COMING ASHORE.

NO BODIES DISCOVERED. Sufferings of the Rescued Passengers.

London, Jan. 24.—Information has been received here that the steamship which ran into and sunk the emigrant ship Northylect off Dungeness light-house, on Wednesday night, was a Spanish vessel bound for Cadiz. She is reported to have put into the harbor of Havre with her bows damaged. A large quantity of wrecked stuff from the Northylect has come ashore on the Kentish coast, but no bodies have yet been recovered. A committee, headed by the Lord Mayor of London, is being formed to receive subscription for the rescued passengers, who are in a destitute condition.

London, Jan. 24.—The Belgian Consult at Dover, has informed the authoraties that the steamer which ran down the Northylect was the Pelayo, bound from Antwerp for Havana. The Canadian Mail Saved.

A serious disaster took place on Friday morning, on the Grand Trunk Railway. The combined mail and baggage car of express train, leaving Toronto about six a. m., and carrying the mail, took fire and was burned completely, when within two miles of Grafton station. The outward English mail consisted of 42-bags, and with the exception of a few burned letters, which were brought back to Toronto, was completely destroyed. The baggage was also almost entirely rendered useless, and passengers by the Grand Trunk who have arrived in this city from the cast, and saw the ruins in passing say that all that would burn of the ear had disappeared, nothing remaining but the framework. The track for yards around the burned car was strewn with charred letters, newspapers, and a general mixture of smoking mail and baggage stuff. One poor fellow said he had \$300 among the debris of the burning baggage. The fire is said to have originated from a stove in the car. Happily no one received any injury.

Berlin, Jan. 24.—In the House of Deputies to-day, a question was taken up, touching emigration and the measure the Government had taken to prevent it. The Minister of the Interior replied that it was impossible to restrict emigration after granting the right of change of domicile. What was wanted was enlightened and judicious legislation, which would make those who now thought of emigrating value their country above all others. Emigration could best be counter-acted by elevating and improving the condition of the people at home. This was what the Government was coming at, and by this means it hoped to check the tide of emigration. Madrid, Jan. 24.—The Committee on Abolition of Slavery in Porto Ricc has declared in favour of granting the owners.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 24.—The official Gazette, in an acticle on the Khivan question, expresses surprise at the attitude assumed by the English press with regard to the Russian movement in Central Asia. The Gazette says:—The negociations between Russia and Great Britain on this question have all along been conducted in a friendly spirit on both sides. The object which Russia now has inview is to render peace in Central Asia more secure. It is difficult to settle the boundaries of unknown countries; but no encroachment on the territory of Afghanistan is meditated by Russia. It is probable there will be an understanding between the two Governments at an early day.

A Commission was appointed by the Sandfield Macdonald Government, and confirmed by the Blake-Scott Government, for the purpose of devising the best means of bringing about the fusion of the Courts. That Commission had been disbanded, and the Government appeared to have receded from Mr. Blake's policy, contonting themselves with abolishing some of the many anomalies which existed in the present system.

Hon. Mr. Moyest stated that the Law Committee had misapprehended the intention of the Government, and instead of attempting to devise means tending toward the partial fusion of the two Courts, had ventured on measures for their complete fusion. It was found also that the members of the Commission were unable to attend to the enormous task they had cut out for themselves; and under the circumstances the Government had shought it advisable to relieve them of their labors. Measures would be brought down during the session, by which many anomalies would be swept away.

Interdiction of Habitual Drunkards.

Mr. Pardee has introduced a Bill for the interdiction of habitual drunkards. The Bill has been deemed necessary in consequence of the fact that certain heads of families, and other persons in the Province, have been, in a good many instances, the cause of ruin to them. selves and their families, and of great loss to their creditors. The inter-dict shall deprive the habitual drunkard of the entire management of his estate so long as it remains in force. Any person who has the reputation, in the community in which he resides, of being a drunkard, shall be taken to be an habitual drunkard. The parent, wife, child, relation by blood or affinity, creditor or friend of the unfortunate respondent may be petitioner. In default of appearance by the respondent at the time and place named in the notice, the judge petitioner. In default of appearance by the respondent at the time and place named in the notice, the judge shall make an order for his interdiction. If, after the expiration of twelve months, the drunkard becomes a man of sober habits, the judge has the power to set the order of interdiction aside. The judge may appoint the wife guardian of the estate, and she shall have full authority to take any steps necessary for the protection thereof, and may prosecute and defend all actions in his name. Any person selling or giving the habitual drunkard liquor—except under the direction of a duly qualified medical practitioner—shall pay a penalty of one hundred dollars, to be recovered upon a summary application to the judge of the County Court of the County that which the offence had been committed. Any dealer supplying the habitual drunkard with liquor, after the interdiction, in addition to any other penalty, shall forfeit his license, and be unable to procure one for the next succeeding year. The provisions of the bill are none too stringent, and we hope to see it become part and parcel of the law of our land. An habitual drunkard is a curse to society generally, and to his own friends in particular; and it his class of the community are in hothy instances of the mass ready passes that we have not meliancholy instances of the mismerable deaths of habitual drunkards—aye, and occasional ones too. The man who cannot govern his inordinate desire for strong drink, should just be compelled to submit to the stringent measures prepared by the excellent Bill of which we have given a synopsis.

As some of our readers have intimated wish to get more definite information in the subject of rearing mink than has at been given, we subjoin the following-tter from a large fur dealing firm in the inited States, who have several success-all minieries in operation. They have een in the busines about five years and ave so far raised over three hundred. They say:—

been in the busines about five years and have so far raised over three hundred. They say:—

"A pen, one fourth of an acre in size, is plenty large enough to raise four or five hundred mink. Around it there should be a close board fence, six or seven feet high, smooth on the inside to prevent climbing, and set deep enough in the ground to prevent their diging under it, while a running stream should pass through the enclosure, as the inmates must have running water to play in. In the way of food they will eat fish, fresh ineat scraps, or in fact anything but salt food. It is not requisite to feed them more tharbonce a day. Some small boxes fitted with holes in their sides, should also be placed in the enclosure, and filled with fine hay or straw, in which they will make their nests. The males should be kept by themselves, except for about three weeks in the month of April. The young may be allowed to remain with the mother for two months, after which age they should be put in a separate pen, as they thrive much better when separated from the older animals. When they have matured in size, and appear in a healthy condition, they can then be at liberty to join the others. In conclusion the expense of keeping them is small, and with care and attention they will thrive, while a ready market is always obtainable for their pelfries."

The above will give data upon which to make a commencement. A pair of mink-could be trapped at this time of year quite easily, and the business entered upon at once. It may be stated that when practicable we consider a stone of brick wall preferable to a board fence for the mink pen.

A BURNING MOUNTAIN IN ORIO.—A very singular phenomenon is attracting attention in Ross county, Ohio. A hill of considerable altitude, known as Copperas Mountain, is located three miles from Bainbridge, from the top of which issues a constant stream of smoke, while on its summit, and general surface the vegetation has withered until the whole hill presents a barren, sterile and desolate aspect, blasted as if by a whirlwind of five. It is believed that the interior of the hill is a mass of ignited combustible matter, and that the fire is, and has been, spreading with considerable rapidity. The theory presented to account for it is, that on or about the first day of last October, the party to whom the land belongs was burning brush on the hill-side, and that the flames communicated to inflamable matter, probably crude oil, coal or other cumpustable substances, contained in the geological formation of the hill. The quenching of the fire is, of course, impossible from its situation, and how soon, if ever, the fire will reach a point where it can be controlled, can only be conjectured. At present there is no danger to be apprehended to property in the vicinity.
