxation so long as the city occupy the city hall, was accepted. The bylaw ratifying the sale was given its second reading, but was held up until a satisfactory agreement is entered into between the bank and the city for the transfer of the property.

The proposition of the bank, as outtlined above, was received, and on motion of Ald. Cooper, seconded.

Ald. Eckert objected to the terms, declaring that they were out of the question.

"It means that we are paying at least \$6,840 for the rental of the hall." he declared. "In the first place, we pay \$3,800 for the rental of the hall. It will cost at least \$200 to heat the building. The bank has the use of the mayor's office, Mr. Paker's office, and Dr. Hutchinson's office, worth at least \$1,000 a year. In addition we give them exemption from taxation, which at 23 mills on the dollar for property assessed at \$80,000, as this will be, means \$1,840 more. That is rather a steep rental, and I think the council should refuse to pay that sum for it. We are giving the bank the hall for nothing, and then paying a large sum for the privilege of using it."

Easy Money, This.

"We have not considered the question of local improvements," said Ald. Richter. "That is an important item. Here there is a new pavement, together with conduits, etc., and we exempt them from this burden for two years, one-fifth the life of the pavement. This is not fair, and should be
