





He was a keen student not only of its ecclesiastical and civil history, but of the many international treaties which have trammeled and retarded its progress in the past. Even of more importance than this, he was a most powerful advocate of the rights of his native land in the international controversies which at times waged round these treaties. The columns of past issues of the Evening Telegram afford ample testimony of the late Archbishop championing the rights of Newfoundland in the struggles which occurred in connection with the French Shore and the American treaties. His was the well known initials, M. F. H. appended to these articles. In addition to the interest he displayed in these matters of high international politics, he was a close student of folk-lore of his native land, and the articles he contributed to the Newfeature of that publication. As to evidence of his able episcopal administration, one has but to look around the city, and the story of his life is told in many of the monuments of his church. Those of his church can however best testify to his life work, as bishop and archbishop, but all can pay a mead of praise to the high church dignitary who was a true lover of his native land, and whose last sermon was on the Sunday preceding the sailing of the Newfoundland regiment, when he commented on the justice of







GERMANS WRECK ARRAS.

North of France, Oct. 9.-Refugees eaching the sea coast to-day from Ar-as report that yesterday the Germans shelled the town and ruined the glori-ous old belfry of the Hotel de Ville. They also sent several projectiles crashing into the cathedral. Thus does history repeat itself. The cathedral church of St. Vaasts stands

on the very spot of the early Christian church which was destroyed by Huns.

and that the belfry, the greatest ornament of the town, was in ruins.

The artillery fire was concentrated on the Hotel de Ville, or city hall, yesterday morning. There was no reason for it except a senseless desire to smash something that the citizens treasured and visitors admired. If there had been any desire to spare this ground sixtenth agricus, specimen. this grand sixteenth century specimen of the master masons' art, it was prominent enough for any expert gun-ner to avoid hitting it, and so was the cathedral, which lay behind it.

## Traitor Degraded.

Dramatic Scene in Paris.

Paris, Sept. 27.—The courtyard of the Paris Military School was the scene of a dramatic ceremony yester-day morning. In the presence of de-tachments of the 29th Regiment of French Territorial Infantry and of the 1st Cuirassiers the spy Grualt, a clerk convicted of having attempted to sell the plans of the military wireless station on the Effel Tower to the Germans, was degraded in accordbetween a guard of four soldiers with fixed bayonets. The officer commanding read out the sentence of death, passed by the court, which has since been commuted to imprisonment for life in a fortress, after which he pronounced the customary formula:

"Grault, you are unworthy to bear arms. In the name of the French people we degrade you."

Thereupon a corporal seized the prisoner and ripped from the latter's uniform his corporal's stripes and buttons of his tunic, after which Grualt, who with bowed head looked the very picture of shame, was marched along the front of the troops in dead silence and then sent back to prison in a prison van.

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
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
