War News

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.
PARIS, Oct. 15.
 The following official announcement was issued this afternoon: "On our left wing the enemy has evacuated the left bank of the Lys between the Lys and the canal of Bassée. The situation shows no change to the right of Lens and between Arras and Albert. Our progress has been marked between the Somme and Oise. There has been no change in the centre between the Oise and the Meuse. We have advanced in the direction of Craonne to the northeast of the highway from Berry au Bac to Rheims and to the north of Prunay in the direction of Bein. Several German trenches have been taken between the Meuse and Moselle. After having repulsed during the night of October 13th certain attacks to the southeast of Verdun our troops advanced on the 14th to the south of the highway from Verdun to Metz. On our right wing a partial offensive movement undertaken by the Germans in the Bau-de-Sapt to the north of St. Die, has been definitely checked. In Russia the fighting continues along the front beginning in the vicinity of Warsaw, stretching along the Vistula and the San as far as Przemyśl and further in a southerly direction as far as Dnestre. There has been no change in East Prussia."

URGES PREPARATION.
LONDON, Oct. 15.
 The Times military critic, discussing the possibility of the Germans attempting to force England, thinks the Government ought to instruct the people and authorities how to act in the event of such an attempt, and to make up their minds whether it is prepared to fight, regularly or irregularly, in repelling invasion. The Times points out that there is no Commander in Chief in the British Isles, except Lord Kitchener, and unless one mind presides over the numerous garrisons, and various armed forces, which would be used in defence, there can be no unity of action. Desperate as the attempt would be, the writer adds, great success on the Continent may tempt Germany to risk a blow at England, and the more completely we are prepared the less likely is the attempt to be made.

GERMANS OCCUPY BRUGES.
LONDON, Oct. 15.
 A despatch from Amsterdam confirms the report that the Germans have occupied Bruges.

MISS CATHERINE MORRIS COMING TO ST. JOHN'S.
LONDON, Oct. 15.
 Miss Catherine Morris sails by the Digby for St. John's, to organize a Queen Mary's Needlework Guild. She will then proceed to Canada.

PANAMA CANAL.
PANAMA, Oct. 15.
 A serious landslide in the Culebra Cut, at a late hour last night, interrupted completely all traffic through the Panama Canal. Several ships in the Canal have been unable to complete their passage.

RUSHING TROOPS.
LONDON, Oct. 15.
 German troops are rushing to the front, says the Copenhagen correspondent of the Times, stating that owing to the failure of the Russians to make progress against the Germans, the Germans have decided to immediately transfer considerable masses of troops from

several points along the front. On the left wing to the north of Lys, we have taken Estaires, on the centre to the north and east of Rheims, we have made an advance of nearly two kilometres, about a mile and a quarter. On the heights of Meuse and in the Woerthe region we have made gains to the south of St. Mihiel and near Marcheville.

FRENCH IN ALESATIAN TOWNS.
LONDON, Oct. 15.
 A message from Basle, Switzerland, states that the French have reoccupied Altkirch and Muelhausen. The Germans, it is said, were compelled to use 150 motor cars to carry off their wounded.

PANIC AT OSTEND AND CALAIS.
FOLKESTONE, Oct. 15.
 The "Kentworth," one of the last of the steamers to leave Ostend, arrived early to-day bringing 7,000 refugees, among them some Belgian soldiers, and as they were not wounded, the inference is that the Belgians considered that the taking of Ostend by the Germans was inevitable, and so caused the removal of every one who otherwise would be likely taken prisoners. The captain of the Kentworth said he left Ostend at 8 o'clock last night, and there were no Germans then in evidence. A small steamer reaching here to-day from Ostend via Calais, reported that the residents of Calais were in almost as great a panic as the people of Ostend, apparently believing that the Germans would soon be upon them.

REFUGEES FROM OSTEND.
LONDON, Oct. 15.
 As indicating the panic among those leaving Ostend, more than a dozen oyster trawlers arrived at Lowestoft, Suffolk, crowded with refugees, mostly women and children and old men. All bore evidence of fright and exposure. The Mayor and other officials of Lowestoft met the unfortunate refugees and distributed food and clothing among them.

ALGERIAN FORCE DEFEATED.
PETROGRAD, Oct. 15.
 The Russian General Staff issued the following statement to-day: "There is no change to report on East Prussia and Central Vistula fronts. South of Przemyśl a Russian column engaged and defeated a force of Austrians, taking seven officers and capturing many rapid fire guns."

CRUISER YARMOUTH MAKES CAPTURE.
LONDON, Oct. 15.
 The Admiralty announces that the British cruiser Yarmouth has sunk the German-Hamburg Line steamer Markomania in the vicinity of Sumatra, and has captured and is taking into harbor the Greek steamer Rightsport. Both the Markomania and the Rightsport have been reported previously as accompanying the German cruiser Emden. The Yarmouth has German prisoners on board.

GERMAN STEAMER CAPTURED.
LONDON, Oct. 15.
 A despatch to Lloyd's from Gibraltar, says the Hamburg-American steamer Gras, from New York for Cadiz, Spain, was brought into Gibraltar yesterday, as a prize.

GENERAL BOTHA ACTIVE.
CAPE TOWN, Oct. 15.
 As a result of Colonel Maritz's rebellion in the northwest of the Cape Provinces, General Louis Botha, Premier of South Africa, and Commander of the troops of the Union, is taking the field earlier than he originally intended to do. Botha is placing himself at the head of several strong Dutch commandoes organized on the old Burger line which are affiliated with regiments trained by the Union defence force. Commanders, field cornets and buglers who served under Botha in the South African War, are rallying to his call irrespective of their political feeling, to fight alongside the English in defense of the Empire against which 12 years ago they were in arms. This fact has had a marked effect on warblers, who are now flocking to Botha's Army. Other rebels within the Union having openly declared themselves the Government considers itself not obliged to deal gently with them. Certain Dutch people, who, even though they are not strong supporters of the Government, are said to have drawn the line at rebellion. The Government also is adopting measures by arresting prominent men who are suspected of sowing sedition, charging them with high treason. General Hertzog, who has been one of General Botha's most bitter opponents, has placed his services at the disposal of the Premier.

Archbishop's Funeral.

The remains of His Grace Archbishop Howley were conveyed from the Episcopal Palace to the Cathedral at 9 o'clock last night and were placed on a catafalque, where they will remain in state until the funeral on Sunday afternoon. As the sad cortege entered the church the Dead March in Saul was played, after which the Litany for the Dead was recited. A large congregation was present, and many were the prayers offered for the repose of the soul of the distinguished Prelate.

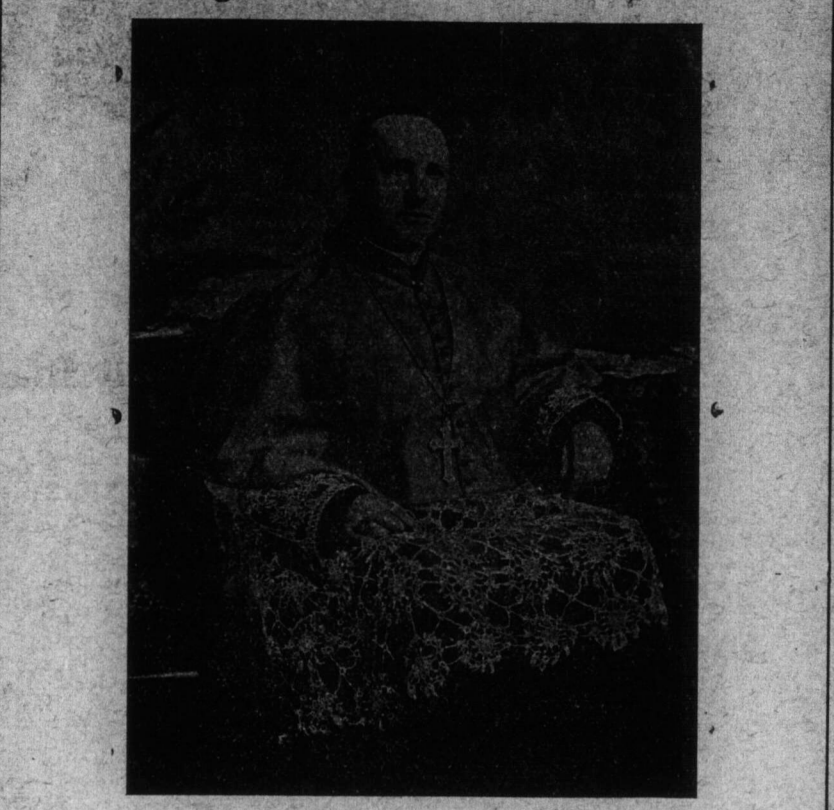

Michael Francis Howley, D.D., Archbishop of St. John's, and Metropolitan of Newfoundland, which occurred at the Archbishop's Palace yesterday afternoon, has caused a wave of sorrow throughout the Island, because in him the Roman Catholic Church in Newfoundland has lost a devoted prelate, and the country a loyal Newfoundlander.

His Grace had been ill for about a fortnight, but only on Sunday last did his condition prove alarming. His physicians were in constant attendance at his bedside, but despite their care at 10.30 a.m. yesterday it was clear that life was ebbing fast, and that in a few more hours the great Prelate would be called to his reward.

During his twenty years of Episcopacy, he has done much for St. John's. The Cathedral has been renewed at a cost of more than \$100,000. St. Patrick's Church has also been improved. The new Orphanage at Mt. Cashel will enshrine his memory while also to his energies in the interest of his Alma Mater is the erection of the St. Bonaventure's Wing due. The O'Donel Wing, St. Patrick's Hall, the Sacred Heart Oratory, Mercy Convent, Mortuary Chapel, Mount Carmel, and the several other church buildings throughout the Archdiocese, all bear testimony to his great zeal in the interests of the church.

After an absence of four months, the most of which was spent in the Far North, the S. S. Nascope, Capt. J. Meikle, came back to port to-day, having finished her engagement with the Hudson Bay Company for this year.

Famous French Belfry in Ruins.
GERMANS WRECK ARRAS.
North of France, Oct. 9.—Refugees reaching the sea coast to-day from Arras report that yesterday the Germans shelled the town and ruined the glorious old belfry of the Hotel de Ville. They also sent several projectiles crashing into the cathedral.
Thus does history repeat itself. The cathedral church of St. Vaasts stands on the very spot of the early Christian church which was destroyed by Huns. Whether shell fire has damaged Corot's superb statue of the Blessed Virgin, Babens "Descent from the Cross" and "Christ in the Tomb," attributed to Van Dyck, is not yet known here, but refugees are emphatic in saying that the cathedral had been struck and that the belfry, the greatest ornament of the town, was in ruins.
The artillery fire was concentrated on the Hotel de Ville, or city hall, yesterday morning. There was no reason for it except a senseless desire to smash something that the citizens treasured and visitors admired. If there had been any desire to spare the grand sixteenth century specimen of the master masons' art, it was prominent enough for any expert gunner to avoid hitting it, and so was the cathedral, which lay behind it.
Bombarded for Days.
There had been fighting around Arras for days. German forces gathered on the plain to the eastward last Saturday, and they were employed against the town on the following day. There was some firing Monday, but it was Tuesday and Wednesday when the heaviest attack was made.
The early bombardment from the hills did not do much damage, but yesterday morning more guns were brought into use, and the violent cannonade spread death and destruction among the people.
Some citizens had taken timely warning of the situation. No one was encouraged to remain in town. All miles between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years had been advised to go to a coast resort, where they would be safe. The younger men, liable to be so-called by the colors, were recommended to get away to avoid being taken prisoners by the enemy. Many citizens heeded the warning, but it is probable that a goodly number are hiding in the cellars of the houses whose roofs have been battered down on their heads.
French military authorities told the inhabitants they believed that within two hours the enemy would attempt to take the place. Their prediction was accurate. In less than that time the Germans advanced and, after a desperate encounter, got across the stream which runs along the eastern boundary of the town, and gained a footing inside the ramparts, an ancient fortification designed by Vauban, a famous engineer of two and a half centuries ago.
The refugees believe that the Germans entered by the Porte St. Michel, which leads to the Grande Place. One of them expressed the hope that they had left by Porte des Soupirs, the Gate of Sighs, which would, he said, be an appropriate exit for the destroyers of historic monuments.
Allies Rally to Attack.
Once in the town the enemy had no rest. The allied army on the western side had been re-inforced, probably by way of the Amiens road, which was and is still open, and while few of the civilian refugees were pouring out of Porte d'Amiens French Infantrymen entered.
As regards the damage inflicted by the shells, I am able to furnish the following details from the testimony of observers, but the list must not be taken as being complete. Germans Now Extinguish Fires

THEY SET IN ANTWERP.
Amsterdam, Oct. 12. (Despatch to the London Daily Chronicle).—I have been able to get details of the German occupation of Antwerp from Dutch friends who have been there since Friday. As neutrals they can go there with little risk, though for an English journalist to make the trip would be to invite execution as a spy. Up to the present the Germans have done no plundering; and the city is well policed by armed guards. The soldiers are using the city's brigades appliances to extinguish the fires that still smolder in buildings wrecked by shells, but the water supply seems inadequate.
Many instances of hurried flight are to be found in bundles of clothing and other property left in the streets by refugees who found that they had brought from home more than they could carry away. In the streets on the outskirts are Belgian guns still in position and hastily formed barricades.
The Germans seem very anxious for the population to return, and promise their safety if they behave peacefully. Some of the people have already returned, but there does not appear to be any general tendency in that direction.
The German soldiers entered the town singing. Many were decorated with flowers, having nosegays in their tunics, in the muzzles of their rifles, and in their horses' bridles. But this triumphant entry was only for spectacular purposes, and most of the troops afterward marched out again to encamp on the outskirts. There are now few German soldiers in the city except in the square before the Hotel de Ville.
As regards the damage inflicted by the shells, I am able to furnish the following details from the testimony of observers, but the list must not be taken as being complete. Traitor Degraded.
Dramatic Scene in Paris.
Paris, Sept. 27.—The courtyard of the Paris Military School was the scene of a dramatic ceremony yesterday morning. In the presence of detachments of the 29th Regiment of French Territorial Infantry and of the 1st Cuirassiers the spy Grault, a clerk convicted of having attempted to sell the plans of the military wireless station on the Eiffel Tower to the Germans, was degraded in accordance with the military tradition.
Grault was led on to the ground between a guard of four soldiers with fixed bayonets. The officer commanding read out the sentence of death, passed by the court, which has since been commuted to imprisonment for life in a fortress, after which he pronounced the customary formula: "Grault, you are unworthy to bear arms. In the name of the French people we degrade you."
Thereupon a corporal seized the prisoner and ripped from the latter's uniform his corporal's stripes and buttons of his tunic, after which Grault, who with bowed head looked the very picture of shame, was marched along the front of the troops in dead silence and then sent back to prison in a prison van.

Britain Needs More Fighting Men.
London, Oct. 12.—England's need of more fighting men was emphasized by the announcement to-night that the infantry standard, which has been raised to check the great rush of recruits at the outbreak of the war has again been lowered. The minimum height for recruits, which formerly was five feet six inches, has been placed at five feet four inches, and chest measurement from 35 1/2 inches to 44 inches.
An appeal has been issued in Glasgow for two thousand recruits to replace the naval men interned in Holland.

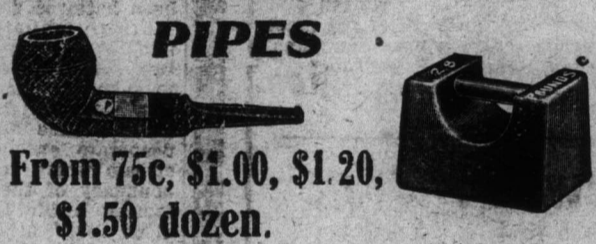
