Eramosa Fall Exhibition.

The Eramosa Fall Exhibition was held on the grounds of the Agricultural Society, at Rockwood, on Tuesday. The Society has improved their grounds by removing the large stones from the centre, and also cleaning up the fine grove at the further end, which makes this part of the grounds quite a resort for those who wish to take a walk among the trees. They have also erected a new building for the exhibition of grain roots, etc., as the Hall was too small for the accommodation of all. The attendance was large, the fair sex being largely represented. There was also quite a number of Galphites present. Among those who were trying to turn an honest penny was J. Griffith with his merry-go-round; he seems to be gathering in the "root of all evil" in the shape of five cent pieces pretty fast. Next is Mr. Sutton, of Warner & Sutton, displaying of candies and cakes. Mr. J. Hunter had a fine selection of jewellery, which he was selling at such reasonable prices that his stock rapidly declined. Messrs. Bell & Co. showed one of their fine organs. Mr. J. A. Tovell had a fine set of team and one set of single harness on exhibition only. There were several others down on business; and others for pleasure. In the Hall there was a splendid display of fancy work, fruit, &c. The display of apples was as good, if not better, than at the Central, there being 131 lots of 25 collections of grapes 15, pears 30, and plums 15. There was a splendid display of butter in rolls, there being 25 exhibitors in that class, and in firkins 22, all of which looked first-class. There was a fine show of home made bread, also some nice cheese. In ladies' fancy work, a display of almost every kind was exhibited. In quilts and coverlets the show was fair. Ornamental and crochet work was good in almost every pattern and design. Fancy knitting, socks, stockings and mitts were in endless variety. The show of hand made gent's shirts was very good. Fancy worsted work was excellent, but there were few exhibitors. There were several fine wreaths made from hair, feathers, shells, &c. There were four fine pen and ink sketches which were done by a weaver, and were highly creditable. A nice assortment of hooked mats was exhibited, which for neatness and design would be hard to beat. There were four pairs of fine boots shown, and one pair of ladies' boots. Mr. J. W. Knowles showed two fine sets of team harness and one single set, all of which were very superior. The show of house flowers was rather poor, while in the collections of annuals and bouquet the show was good. Two bottles of home made wine were shown; also fine jars of honey. In sewing machines the Osborne, Raymonds and Montreal Bingers were exhibited. Messrs. Bell & Co. and two United States organs were shown by W. Leathe, Georgetown. In grain roots, &c., the display was good. In potatoes the show was splendid both in regard to number of entries and size. Turnips were good and well represented. Business is becoming more lively than ever. The grain is coming in large quantities, and finding a ready sale. It has a tendency to make business good. There are various other buildings going on also. Mr. B. W. Henry has purchased the residence of Henry Patmore, and will shortly become a resident here. West Garafraxa Council.

The Council met at Bergin's Tavern on Saturday, the 27th Sept. Members all present. The Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted. The Reeve read the Township Solicitor's opinion touching the opening of a road between lot 9 and 10 on the 2nd con. Mr. James Muir, barrister, Ferguson, presented a petition numerously signed, praying that the Council do not open the road petitioned by James Hanna and others at last meeting, and pointing out what a great injury it would be to the property of Mr. Alex. Brown to have said road opened. The advocates of the road say it would be no disadvantage to Mr. Brown's property. John Mitchell moved, seconded by David Black, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law at the next meeting of this Council to open up a new road between the west halves of lots 9 and 10 to the centre of the concession and across the west end of the east half of lot 9 to the gravel road on the 2nd con. Carried. Moved by A. Richardson, seconded by David Black, that the Clerk write to the County Treasurer to strike off the back taxes from north-east half of lot 27, in 7th con., as it has been lately purchased from the Crown by Wm. Norrington; also the arrears against lot No. 7, 1st con. Moved by A. Richardson, seconded by R. McLeellan, that David Black be instructed to have the railing on the bridge over the Irvine on the 5th con. repaired; and that Wm. Gibson have the bridge over the Irvine on the 1st con. made safe for travel. Carried. The Council adjourned to meet when called by the Reeve.
