

Gundusi, of the Japanese navy, with 150 naval reserve men, landed on the west coast of Kam-chatka, plundered villages, expelled inhabitants and issued proclamations declaring the sovereignty of Japan over the Kamchatka Peninsula. A sailing vessel with 100 Russian reserve men, and a detachment of 100 militiamen, was sent from Petropavlovsk to the west coast to eject the Japanese.
