The stick is freely used on them, and every now and then there is apparently an organized resistance to the tyranny of the taskmasters, as fights are of constant occurrence, and twice to day fire-arms were used by the Arab soldiers with apparently fatal results. A deserter states that inside the lines mutinies are constantly breaking out, some serious, some trivial, and that the most severe measures have to be resorted to by Arabi to secure obedience. This seems to be borne out by the appearance of things to-day, as MCFARLANE, there is evidently some distu the present time, considerable agitation and running to and fro being visible in the entrenchments. The shots fired by our men did not do any harm so far as could be judged of from our lines. A few rounds of grape or one or two shell would at once stop all work on the part of Arabi's serfs. This same deserter says that eighty Bedouins were killed during the skirmish yesterday at Kafr-el-Dwar, and twice as many wounded, some very seriously. The good and rapid firing of the Rifles demoralized the Egyptian gunners and prevented them from laving their guns properly. He does not think that Arabi will assume the offensive again. If attacked in his intrenches it will have to be by a very strong force, as the struggle will be a deadly and desperate one. 


