"Fancy Anything So Shocking" Said Hazen

Parliament of Canada Still Held up in a Marathon Debating Contest.

(Courier Leased Wire) OTTAWA, March 5—The 48th hours of the naval obstruction movement was passed in the Commons at 3 o'clock this afternoon with no material change in the situation save that several thousand more words had been added to the record.

Hazen reminded him that as Monday's sitting was still in progress "to-morrow" had not been reached. The ex-Minister persisted that the information was necessary, and that if the record should show the government in the right the opposition would have to swallow its convictions.

"Fancy anything so shocking and dreadful," observed Mr. Hazen. Mr. Gauthier, of Ste. Hyacinthe, then took up the argument in French.

At daylight Mr. E. B. Devlin questioned the presence of a quorum and straightway there was a hurried search in the corridors for enough members to make a quorum certain. Mr. Neely spoke for a couple of hours, being interrupted while Mr. Graham protested that Messrs. Bennett, McIlhen and Smith were "making too much noise."

Mr. Borden took no notice of it. It is hinted to-day that the government will let their opposition have its fling this week, but that if the same tactics are continued next week, the navy bill will be temporarily laid aside and steps taken to amend the rules of the House so as to prevent further "filibustering" movements.

APPLICATION IS GRANTED Lake Erie and Northern Railway Successful at Ottawa To-Day.

(Special to The Courier.) OTTAWA, March 5—The application of the Lake Erie and Northern Railway before the Minister of Railways to-day for approval of the route along the northern bank of the Grand River was granted after a stiff argument by opposing interests.

The argument was heard at noon to-day. Mr. W. T. Henderson, city solicitor, appeared for Brantford, Messrs. W. S. Brewster, M.P.P., and W. P. Kellett for the company; while an array of counsel represented the Grand Trunk, which company vigorously opposed the application. The application was finally granted.

It is understood that the Dominion Railway commissioners will go into the details of the route at a later date in Brantford.

REV. MR. LAVELL IS A COME-BACK

He Replies to Ald. Spence To-Day in Brief Way.

Considered it Was a Matter of Duty on His Part.

Rev. Alfred E. Lavell was asked if he had anything to say in answer to the attack made upon him in the council by Alderman Spence and the Mayor.

"I do not think any reply from me is necessary," he said. "All I stated was true and was needed, I said that several members of the council were opposed to police increase or pay. Both Ald. Spence and the Mayor in their speeches now say that this is their position. They thus confirm my statement. But it seems that I do not like to be exposed or opposed from the pulpit. A coward's castle they call it—a title sometimes more appropriate to the greater privilege of the council chamber. I do not wonder at their wincing under this, but I am satisfied that it is the opinion of the clergy and leading laymen everywhere that the promotion of civic righteousness must be considered not only as proper in the pulpit but as a vital part of its work. It is fundamental to its very existence. This has been true of the pulpit in all ages. Every one acquainted with history, must appreciate this fact.

As for the mass of epithets used in the speeches, I would say that bluster wins no battle, nor does losing of temper. I am really not concerned with what my critics said of me. Much greater men than I have been called the same names and even worse.

I have no intention of entering a contest of adjectives with the Mayor or Ald. Spence. I did my duty, impelled by nothing except the highest motives. I hope to continue doing it as occasion demands.

I have nothing more to say."

Sensational Run on a Bank in Montreal

Evil Minded Person Started Sensational Affair Yesterday.

(Courier Leased Wire.) MONTREAL, March 5—When the offices of the Montreal City and District Savings Bank, upon which a big run occurred yesterday afternoon and evening were opened for business this morning, there were indications that the panicky spirit had not yet been entirely quelled, though the officials of the institution were of the opinion that they could allay fears entirely before the day was out.

Small crowds of depositors were early at the banks and waited patiently until the doors were opened, when the work of paying out went on. Each branch had been provided with sufficient money to deal with any demand made and the fact that many who desired to deposit their money again were invited to wait until later on made a good impression on the patrons of the bank.

The depositors for the most part belong to the poorer class of French and foreign people in Montreal, who are very hard to convince that there is no cause for alarm, the bank officials say. The children of many of the schools have accounts in it as well. The run has not been without its pathetic side. When they thought that they were going to lose their savings, the despair of many of the women was tragic, a despair which was quickly changed to extravagant joy when their claims were met.

The bank was called upon yesterday to pay out a million dollars. The panic was started by a merchant, who on account of the tightness of money, could not be granted a loan by the bank. This man telephoned to friends, who spread the rumor all over the city that the bank was in difficulties.

This is the third run on the bank in its history. The last was caused by an Italian, who when a cheque was returned marked, "not sufficient fund" which he was unable to understand, told all his compatriots that the bank was broke.

LOCAL OPTION OR SCOTT ACT?

That is Question Which is Under Consideration.

But Paris is Out of it Under Federal Act.

The Expositor last night with characteristic effrontery, published a report that, so far as a proposed temperance vote in this city and Paris was concerned, there was nothing doing. The Courier's exclusive story of Monday was widely read, and the Expositor endeavored, as usual, to do the crawl act when it missed the news. The story was to the effect that a campaign was under consideration in Brantford and Rev. Ben H. Spence was quoted to that effect. It also stated that the submission of the Canada Temperance Act, which is the Scott Act in amended form, is a possibility—that is, that a straight majority vote might be taken. It was further stated that the anti forces had learned that there was a possibility of a campaign, when either local option or Scott Act would be voted upon, although no definite decision had as yet been arrived at.

That it is possible to have a straight majority vote in the city of Brantford was the information received by the Courier from Rev. Ben H. Spence to-day over the wire. Mr. Spence telegraphed as follows:

"The unit for Canada Temperance Act is county or city. If Act is carried in Brant it would include in its operation all municipalities within county bounds except Brantford. The new Canada Temperance Act is radically different from the old Scott Act. The penalties are more severe and the provisions for enforcement immensely better. The law is working well in eleven counties and cities out of seventeen in New Brunswick, also in a number of counties in Nova Scotia. BEN H. SPENCE."

The Courier believes in presenting the news as it comes, no matter whether it is temperance or any other issue. The operation of the Federal Act, according to Rev. Spence leaves Paris out, unless a vote is taken throughout the entire county which is quite unnecessary as the county is already dry. The vote in Brantford would be a separate affair.

It might be stated incidentally, that the act can be repealed as well as carried on a straight majority. If carried, it does not come into operation for five months.

From what the Courier understands, there is a feeling among the local temperance forces that the present Local Option Act is the best. At any rate, it is almost certain that a campaign will be launched next January, although it is not settled what Act will be submitted, the three-fifths or the straight majority.

BIG OUTLAY IS ANNOUNCED

Sum of \$74,000 Will be Expended on the Institution for Blind.

FORCING AN ELECTION

This paper has been asked to explain how it is that a Dominion election can be forced before the time of the natural expiration of the side in power.

It might perhaps, be as well to generalize a little with reference to the query.

For instance, when all the estimates have passed through committee of supply, the finance minister has to move to go into committee of ways and means for the purpose of considering the usual formal resolutions for granting certain sums out of the consolidated-revenue fund of Canada "toward making good the supply granted." These resolutions must be reported and agreed to formally by the House before the bill founded thereon can be introduced.

However, the above does not apply in this particular instance.

The existing situation is this. The Borden government has supplies voted until March 31st. The term supplies, means the payment of the salaries of the thousands of men and women in the government employ.

The apparent dodge of the Laurierites is to keep on talking on the naval bill until after supplies have run out and thus to force an appeal to the country.

What they hope to gain by such an appeal, heaven only knows, but they seem just now to be in that humor.

In the States they cannot be so questioned, in fact they are simply rubber stamps of the President and they can't tell their constituents to go hang, because they haven't any.

What do you think of it? Take another illustration with regard to this alleged Republic. Washington is the capital of the United States, but it is not self-ruled and in fact the people of the entire District of Columbia have no votes for any purpose. They have no vote for President, they have no vote for Congress, and they have no vote in municipal matters. Absolutely they're not allowed a ballot at all for anything. The affairs of Washington and the surrounding neighborhood are run by a commission of three men appointed by the President with the concurrence of the Senate. Two of said commissioners must reside in the district and one must be an officer of the United States army.

In other words even if you pay taxes in Washington you don't count and nothing is any of your participative business.

Canadians wouldn't stand for that kind of thing for a moment with regard to Ottawa, or the British with regard to London—there would be a riot which would make the British militant suffragettes look like a balmy breeze—our neighbors stand for it and stick to the hallucination that they are a republic.

Did you ever hear of a star spangled Bannerite who has once become located in this great Dominion long enough to appreciate its advantages ever want to go back? He can't tell you why, but he won't if he can help it.

The truth is that the British Empire is the biggest Republic in the world and the United States Republic is only a sham.

At the bottom of the gown, "Thanks to Canada" was inscribed in large letters bordered with the Canadian emblem—maple leaves.

THE GOVERNORS HELD MEETING

DEALING WITH A THIEF.

It Was an Unusual Method, but It Proved Effective.

Governor Thomas Chittenden of Vermont is remembered for his great kindness of heart as well as for his ability and force of character. He was the first governor of the state and lived in the liberal manner that befit his office. His cellar, as was the custom of those days, was well stocked every fall with provisions.

One winter night the governor's rest was broken by sounds coming from his cellar. He left his bed quietly and, with a candle ready to light, made his way in the direction of the noise. As he reached the cellar he struck a light and saw a man taking great pieces of pork out of his meat barrel and stowing them away in a bag.

The governor approached the intruder and in a commanding voice said: "Go on, sir! Fill up that bag and be off. You ought to be ashamed of yourself to disturb honest people at this time of night!"

The thief shrunk back, evidently much frightened.

"Be quick!" continued the governor. "It is no fit time to keep me shivering here!"

So stern was the governor's manner that the man was compelled to obey. "Now, begone!" went on Governor Chittenden. "When you are again in need of food come to me and say so, and I will give you more. Do not pilfer my house at night. If I ever have the smallest reason to suspect you of another such act you shall be punished for this offense as the law provides."

It is pleasant to know that the man came to the governor the next day to ask for employment, in order that he might pay for what he had taken, and that work was found for him, which he performed steadily and well—'Youth's Companion.

FATE OF OLD BOOTY.

The Only Judicially Accepted Ghost Story on Record.

Stromboli, the island volcano, known as the lighthouse of the Mediterranean which is in violent eruption, once figured in a court of law in connection with one of the most circumstantial ghost stories on record. In 1888 Mrs. Booty brought an action of slander against a certain Captain Barnaby for saying that he had seen old Booty running into the flames of hell, pursued by the devil.

The words were admitted, but for the defense it was proved that in 1867, the day of old Booty's death, the captain, with a large party of friends went ashore at Stromboli to shoot rabbits. At about 3:30 in the afternoon two men were seen running toward the volcano. "Captain Barnaby exclaimed 'Look! there is the foremost of old Booty, my next door neighbor!' They then vanished in the flames, a fact of which every one took note.

In addition to the testimony of Captain Barnaby and his friends, old Booty's clothes were brought into court and identified by several witnesses as being similar to those worn by the foremost man who ran into the crater. The judge, Chief Justice Sir Robert Wright, was so impressed by this evidence that he said: "Lord have mercy upon me and grant that I may never handle you two again. One is old Booty, my next door neighbor, and the other is a ghost."

Mrs. Booty lost the day, and the case still remains the only judicially accepted ghost story on record.—London Chronicle.

THE GOVERNORS HELD MEETING

Year Has Been Record One at Hospital—Excellent Condition of Affairs.

The regular monthly meeting of the directors of the Hospital took place yesterday afternoon.

Present, Messrs H. Cockshutt (in the chair) Symonds, Preston, Bunnell, Warden, Kendrick, Sanderson, Dr. Bell and Reville.

The report for the year showed the largest number of paying patients ever recorded, receipts from that source totalling \$70,600. The amount received from the government was \$1,700, as compared with \$2,200 for the previous year.

This difference led to some discussion. It was pointed out that under the new condition of affairs there were fewer non-paying patients than formerly.

It was decided to add \$100 to the salary of Mr. Eddy, the collector, who now receives \$200 for that purpose from the city.

The point was strongly emphasized that he should not press for payments except same could be reasonably expected.

The auditors report showed everything to be in good shape.

It will be necessary to ask the city council this year for an increase in the grant of \$1,000.

Many duly certified accounts were ordered to be paid.

A letter was received from the Ladies' Aid in which they offered to pay the expense of furnishing the nurses' home. It was received with hearty thanks.

Tenders for floor matting were received from four Brantford firms and three from Toronto firms. They were referred to a committee composed of Messrs Bell, Watt and Bunnell, with instructions to favor a local firm if at all possible.

A number of tenders for hospital supplies were left in the hands of the Superintendent and Mr. George Watt to decide.

A resolution was passed expressing hearty thanks for the services of ex-Warden Douglas and Mr. W. W. Warden, the former representative of the Trades and Labor Council.

New rules and regulations were adopted with reference to nurses in training.

It was mentioned that Miss Blott was still sick and not likely to return. On the request of the Medical Association, more surgical appliances were ordered.

Dr. Bruce Smith, Medical Inspector wrote regarding a regularly paid pharmacist at the local institution. His epistle was so general in its terms that the secretary was instructed to ask him to send another letter in plainer language.

The report of Miss Carson for the month of February showed 35 patients on February the first, 41 on the 15th, 67 on the month, 67-21 private and 46 public. Number of patients at present in the hospital, 57. This is far beyond any previous record for this time of year, and shows the growing public use of this institution under the able superintendence of Miss Carson.

WILL STAGGER ALL HUMANITY

So Say the Suffragettes About Their Plans.

(Courier Leased Wire).
NEW YORK, March 5—A cable to the Tribune from London says: The suffragettes are now promising to "stagger humanity," unless women get the vote. They are planning new schemes, which, as one of them averred will eclipse all previous efforts. "The pillar box raid, the Kew fire, the Walden Heath bomb," she said, "will pale before the operations that have been arranged. It was Kruger, who declared he would stagger humanity." So will the suffragettes till the franchise is granted to women.

Soon after the opening of parliament raids are to be made on the House and members of the cabinet must be closely guarded or they will be kidnapped. It is stated that it is intended to drop what is styled a flashlight into the body of the House of Commons from the Strangers' gallery. Women will be brought from every part of the United Kingdom to take part in the military ventures. In the last number of the official paper issued by the Militant League, there appeared a picture of Nottingham Castle, destroyed by men seeking the vote. "This," said one of the militants, "is symbolical of what may yet occur. We respect human life but buildings, whatever their historic fame or tradition are in imminent peril."

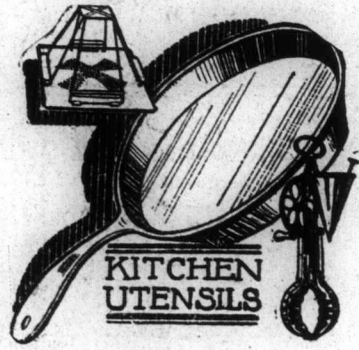

Police Board

(Continued from Page One)
First class men from \$2.05 per day to \$2.25.
Third and fourth year men \$2.25 per day to \$2.50.
Sergeants Wallace, Donnelly and Chapman from \$2.75 per day to \$3.00 per day.
Chief Slemis \$1,800 to \$2,200 per year.
Police Court Clerk \$918 per year to \$1,000.
To this scale Judge Hardy and the Mayor could not agree, the former stating that "he thought the Sergeants were being well paid, while the Mayor could not consider the matter at all. The Magistrate thought the figures were reasonable and not extravagant. He said "that on account of the high cost of living the men were justified in being granted the raise in salary." The Magistrate went on to say that to keep up the standard of the force it was necessary to have good men on the force and to have such men they should be given what he thought was a living wage. In regard to the petitions presented by the ratepayers for more police protection these the commissioners were in duty bound to consider, and give the matter their careful attention. These people, said the magistrate, represent public opinion, and he was strongly in favor of increasing the personnel of the force.

A Deputation.
A deputation from the police force consisting of Patrolmen Borwick, Felker and Cobden, who were waiting in the corridor, were invited into the meeting.
The deputation on entering stated that they had nothing more to say than at the last meeting. They presented three inventories of the house keeping expenses of the members of the force for the last month, the first being presented by an officer who receives \$2.05 per day, which is reproduced in this issue.
Mailmen's Salaries.
A copy of the salaries paid the postmen of the city, was presented which is as follows:
Mail carriers salary per day — 1 month probation \$1.75 per day; then for two years \$2; from 2 to 4 years \$2.25; from 4 to 6 years \$2.50; after 6 years, \$2.75. Two full weeks holidays each year with pay. If they have no sickness or days off duty except the annual leave, they get a bonus of \$20 or 10 days at their own option. This information may be got from the Auditor General. They have 19 men.
Deputation Departs
After these articles were presented, the deputation left the room. Judge Hardy and Magistrate Livingston discussed the articles at some length, and were then more convinced than ever that the men were justified in

asking for a raise in salary. "They don't live, they simply exist," exclaimed Judge Hardy.
Another Schedule.
Judge Hardy, after some figuring, presented for approval the following schedule and raise of wages:
Third-class Men—\$1.85 per day to \$2.05 per day.
Second-class Men—\$1.95 per day to \$2.15 per day.
First-class Men—\$2.05 per day to \$2.25 per day.
Fourth and Fifth Year Men—\$2.20 per day to \$2.45 per day.
Sergeants Wallace, Donnelly, and Chapman—\$2.75 per day to \$2.85 per day.
Truant Officer Boylan—\$2.60 per day to \$2.75 per day.
The Mayor objected to the sergeants being given an advance, but said "He allowed that scale of wages. Magistrate Livingston said "the sergeants should be paid \$3.00 per day, and stuck to it pretty closely for the remainder of the meeting."
Judge Hardy—"Don't you approve of giving Chief Slemis or the Court Clerk an advance?"
The Mayor—"Certainly not. He is getting \$1,800 per year, and as far as I am concerned," said the Mayor, "I will not consent to his salary being raised one cent." The Mayor stuck to his contention in regard to the chief's salary and that of the court clerk to the end.
Magistrate Livingston made a plea for the salary of the Chief to be advanced to \$2,000 per year. Judge Hardy asked the Mayor if he would consent to more men being added to the force, to which he replied "No."
Chief Slemis here read a list of the beats covered by the police during the night and day.

The Patrol Wagon
The idea of calling out the patrol wagon to convey those who were arrested in the near vicinity, occupied the attention of the Commissioners for a few minutes. The board were unanimous on this point that the patrol wagon should not be brought out to convey those arrested close to the police station unless they were "paralyzed."
Chief Slemis stated "that he had quite recently given such instructions at police headquarters, and that the patrol wagon would not be called out in future for short runs unless absolutely necessary."
Judge Hardy next proposed to make Chief Slemis's salary \$1,900 per year, and the Court Clerk's \$1,000 per year. Mayor Hartman said he would not consent to that.
Mayor Hartman then said he would consent to giving the men a raise, but would not consent to the Chief or Police Court Clerk being advanced one cent or the sergeants being advanced.

More Men
Chief Slemis again asked for more men, stating "that the citizens had petitioned for them."
The Mayor—"They did no such

thing; they petitioned for protection, not men."
The Police Magistrate then asked to have two new men added to the force, but Judge Hardy and Mayor Hartman would not entertain the suggestion. Finally Judge Hardy and Mayor Hartman consented to have one man added to the force and the problem looked as if it were solved.
Mayor Hartman said that "he was of the opinion that if Truant Officer Boylan was used as a police officer entirely, then another truant officer could be appointed at a smaller salary than they were paying the present one, and with Boylan back on the force continually, would relieve the situation. This suggestion did not meet with approval.

The Deadlock
A deadlock then followed. Magistrate Livingston was in favor of advancing the men's wages, the sergeants wages an allowance, Chief Slemis \$2,000 per year. Court Clerk Browning \$1,000 per year and adding two men to the force.
Judge Hardy favored the men and sergeants being advanced in pay and making the Chief's stipend \$1,000 per year, and adding one man to the force.
Mayor Hartman consented to the men being given a raise in salary, adding one man to the force, but objected to Chief Slemis being paid more than at present \$1,800 per year, and Mr. Browning having his salary raised from \$918 per year.

Pro and Con
The Commissioners argued "pro and con" to try and break the deadlock, but to no avail. Finally Judge Hardy said: "Let's settle it then by giving the men and sergeants a raise of 20c per day, and either add one more man or leave the number of the force as it stands, the Chief's salary to be \$1,900 and the Clerk's \$1,000 per year."
The Mayor—"Leave the Chief's salary and the Court Clerk's salary as they are and I will agree."
Magistrate Livingston would not consent to this. He claimed the chief should have \$2,000 per year and the court clerk's \$1,000, but the Mayor said "No."
Final.
The factory whistles were then blowing for six o'clock, and the deadlock still existed. Finally Magistrate Livingston made the following motion:
Moved by W. C. Livingston, seconded by "That the men and sergeants be allowed an advance in wages of 20c per day, Chief Slemis's salary to be \$2,000 per year and the Court Clerk's salary be made \$1,000 per year, all to date from January 1st, 1913."
Judge Hardy—"How about increasing the force?"
Magistrate Livingston—"We'll take that up later."
Judge Hardy—"Why not include that point in the motion?"
Magistrate Livingston—"No; let us finish this first."
Judge Hardy—"Can't you support that?"
Judge Hardy and Mayor Hartman would not second the motion, and it was lost.
The End
The Commissioners were still at a deadlock, and no decision was reached in the matter, the Board decided to adjourn until this afternoon.

The services were exceptionally impressive, the pastor dwelling on the many sterling qualities of the departed, who was a lifelong Christian, and during the last few years had been a great sufferer, owing to an operation that was deemed advisable to save her life two years ago in Hamilton.

For any team to visit Villa park at the present time and retire at the close of ninety minutes' play with the knowledge that only one solitary mark has been registered in the net result, is conclusive evidence that both sides are entitled to a certain amount of credit.

The Trotters of Bolton against the Rovers of Blackburn were unable to raise a high enough pace to carry them to victory. It will be remembered that it was pointed out that the Wanderers appeared to have developed a penchant for participating in drawn games. When one comes to examine the recent doings of the two clubs it will be found that the Rovers appear to have jumped into something like their true stride. The Wanderers, on the other hand, appear to have been a trifle indifferent, and although playing on their own enclosure, it cannot be denied that Saturday's result was at all unexpected.

Chelsea accomplished a good performance in defeating Manchester City by the odd goal in three. A couple of points to the Pensioners at the present time will bring them much joy and also act in the nature of a brace tonic. The citizens of Manchester are no mean opponents to battle against, possessing as they do what is said to be the finest defence in the league, and now that Chelsea have done something worth while, will they be a little consistent and compromise to climb a little higher on the league ladder? Manchester United must have created an impression in the camp of their followers when they allowed Middleboro to carry off the honors by the odd goal in five. The first thing that strikes one in connection with this result is the oft-repeated fact that when a club has received its quietus in the cup rounds, the next few weeks see them to all intents and purposes completely submerged. It is peculiar, but true all the same, and year after year the same thing occurs with unvarying regularity.

Are the United of Newcastle just beginning to wake up? In pondering over the recent performances of the "Toon" it is difficult to see how they could appear so, at all events. The toffs of late, it must be borne in mind, have been going exceptionally strong, while so far as the league is concerned the Tynesiders have been doing anything but brilliant work. Both clubs are of course still in the running for the cup, but in this connection Everton have by far the better record, and have disposed of their opponents with far greater ease than have the United. It is the fact of Everton being vanquished by two clear goals that somehow convey the impression that the Newcastle contingent have at last done something worthy of their reputation. It will be a great day of reckoning when they and Sunderland meet to decide which of the twain shall enter the semi-final stage of the race for the most coveted of all football trophies.
