It is desired hat some proof be obtained from the public or church records from the minister who may have attended the funeral. She was buried in the Meth odist church yard and perhaps there will be a church cemetery record. Will you kindly cause a search to be made and make inquiry from some of the oldest inhabitants who may possibly have attended that church, or may have known the family on their farm near Chatham.

EDWARD BLAKE SPEAKS.



Another report from the same department was read by Mrs. Emma Waterson, of Kemptville, in which it was suggested that unions set apart a portion of their time to praying for newspaper editors and publishers. Most of them were ready enough to criticise and condemn the publishers, but few perhaps took the rouble to pray for them.

representative of the Temperance Legislation League, organised last Dominion day, and which has already a membership of between 3,000 and 4,00, Mr. Starr stated that the league has been organised on independent political lines, but will work from the inside and through the old parties for the attainment of national prohibition. 


