

Raster Sunday Services in the Differen Churches-A Fitting Celebration of the Day.

A BY-LAW

Respecting the Expenditure of the M nicipal Revenue for the Year 1891.

BE IT ENACTED by the Council of the Cor poration of the City of Victoria, as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Finance Com I. It shall be lawful for the Finance Com-mittee of the said Council to arrange for and obtain a credit, by way of overdraft upon current account with the Bank of British North America, to an amount not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$150,000, including the now existing overdraft, at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent, per annum.

2. All moneys so overdrawn shall be used for the ordinary current expenditure of the said Oorporation, and shall be repaid to the said Bank on or before the Sist day of December, 1891, out of the Municipal Revenue of the said ation for the current year

3. This By-Law may be cited as the "Bank. Bredit By-Law, 1891."
