# THRASHING FOR

Brush Crossing Desert.

Thirty Dervishers Accounted for in Hot Battle Near Damot-English Hold the Wells.

New York, Jan. 8. — The ice fields in the Hudson River and the New York Bay are more troublesome to navigation than for many years, rivhere from an officer of the Somali Field Force says: "We had a most successful encounter with the Dervishes the other day when crossing the Haud. The Somali Mounted Infantry were, as usual, scouting ahead when our advanced scouts ran into one of the Mullah's parties, which had been raiding the Ogodens, numbering 200 men, forty of whom had rifles.

"They stuck very tight to their camels, but after 20 minutes' bush fighting we cleared them all out and

captured the camels, having account-ed for some 20 of the enemy killed, wounded, and prisoners. FIGHT OR QUIT

"The rest got away through the dense bush, and, I hear, made for Galadi, where, to their surprise, they were met by the garrison which we had left there. It must be thirsty work for the enemy to be wandering about the Haud with no water and to find all their wells occupied.

"Three days ago our Illaloes had a fight at Damot, and killed 30 Dervishes, our loss being only one man wounded in the leg. So far, we have much the best of it."

London, Jan. 8 .- Pope Pius X., King George of Saxony, President Diaz, who has been elected to the chief magistracy time, and the new King of Servia, are to Reading. Supt. The word "extinction" is, of course, a polite way of intimating that King Alexander and Queen Draga were murdered in the most

shocking manner.

The almanach, with the authority derived from its existence of some 140 years, likewise pronounces judgment in the controversy which has reigned until now on the subjects as to whether Edward VII. of England is the seventh soverien of the seventh state. ereign of the so-called Hanoverian dynasty of Great Britain, or whether he is ty of Great Britain, or whether he is the first English monarch of the house of Saxe-Coburg Gotha. The almanach decides in favor of the latter view, and those who claim King Edward as a ruler of the Hanoverian line may now take a back seat. In one word, the British Empire is no longer subject to the scepter of the Guelphs, but to that of the Wetgoodness of Japan to his colleagues

The only Guelphs remaining are the Duke of Cumberland and Brunswick and his two sons, the duke being the only son of the last King of Hanover, and the octogenarian Duke of Cambridge, whose father was the youngest son of King George III., and who has no legitimate issue, all his children being of morganatic birth.

To flatly refuse the request of the canvasser would be only to offend the latter, whose trade would be lost, and who would also, no doubt, influence other trade away from the store. The easiest, most sensible and most profitable plan in a case of this kind, would be to make a cash contribution of the amount or half the amount asked for space, explaining, if thought advisable, why it would be desirable to omit the advertising. In this way, the goodwill of the canvasser. who is usually a person of considerable influence, would be retained.
