It is generally admitted that it is more blessed to give than to receive. It is not so generally appreciated that it is much easier to do so.

When some poor, unsuccessful creature, who has to accept constant benefits from a successful friend or relative, falls to continually praise his benefactor, we bitterly condemn his ingratitude, and contrast his character with that of his kind and generous friend. What was her surprise to find her friend growing cool and distant. The conditions again changed. The younger girl was again in the position of advantage, and to her friend's great astonishment she once more became the generous, affectionate girl she had been in the old days.

You see this girl who was able to give graciously could not receive in the same spirit.

One of the best stories I have read for some years concerns two chums, one of whom made a tremendous success as a musician, while the other remained in a mediocre position. The successful one was always a generous patron of his old friend, and for many years the other loved him and praised him. But at last he began to grow tired of always singing his friend's praises, he rebelled against his own failure, and in a burst of passionate feeling he told the great violinist all this. And, wonderful to relate, the great man not only understood but never felt that if the conditions had been reversed he might not have been so patient and unselfishly admiring as his friend.

Please understand, I am not denigrating ingratitude, I am just reminding those of us who are lucky enough to be able to give, that it is far easier to give than to receive, and that perchance those who receive from us deserve more credit and honor for receiving gratefully than we for giving.

Why Japs Are Unpopular In The State of California.

Push Their Way to Control of Industries and Obtain Throttle Hold on People.

Just a few reasons why the Jap is unpopular in California are given by H. E. Boerke in the New York Times, as follows:—

"The objection to the Japanese invasion of California is that the first skirmish will eventually be a world-wide race war between the yellow and the white races. If you had lived in California for any length of time you would be in a position to feel the throttling hand in every line of endeavour and the gradual elbowing of the masses into the most secluded corners of the State. If you were a family man and your little daughter of 5 or 6 years old were obliged to go to a public school and sit 300 days in the year at a desk with a Jap 22 years old in front of her, and a Jap 25 years old back of her, would you like it? If you owned a house which you had bought for the purpose of making your home and had paid for it out of your hard-earned money, would it appeal to you to find some bright morning that twenty Jap families occupied the house next door and intended staying there? Naturally, you would sell your house, and the buyer would be a Jap. Then within a few months your entire neighborhood would be infested, and real estate values would decline as a result about 50 per cent. to 75 per cent. in valuation. If you owned a fruit ranch in the northern part of the State and were paying say \$1.50 a day to white labor, should a Jap—a better laborer, to be sure—offer to do the work for less than half the amount, what would you do? Do those who look upon California's attitude as arrogant and impulsive realize what Californians have endured for the last twenty years?"

Japs Becoming Powerful.

"Some of the greatest industries of the State are virtually controlled by the Japs, who live on practically nothing, hoard their money, and send it back to Japan, or reinvest it in lands adjoining, for the purpose of establishing a Japanese colony and an eventual foothold for the Imperial Government."

"A few years ago we had an old faithful Japanese servant. He had been with us twenty years or more, and finally decided to go back to Japan and die. After he left, while we were cleaning out his room, the maid found an old box secretly locked and thrust in an obscure corner of the room, evidently with the idea of having it hidden. Inspection proved the box to contain a series of maps outlining every seaport and every identification on the California waterfront from the northern boundary down to San Diego. For his Emperor!"



Little was done before April though during that month the fishery was good, but it did not pull up sufficiently to overcome the poor work done in March. The bankers which fished the Southern banks did fairly well, but those who took the Northern grounds did poorly. The fishery north is bad, and there is a great lack of bait. There is every appearance that there will be a big shortage in the Shore fishery generally. The only consoling fact is that the prices ought to be favorable, but that will of course benefit those only who get fish.

The cry of "Get More Fish Work" is being sent throughout the land. We should imagine it will receive a poor reception. People are naturally disgusted at the carnival of extravagance. They are alarmed at the financial blundering of the Government.

ernment. Morris made such a serious blunder in estimating the cost of his branch railway building, and so much that people fear the obligations incurred by his Government will land the country into serious embarrassments. He blundered too in agreeing to pay the contractor in gold, thereby forcing the country to float loans to raise the money to pay the contractors.

While this is going on, people see the wasteful expenditure going on at all hands, and they are wondering what the end of it all is going to be. They see now the folly of having a Government in charge of Government affairs and they are looking forward to the fall, when the chance will be theirs of putting an end to this carnival of waste and of putting back in power an administration which will be economical and conduct the government wisely and well.

 LONDON, To-day.
 Seven suffragettes and their male champions, one of whom was a clergyman, were ejected for raising a disturbance during the course of a speech on Saturday afternoon, by Lloyd George, at a garden party organized by the Radicals of West Islington. Despite the Chancellor's plea for the removal of the disturbers to be done gently, one woman was so badly mauled she has to receive medical treatment. From that on Lloyd George's speech was without interruption.

Special to Evening Telegram.
 JOHANNESBURG, To-day.
 The settlement of the strike among gold miners of the Rand District, which the Government arranged with a committee of strikers proved ineffective, though comparative order was preserved over the night. The mobs reassembled on Sunday. All the trains and street cars suspended service, the crews refusing to work, no newspapers were able to publish, additional troops guard the Rand Club which was the scene of serious encounters on Saturday. A great mob assembled outside the building, hooting and jeering troops. Up to three o'clock on Sunday afternoon there has been no further firing, but only a spark is required to start a conflagration. The Federated Unions flushed with success are confident they can compel the mastery of the situation. The Trades Unions are ready to carry out any order given them. The leaders have already commanded the newspapers to cease publication until further notice. They count on the Government's fear of natives, 200,000 of whom are locked in compounds at the mines. They might start looting and killing if unloosed. The terms of settlement failed to stipulate when the men should return to work, thus leaving matters in a chaotic condition. The casualties resulting from the fighting on Saturday are not estimated at 110, two officers and three soldiers and several policemen were wounded.

Special to Evening Telegram.
 JOHANNESBURG, To-day.
 The strike which involved practically all the gold mines of the Rand ended Saturday. During its brief existence anarchy reigned in the city. There was much bloodshed and casualties estimated at more than one hundred. The authorities were finally compelled to declare martial law and during several hours on Saturday, troops raised the streets, with rifles. Negotiations which brought about the settlement of one of the most serious situations in the mining district ever encountered, opened Saturday afternoon and were brought to a successful conclusion. After several hours' discussion the strike leaders agreed to the terms proposed by General Louis Botha, ex-Premier of South Africa, to Sir George Farrar, Chairman of the East Rand mines. General Smith took part in the negotiations. Before the settlement was reached there occurred the fiercest and most sanguinary conflict between police and troops, and the mobs, that had yet taken place. Early in the afternoon, crowds gathered in front of the Rand Club and began to stone it. They disregarded the orders to disperse and the troops fired with deadly effect. Near the Union Club another mob was scattered by the Dragoons, who charged fiercely. Some of the principal streets were the scene of sharp engagements and the ambulance was kept busy for the soldiers armed, killed and wounded within a comparatively short time 60 rioters. The fighting in other quarters swelled the casualty list, believed to be considerably over a hundred. The terms of settlement are as follows: 1. The strike is to be immediately declared off; the strikers to return to their homes and all further disturbances to cease. No more property is to be destroyed. 2. The men of the Kleinfontein mines are to be reinstated; the government is to grant suitable compensation to strike-breakers who are in no way to be victimized. 3. Strikers in other mines are to return to their work, and to be taken back to mining operations resume, and no victimization of workers are at liberty to lay any other grievances before the government who will inquire into them.

The Flight from England
 The tide of emigration from this country is flowing strongly. Wherever one travels in rural England and Scotland one hears of big parties of emigrants off to Canada or to Australia. This is probably for their own good. The trouble is that on every hand one sees the need of them in the very countries which they are leaving.
 Five thousand people have sailed from Bristol to Canada since the beginning of the year.
 Two hundred emigrants a week have been leaving Devonshire for months past to the alarm of the farmers. And the total is said to be 14,000 for the last 18 months.
 Last week one Allan liner took 1,000 passengers to Canada from Liverpool; while another Allan liner took 400 direct to Canada from Plymouth. Of this last ship the report is "the fine type of emigrant leaving the Old Country was particularly noticeable."
 In Cornwall the failure of the fisheries has sent hundreds to Canada.
 The same tale is told if you go North, and weekly sailings to Canada from the Clyde are on the highest scale and are distressing so far as they depopulate Scotland. The advance bookings at all ports show that the tide is still far from ebbing.
 The supreme problem obviously is to make the United Kingdom as desirable a place in which to live in as Canada and Australia appear to be in the dreams of the emigrant.—Public Opinion.

National Physique.
 A wild wave of athletic fervour spread itself tentacle-wise from Berlin all over the German Empire recently when the Kaiser opened the great Stadium, which is to be used at the 1916 Olympic Games. A march past of 30,000 athletes was also held, and the display given before a great crowd, mostly composed of members of athletic clubs, was much more impressive than anything seen at the Stockholm Games last year.
 So seriously has Germany taken her preparations for the great festival three years hence, that athletes are regarded light there. Small stadiums are to be erected everywhere for the training of the provincials, and the country should reach a physical standard of fitness by 1916, far exceeding that existing in Great Britain to-day.
 So serious a menace to our athletic supremacy does the German revival portend that a Daily Graphic representative called recently on Sir Alfred Frapp, surgeon-in-ordinary to the King and the Duke of Connaught to obtain his views on the question.
 Sir Alfred who is surgeon to Guy's Hospital, is a great expert on physical culture, and is one of those rare types who practise what they preach. Of splendid height and build one can justly say that whatever may be the matter with the national physical there is nothing wrong with his own.
 "I read with great interest the

accounts of the opening of the German Stadium," he remarked "and I see that their preparations for the Games are to be thorough."
 Sir Alfred does not think there is much the matter with the British physique on the whole, but adds: "Our organisation for the Berlin Games is all behind, and it must be quickly taken in hand if we are not to be beaten in the field by Germany. I certainly think," the eminent surgeon concluded, "that something ought to be done towards making the improvements of physical culture a national movement."

Obtain Valuable Jewels.
 Audacious thieves by a ruse, succeeded in obtaining possession of a large quantity of valuable jewels in the public sale-rooms at Drouot House, Paris, in broad daylight, recently. One of them attracted the attention of the porter while another stole his keys from an adjacent book. The second man then entered the room where the jewels were exhibited in anticipation of their sale by auction. He seized many of them, including a necklace, consisting of 60 large pearls, and decamped without detection, the other thief disappearing at the same time.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

JOHANNESBURG, July 6.

Four civilians were killed and 50 wounded at a midnight riot, connected with the miners' strike. Cavalry made repeated charges against the mob, and wild confusion continued throughout the night with most of the streets in darkness, the lamps having been destroyed by the rioters. The mob, which seized the railway station and the Braamontein sidings, half a mile away, were unrestricted masters of the situation, and had the railway officials at their mercy. While the troops of police were engaged in other parts of the city, the rioters held up all outgoing trains. The station master appealed to the leaders to allow trains to leave with women and children hastening out of danger. They promised to do so, but did not fulfil their promises. Later when the police got the upper hand, an attempt was made to despatch the southern mails. This

was the signal for a savage onslaught by the mob with sticks and stones, and the police, within the building, were overpowered. In the meantime an enormous crowd gathered outside. Mounted troops charged them three times, the rioters retreating with stones and bullets. By 9 p.m. the situation was extremely grave. Park station was in flames and incendiaries were setting fire to other large buildings. The Star building was fired from front and rear, and was soon a mass of flames. Mounted horses galloped up, but found it impossible to gain control. They were jeered when they called on the rioters to cease disorders. At first the troops and police refrained from using their fire-arms, but later fired over the heads of the rioters, who continued to shower them with stones and bottles. Then a second volley was fired into the crowd, which somewhat cowed the rioters.

Right Wing Wiped Out

BELGRADE, July 6.
The Servians have captured Kotchana, after a severe battle. It is reported that the Bulgarian right wing, commanded by the War Minister, General Kovatcheff, was annihilated, and important war trophies captured. The Servians have seized the strong Bulgarian position of Rayichana, which dominates the White Plain of Kotchana, according to an Eskub dispatch. The position was defended by 32 Bulgarian battalions, with 80 guns and fortified entrenchments. The Bulgarians are retreating precipitately.

The Reich asserts pourparlers are passing between Greece, Servia, Montenegro and Roumania with the object of forming a new quadruple alliance. Rumors are persistent that Turkey threatens war unless Bulgaria evacuates Rodosto on the coast of the sea of Marmora.

Paul Jones.



Paul Jones, one of the best known members of the Jones family in this country, was born 108 years ago yesterday in a fishing village in the southwestern part of Scotland. Mr. Jones did not stay where he was born long enough to contract the Scotch language and on account of having been provided with antennae in the place of legs he never wore kilts with any degree of satisfaction.

As a young man, Mr. Jones removed to Virginia and hired out as able seaman to a gentleman who made a good living by flustering along the coast of Africa and snaring slaves. He arrived home from one of these trips about the time King George III had decided to subdue the thirteen colonies by depriving them of Oolong tea, and not being in sympathy with this enterprise he had himself appointed commander of a fleet of vesicles and announced that he would now raise seven kinds of intermittent purgatory on the high seas.

The first thing Mr. Jones did after landing his appointment was to design the first American flag. This consisted of an evergreen tree surrounded by a sour-faced rattlesnake with tail coiled in a circle. Mr. Jones took this flag with him and succeeded in pinning it on a large number of British ships which had no use for it.

During the war Mr. Jones went several miles from land and tackled everything he met that looked as though it might have been made in England. This made him very unpopular, and the British admiralty offered a large reward to anybody who would cure him of the habit of bringing his remains to England in a gunny sack. Every once in a while Mr. Jones would steal up on a collection of English vessels which were not aware that he was in the same township, and after showing them the rattlesnake would blow them out of the water in a cheerful and whole-souled manner. He generally preceded this act by remarking, "I have not yet begun to fight," a saying which has inspired many a high school graduate who later did most of his fighting with an 18-ounce cue.

After the war Mr. Jones went to Paris and lived on adulation and absinthine for a number of years, after which he died in dire poverty July 18, 1792. He was the first to prove that the American is a good fighting man, wherever you put him, and a grateful country acknowledges the debt.

Clearing the Bunkers.

The work of discharging the coal from the cross bunkers of the Manchester Port, that was on fire at sea while en route from Montreal to Manchester with deals and general cargo, was continued all yesterday. It was carried on under great difficulties as those engaged had to take shifts of an hour, the fumes from the smouldering coal being very trying. The laborers made good money, working night and day since Thursday last, as they were paid double the rate of ordinary longshore work. The Manchester Port berthed at A. Harvey & Co's. pier this morning to have her bunkers replenished. The ship will sail to-morrow morning for her destination.

Cable Broke by Bergs.

The cable ship Mackay-Bennett arrived at three o'clock yesterday afternoon from Halifax, which port she left at 10 a.m. on Friday last. The ship was ordered here to repair the Commercial Company's cables which were broken by an iceberg that went aground at Cuckhold's Cove. To-day she began her work.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. COMBRA, Portugal, To-day. The entire populace has gone on a general strike in protest against the decision of the government to transfer the Law Faculty of Coimbra University to Lisbon. The street cars were stopped and all city services suspended, payments, business houses are closed. Merchants suspended payments and the municipal government officials tendered resignations. The government is hurrying reinforcements of troops to the city.

SALONIKI, To-day.

Despatches continue to report Greek victories. The Greeks are said to have captured sixteen guns at Doiran. Evidence of desperate fighting was found on the arrival of eight thousand wounded at Saloniki, taxing the town's accommodations and resources to the uttermost. A conservative estimate of the killed and disabled in last week's fighting fixes the number from 30,000 to 40,000. Thousands of destitute refugees from the scene of the fighting are pouring into Saloniki.

LONDON, To-day.

After ten days fighting of more severe and deadly character than anything in the last Balkan war a little light begins to break upon the hitherto obscure operations. In the first place the Servians have lost more than in the whole of the previous contest. Semi-official statements issued at Belgrade, have the appearance of a intention to prepare the public for news of disaster. Desperate fighting with fluctuating fortune is proceeding along the Vardar and Bregalnitsa rivers which seems to be the news received of a Bulgarian invasion of Serbia through Belogradchik about forty-five miles northeast of Nish. Serbia's most important fortified town. There is heavy fighting also between the Servians and Bulgarians South of Isup and in the neighborhood of Kocichana, about two hundred thousand men are engaged. The losses on both sides appear terrible. Bulgaria's strategy appears to be to hold the Greeks in check, probably with comparatively small forces, while she deals with Serbia. This assumption if correct would explain the victorious advance of the Greek army.

"Sing that," he said, and he motioned to the pianist to play the accompaniment. "Go on!"



Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, July 6.
Barrett and Kenny, suffragette criminals, have been temporarily released. Hunger strike.

BOLTON, July 6.
The caretaker of the new Town Hall, here, which cost \$150,000, found a bomb, and extinguished the fuse in the letter box.

HENLEY, July 6.
The Leander Boat Club, yesterday, won the Grand Challenge Cup for eight-oared crews, by beating Jesus College, Cambridge.

PHILADELPHIA, July 6.
Five were killed and three injured one fatally, last night, when the Scranton flyer from Philadelphia to Reading, struck a wagon, containing a picnic party, at a railway crossing.

CHICAGO, July 6.
The Fourth of July celebration this year, resulted in only 8 deaths and 265 injuries, with a smaller fire loss than in recent years. Three of the deaths were from fireworks, three from fire-arms, one by explosion and one by railway.

JOHANNESBURG, July 6.
A collision between aeroplanes resulted in the death of one of the aviators and the serious injury of the other. The biplanes, piloted respectively by aviators Helscher and Captain Friedel, came together at dusk at a height of 60 feet. Friedel's spine is injured.

LONDON, July 6.
The Methodist chapel at Fyfield which recently cost \$40,000, was destroyed by fire this morning. An attempt was also made to burn down the Baptist tabernacle. This is the fourth case of sacrilege in North Wales this week. Suffragettes suspected, but no evidence.

LONDON, July 6.
It is reported in official circles that General Kitchener will not remain in Egypt much longer, and will succeed Lord Hardinge as Viceroy of India. Lord Hardinge has never fully recovered from the injuries inflicted by the anarchist bomb at Delhi.

SOFIA, July 6.
It is officially announced that three Serbian battalions which invaded the Kristendil district of Bulgaria, have been defeated and driven back north of Egri Palanka. Two hundred Serbian officers and men have been taken prisoners and several guns captured. The Serbian division, which had been surrounded near Veles, was completely defeated after a desperate resistance; 25 officers, 300 men, 4 field pieces and 2 mounted guns were captured. The Serbian main army is concentrated in the neighboring heights of St. Nicholas, and are helpless spectators of the disaster.

VIENNA, July 6.
Desperate fighting since yesterday is reported near Veles. The Nieuw Free Press correspondent says the Bulgarian troops repulsed the Serbian southern army with heavy losses. He also telegraphs that a great battle extending over an area of 50 miles is being fought north of Salonika. The Bulgarians, since Monday last, have made a number of minor attacks, with the object of inducing the Greeks to take the offensive. The bait was taken; and the battle begun. The result, it is expected, will be the deciding factor in the Graeco-Bulgarian campaign. The strategy of the Bulgarian commander forced the Greeks to abandon several fortified positions near Salonika, Lanjasa Lake, and Ressick Lake. The Greeks are now threatened by an outflanking attack, and the Bulgarians are advancing from South Tasynos Lake.

LONDON, July 6.
The Johannesburg correspondent of the Daily Mail, says that the authorities blundered first by taking advantage of an old Dutch law prohibiting the meeting of strikers; second, by permitting the strikers to enter a space and hold a meeting. The mob ranged round the town breaking all the windows and looting the gunsmiths' shops. During the riot one striker was trampled and terribly injured. The offices of the Village Main Reef Mine were completely wrecked; after three policemen, guarding them, had been beaten insensible. The strikers will stick at nothing, and it is feared many mines will be flooded. The general opinion is that the Government ought to have crushed the riot vigorously. The strikers are armed and have large quantities of explosives. Experienced officials are anxious about the natives. There are 20,000 of them in the mine compounds. They have already shown a disposition to start fighting. It is believed that the Government will be obliged to put large forces of troops in the Rand district and declare martial law.

The members and friends of St. John's Lodge No. 5, Society of United Fishermen, held their annual excursion Wednesday, July 2nd, Bay Roberts was the place selected by the Committee and the welcome they received and the kindness displayed by the residents showed the wisdom of their choice. Though the necessity for his part of your Society's benevolent work is practically a thing of the past in this Bay, we have no doubt that here are numbers of old fishermen who remember the assistance received from your organization; and since Providence has been kind enough to order unnecessary this part of your work, there still remains to you the remembrance of your splendid motto: "Purity, Love, Temperance and Fidelity."


