The Duke of Connaught.

Canadians from the Atlantic to the Pacific join in extending a hearty and loyal welcome to the Duke of Connaught who, on his arrival at Quebec, was duly installed Governor-General of Canada. In addition to the cordial greeting which always awaits the representative of the Sovereign, there is in the coming of the Duke of Connaught a deeper feeling, in that His Royal Highness is the son of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, whose memory is held in reverence throughout the Empire. The idea is not new that a prince of the blood should represent the Crown in each of the great dominions. It was mooted long ago, and it is of interest to recall that it was the late Queen Victoria herself who then feared for the success of the experiment. Realizing to the full that affection for the Crown and Royal family was one of the strongest links uniting the British Empire, it is said Her late Majesty feared that if a scion of the Royal House were made Governor-General, he and the whole Royal family might suffer in popularity as the result of some act of the British Government for which he might be held responsible. No such cause for anxiety could exist to-day. Canada has made rapid strides towards nationhood and it is extremely unlikely that the Home Government could or would do anything to make a Canadian Governor-General unpopular in the Dominion.

It is well for us to realize that, apart from the high position which birth gives him, the Duke of Connaught is very much a man and a soldier. He is so much a soldier, in fact, that years ago he refused the throne to remain in his profession. On the tragic death of his nephew, Prince Alfred of Coburg, it became necessary to proclaim an heir to the throne to the ill-fated king's father, the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. Next in line was the Duke of Connaught, and he declined the honor, declaring that he preferred to retain his British nationality and his position as a British General, to the Crown of a Teutonic sovereign belonging to the German Confederation. As a soldier the Duke saw active service in the Egyptian war of 1882, where he commanded the Brigade of Guards and figured with great distinction at the battle of Tel-el-Kebir. There is a common impression that the possession of ordinary human virtues is exaggerated when they occur in men of Royal blood, but the Duke's exploits in the Egyptian war are not thus to be depreciated. They were reported more than once in despatches by the German military attaches, and as a result the Kaiser honored the Duke by presenting to him the military cross of the Prussian order, 'Pour Le Merite,' a distinction only conferred on one other foreign general, namely, General Nogi.

From 1886 to 1890 the Duke commanded the troops in Bombay, and in 1891 he held the posts of Major and Aldershot commands, and that of the Forces in Ireland. In 1904 he became the first Inspector-General of the Forces, and in 1907 he was appointed to the Mediterranean command, which, it will be remembered, he resigned. It was a great disappointment to him that he was not permitted to share the risks of the Boer war. The last of the many important army posts held by the Duke was Commander-in-Chief of the Mediterranean Forces, which he resigned shortly after his appointment. Last year he represented the King at the opening of the South African Parliament, enduring wonderfully well for a man of sixty the fatigue and hurry of his 18,000 miles trip.

The Duke's connection with Canada is already a long and pleasant one. Forty years ago, when a young man of twenty, he came to Canada and served as a soldier through the Fenian Raid. Since then the Duke has several times visited the Dominion, each time enhancing not only his own, but the Royal family's popularity. It will also be remembered that his son, Prince Arthur, toured Canada some four years ago.

It has been the Duke of Connaught's good fortune to be a general favorite. He is a man of singular charm and modesty of manner, great kindness of heart, tact and sound judgment. Nothing could have been more fitting than his happy reference on landing at Quebec, to the blending of races in Canada: 'In days gone by,' he said, 'it was the fusion of the French and English races which made the greatness of England; here again history repeats itself, and it is their union which makes your own greatness.' From the Saxon and Norman stock England drew the qualities of courage, perseverance and strength which raised her to her proud position among the nations. Here, under the wise rule of statesmen, some of our British and sometimes of French descent, Canada has achieved an era of development which is the envy of the world.

It is the wish of all Canadians that the Duke of Connaught's stay with us shall be happy and to our mutual benefit. Without leaving any comparison with any of his predecessors in the national hope and belief of the Canadian people that the Duke will prove the most successful and popular Governor-General in the history of Canada.

Boy Scouts and Chivalry.

No plea has been more fruitful of results than that to which was due the initiation of the Boy Scout Movement. Now of world-wide extent, though unfortunately in some of the continental countries of Europe diverted from its proper object, the organization has proved irresistible in its appeal to the youth of both sexes. The spirit of chivalry is latent in every individual man and woman and boy and girl, and given the moment and the inspiration it will flash into being, though but in the passing.

Sir Francis Vane, president of the British Boy Scouts, believes that the age of chivalry is not gone, and that the peace foundation on which the movement rests, provides ample scope for chivalry, which the scout law enjoins—that which calls on each who has accepted its obligation, to 'protect the weak, defend the helpless and assist my neighbor,' without fear or expectation of reward.

The latest development in the Boy Scout Association proposes to unite the scoutmasters along a common line of action. 'The great difficulty in dealing with the scout movement,' said Sir Francis Vane, in a recent interview, 'has always been to obtain uniformity in action of those most excellent men, the scoutmasters, so that they may go to their scouts and to the world inspired by a great ideal of service and with a due sense of responsibility in their noble mission. That is what we have been trying to arrive at, and that is what we hope to achieve by the "commandery of chivalry."'

The object of this new order is to carry the chivalric principles of the scout law into the lives and actions of the scoutmasters. With that in view the ritual of the order will include a solemn charge to all the officers to realize their responsibility as the leaders of the young and neither by word nor deed suggest anything to those whose charge you have accepted but that which is pure, noble, wise and inspiring.

The Two Leaders.

For the time being, criticism has given way to praise. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, by his urbanity, gracefulness and courage in the hour of political defeat, is winning encomiums from friend and foe. It has been rendered clear that the Liberals who voted against the Laurier reciprocity proposition did so with great reluctance so far as Sir Wilfrid himself was concerned. It has also been made equally clear that the Conservatives regard Sir Wilfrid as a great Canadian, and that they desire to make his descent from their office as easy and as pleasant as possible. This speaks well for the people and as much for Sir Wilfrid.

Likewise all criticism of Mr. Borden has been abandoned, and there is nothing but praise for his general bearing and his political leadership. He has shown no undue elation over his victory, no amateurish spirit of triumph, no churlishness such as is sometimes exhibited by men to whom worldly success comes suddenly. In this hour of victory he has borne himself with dignity and courteousness to friend and foe. In this there is a promise that Canada will find in Mr. Borden a leader as deserving of the national confidence as were any of his predecessors in the high office to which he has been called.

Square Timber Exported.

Year by year the export trade of Canadian square timber becomes less, due to the inadequate supply of clear timber suitable for squaring and to the increased home demand. From a bulletin shortly to be published by the Dominion Forestry Branch, it will be seen that the exports as given by the Department of Trade and Commerce in 1910 did not amount to eight per cent. of the quantities exported from 1871 to 1885, when the trade was at its height and when an average of nearly five hundred thousand tons, worth over five million dollars, was exported annually. During 1910 thirty-eight thousand tons were exported, or three thousand five hundred tons less than in 1909. Ninety-seven per cent of this went to the United States. An increase in the price per ton of \$2.03 partly compensated for the decrease in volume and made the total value nine hundred and eighty five thousand dollars, or only six thousand dollars less than in 1909. As first quality white pine is the chief species exported in 1910, forming fifty-seven per cent. of the total, Ontario is the province mostly drained for square timber exports. White pine commands the highest price of the seven exported species, and the 1910 price was \$31.22 per ton, a ton containing approximately 40 cubic feet. Birch was the second species in importance, although the eight thousand tons shipped out was only sixty per cent of the 1909 amount. The six thousand tons of elm exported was nearly four times as much as in 1909 and with white pine and birch made up ninety five per cent of the exportations in square timber. Small quantities of oak, ash, maple and red pine made up the remainder.

At Regina, Winnipeg and the coast cities, as truly as in Ontario and the Maritime Provinces, rejoicing Canadians found in the simple melody of heart-telling words that came from the heart of Alexander Muir a tribute of affection for Canadian nationality and British unity that they could not find in offered substitutes for Canada's own song.

Obituary.

On Sunday morning, about 11:30 o'clock, Mrs. I. H. Goudey passed away at her late residence on Forest street, at the age of 61 years. Mrs. Goudey is survived by her husband, one son, S. E., proprietor of the Royal hotel, Wolfville, and one daughter, Mrs. J. H. Marsh, of Brookline, Mass.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon and was largely attended. The last sad ceremonies were conducted by Rev. Arthur S. Lewis, who in the course of his remarks paid high tribute to the life and character of the deceased. The pit bearers were four deacons of the church—Messrs. C. W. Sanders, Albert Cook, B. R. Williams and Wm. Caperton. Many beautiful floral tributes were laid on the casket by friends of the departed. The interment was made in Mountain Cemetery.—Yarmouth Light.

Improvement at Greenwich.

A number of the residents of Greenwich, who did not avail themselves of the opportunity of putting water in their dwellings when the system was laid down, some five or six years ago, are now at work putting in a new system, connected with the Neary springs, near the railway. They have constructed a fine reservoir connected with the springs by a two inch iron pipe and are installing a gasoline engine to raise the water to the height where the reservoir is located. The new service promises to be efficient with an abundant supply of excellent water for house and farm purposes. The people of Greenwich are to be congratulated on their enterprise.

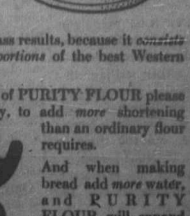

Unique Gathering of the Men of the Churches.

A unique gathering of the men of the churches of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will be held in Halifax on Nov. 22nd, 23rd and 24th, in the town of a great Men's Missionary Convention, taken part in by all Protestant Christians. 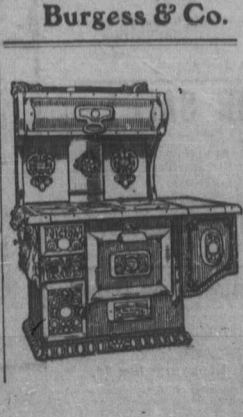
