TURKEY WILL NOT GIVE UP THE ISLAND

Greek Ruler Finds Himself in Corner Because Turks Refuse to Hand Over Crete to the Greeks.

Vienna, May 31.—According to reports received here, the probability of the Turks refusing point blank to give up Crete has filled King George, who has assured the Greeks over and over again that he would obtain the island for them, with such misgivings that he has announced that the matter is so serious that the fate of the dynasty depends on it.

Boston, Mass., May 30.—Six lives were taken in Boston harbor today by a 40 mile wind which swept the waters and with treacherous currents caused the capsizing of many boats. There were many witnesses to each of the three fatal accidents, but none was near enough to render saving aid.

GREECE VISITED BY 'QUAKE.

Several Towns Reported Destroyed and Many Lives, Are Probably Lost. Athens, May 31.—A terrific earthquake was felt today in the Moron peninsula in the southern section of Greece. Heavy damage was done. Several towns are reported destroyed. It is feared many lives are lost.

Philadelphia Cars Stop. Philadelphia, Pa., May 30.—Promptly at midnight traffic was suspended on all lines of the Rapid Transit. Hardly a wheel was turning after 8 o'clock and on all the principal thoroughfares all sorts of vehicles supplanted the cars.

Deputies Have Strenuous Time. Rome, May 31.—A serious row occurred in the Chamber of Deputies Sunday, during the debate on the estimates of the Ministry of the Interior. Members of the extreme left violently attacked the government and the rival parties exchanged insults.

NORTH DAKOTA SWEEP BY A FIERCE TORNADO

Eight People Killed and Much Property Destroyed—Buildings Wrecked in Half a Dozen Towns.

Minneapolis, Minn., May 30.—Eight deaths and property loss that probably will exceed \$200,000 is the toll taken by tornadoes that swept through North Dakota late yesterday. The storms were followed by heavy rains, and minor damage was reported today from points in Minnesota and Nebraska.

Winnipeg Lady Stricken. Winnipeg, May 30.—Mrs. Duval, wife of the moderator of the General assembly, has been stricken with paralysis. She may live a week but little hope is entertained of her recovery.

London, Ont., May 31.—The Ladies' Aid Society of Atken Street Methodist church, one of the largest in the city, have unanimously passed a resolution to the quarterly board asking that they issue a request to the ladies to remove the obstructing cretations during service.

Ministers Go to England. Ottawa, May 30.—Hon. Rodolphe Lamieux, postmaster general, will join the exodus of Canadian ministers to Europe next month, and while in London will probably again confer with the Imperial authorities on the question of cheaper cable communication between Canada and the mother country.

New Building Material. Rome, May 29.—Father Appelu, a Sardinian priest, has proposed to the Pope that his invention, consisting of blocks of powdered cork mixed with tar, be used for building churches to replace those that were destroyed in Messina and Reggio di Calabria by the recent earthquake.

ABDUL CONTINUES TO HAND OVER CASH

Has Surrendered Money Deposited in German Banks and Credit Lyonnais—Warder Fired for Telling About It.

Constantinople, May 31.—The surrender to the government by Abdul Hamid, the deposed Sultan, of sums deposited in German banks and the Credit Lyonnais is confirmed. His deposits in English banks, however, still remain in his possession.

Killed at Wainwright. Wainwright, May 31.—John Brown, of Orbinvale, about 18 miles north of here, was kicked on the head by a horse Thursday and his neck broken, death being instantaneous.
