But it has been Sir Leonard's lot to pass through Canadian cities while the whole nation lies prostrate under a blasted trade; and insoucious opponents will urge the result of an unbalanced trade as the effect of a policy which may be said yet to have scarcely begun to live.

It is hardly worth while to contradict the mass of absurdities and misstatements which the St. Croix Courier publishes in its last issue. Just thirty years ago, George Whitman, C. E., made a survey of the entrance to St. Andrew's Harbor near the Light House.


