



INJURED WORKMEN RELIEVED OF PAYING **COST OF TREATMENT**

Important Amendments to the Compensation Act.

PENSIONS FOR WIDOWS

Cases Hereafter Will Be Considered Strictly On Their Merits.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

TORONTO, March 14 .- In the Legislature today Attorney-General Lucas introduced a number of amendments to the workmen's compensation act, the most outstanding being provisions of first aid. Mr. Lucas said the Government had reached the conclusion that there had not been a limit as to the amount of medical, surgical or hospital expenses, but that there had been limit in them.

"The provisions of the bill are for all medical, hospital, surgical and skilled ursing attendance during the first 30 days after the activity. There is no lin itation as to charge: the fund must pay the whole expense. The only limitation is that of the 30 days. The comensation board makes the necessary provision, and pays the sum out of the accident fund," he said. Welfare Societies.
Where the employer had what was

called welfare societies, or where he established in connection with his business hospital accommodation and arrangements for medical atendance, which are at least favorable to the employee, then the board, after due investigation and consultation with the mployers and employees, may approve of the arrangements, and there will be no assessment against that industry for medical aid. The principle was that the workman shall not be called upon to pay any contribution for medical aid. and there is a new clause that no con tribution shall be taken directly indirectly, and penalties are provided in case of evasion of this. Decide on Merit.

The attorney-general drew attention to a new clause which at first blush, he said, might be rather startling, but at the second did not appear so startling. In the past the board had followed English decisions on various points, but in cases which seemed to work out unjustly the proposal was that the board henceforth should decide upon the real merit and justice of the case and not follow strict legal precedent. He cited a case of a train man who had crossed from one crew to talk with another railwayman, and in n such a case the man was not in the course of his employment. In Ontario the board would in future decide such cases on their merits, rather than by following precedent elsewhere. The following precedent

to apply to cases. The attorney-general intimated a number of other amendments more or less important. Section 31 of the workmen's composition act was one which fixed the scale of compensation where the injury turned out to be fatal. It provided for a pension for the widow and certain allowances for the children. The allowance was \$5 a month for each child until the age of 16 was attained. Under the new proposal, should the widow die the allowance to the surviving children would be doubled. Another provision was that the same care would be taken of an adopted child as of an ordinary child of a workman who was killed. In the case of a child who came under the circumstances abovementioned, and was over 16 years of age and was an invalid and unable to take care of himself or herself, the age limit would be removed, and the contribution would go on and be continued as long as it could have been reasonably expected the deceased workman would have contributed had he sur-

Another feature had reference to executive officers of companies. Under the present law an employer may go on the payroll himself if he accepts all the hazards of the business and shall be covered by the insurance, but there was no provision for the great number of companies where the executive officers were really in the same position as employers. The amendment placed the executive officers of the company in the same position as an employer.
