



A Paris cable says: At Draguignan, at the trial of ex-Mayor Fouroux, of Toulon, for conspiring to procure a criminal operation upon his mistress, Mime. Jonquieres, counsel for Mime. Jonquieres demanded that she be acquitted of all responsibility for the crime. He said his client had yielded herself to the operation because terrified at the threats of Fouroux, who alone should be hold responsible for it. Mime. Jonquieres was now a wife without a home, and had already been punished enough for her transgression.

In his letter censuring the commander, Secretary Tracey, of the navy, says: "In the opinion of the department, your conduct upon your own showing is deserving unqualified censure." Burrundia, together with Commander Reiter's actions in the premises, Secretary Tracey says: "It is believed that few case have ever cocurred in the history of the United States Navy where a commanding efficer so completely abandoned the responsibilities of his position, as, according to your own showing, you did upon this critical cocasion. For the reasons herein stated the department has been constrained to relieve you of your command."
