It is the intention to publish from time to time other bulletins covering sections of particular interest to the members of the Legislative Assembly and students, with the object of making the resources of the Library better known.

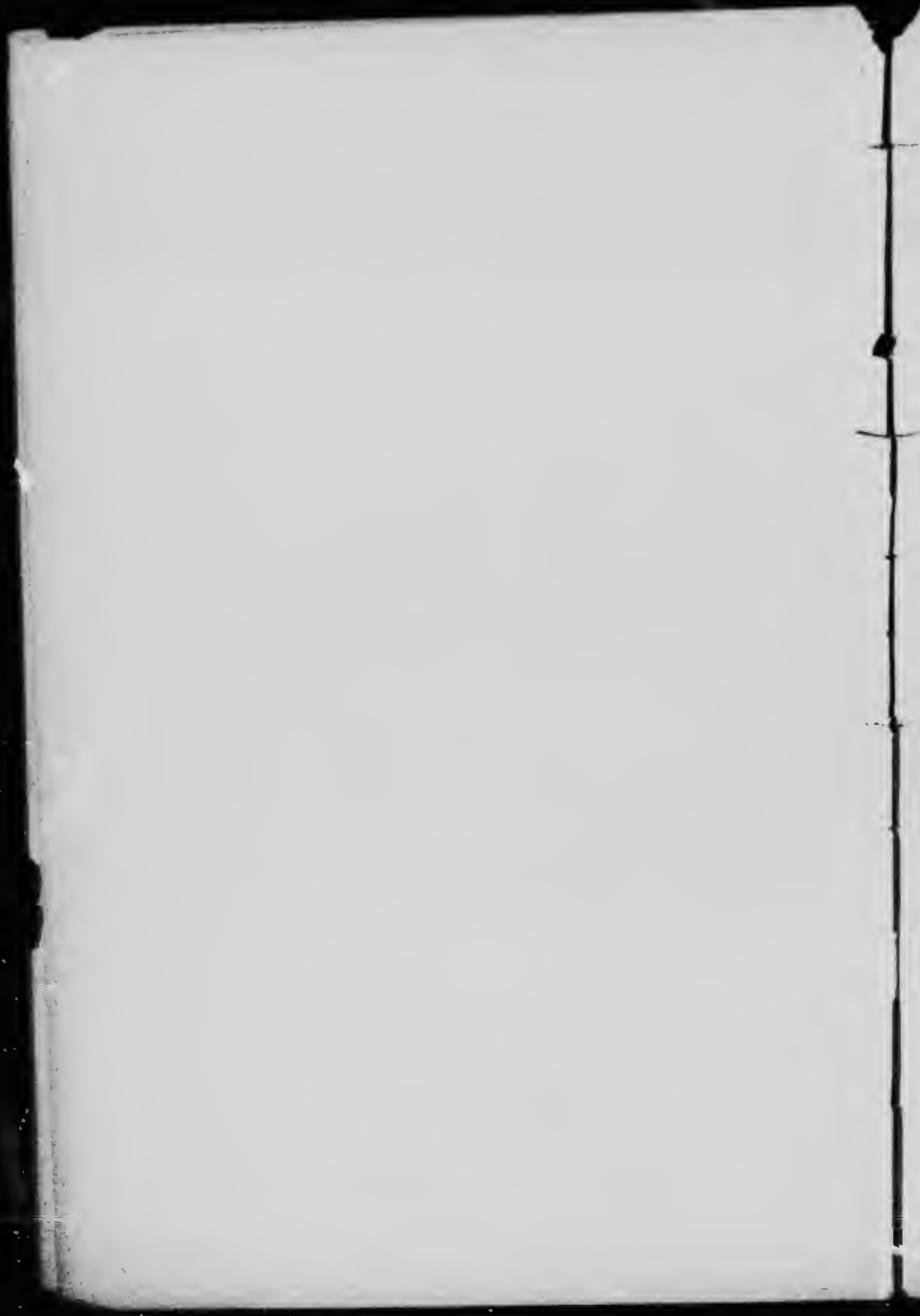

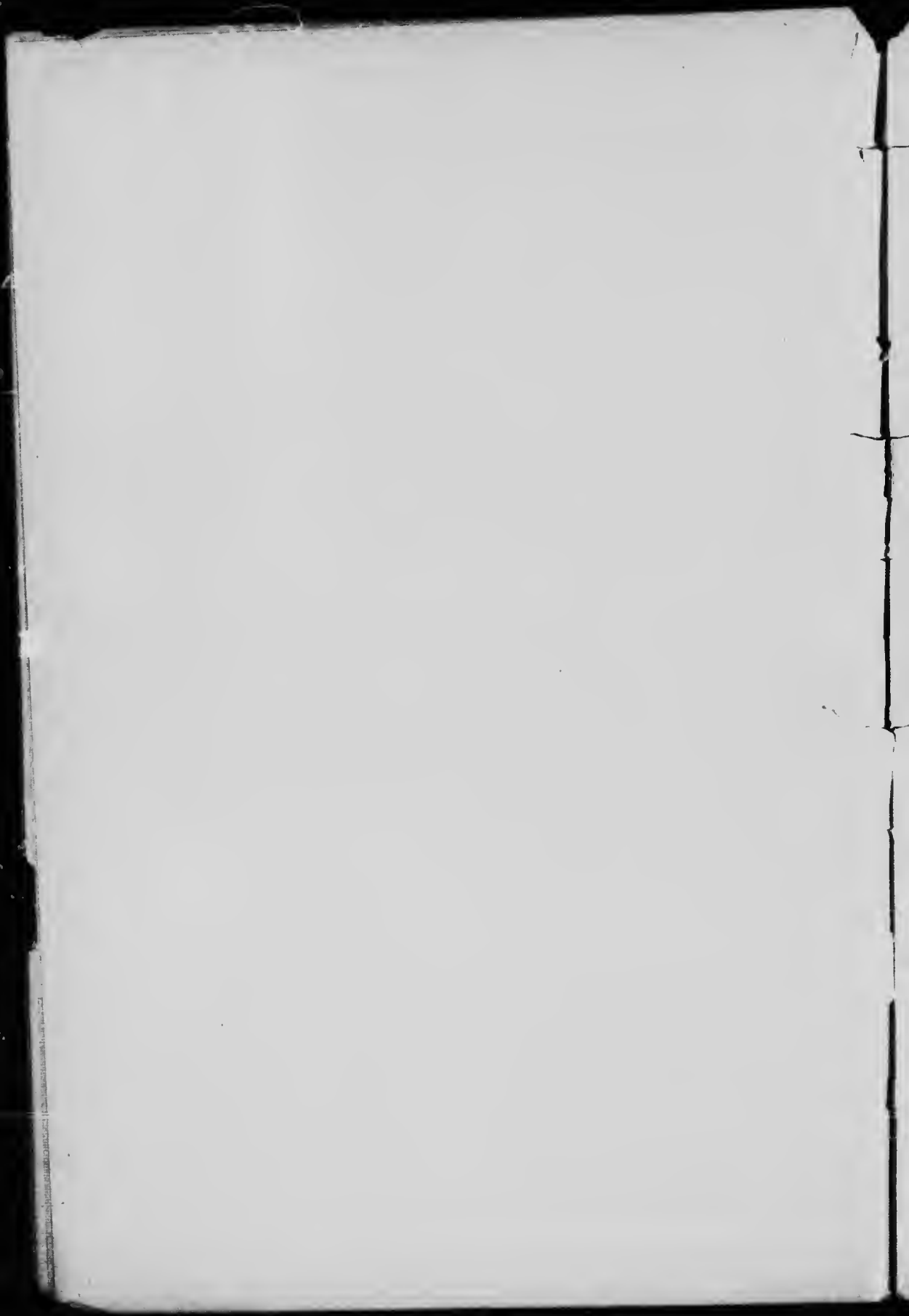
