## LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Mr. James Fahey, lately of the Toronto News, has joined the staff of the Toronto World, as editor-in-chief.

The appeal of Dr. Thomas, of Chicago, of heresy fame, to the general conference of the Methodist Church has been disallowed, and he has been expelled from the Church.

There will be unveiled at Allendale Junction on Saturday next a bronze statue (heroic size) of the late Col. F. W. Cumberland, Manager of the Northern and North-Western Railways.

The London Standard says it has authority for stating that the Governor General intends to return to Canada, and that H. R. H. the Princess Louise will also return before the spring.

The list of outrages in Ireland continues to grow. A farmer has been confined to death for paying his rent. The League has been openly reorganized under the name of the Political Prisoners' Aid Society. The Lord Mayor of London has written to the Property Defence Association, assuring its members of the traditional support of the city. Subscriptions are called for to aid the widows in distress owing to the non-payment of rent.
