ARRAIGNMENT OF HOLMES SCENE IN THE COURT ROOM WHEN HE WAS BROUGHT IN.

He Denies That He Killed Pitezel, His Co-accused—Nerve Foretelling Him—Pitezel's Life Has Wrought a Great Change in His Appearance—Pitezel's

Philadelphia Record, Sept. 24. Self-possessed, but with the prison pallor on his face, Herman Mudgett, alias H. H. Holmes, yesterday pleaded not guilty to the charge that he had murdered B. F. Pitezel, and was given until the 28th of next month to prepare his defence. It was the third time that the acknowledged conspirator, now charged with many murders, had been brought into court, having at his last public appearance pleaded guilty to the charge of conspiracy to kidnap the Fidelity Mutual Life Association.

Since Holmes' last appearance in court the sensational discoveries of the remains of the three Pitezel children in Toronto and Indianapolis; the inability to discover the whereabouts of Annie Williams and other persons associated with Holmes, and the charges that he had murdered them one after another, sent thrills of horror through the country, and led to the alleged murder to be looked on as a feat of the worst sort. The Criminal Court and the corridors of the sixth floor of the Public Buildings were consequently crowded yesterday morning with people seeking a glimpse of the notorious criminal, who was brought up from prison to be arraigned before Judge Finletter on the charge of murder.

It was almost 11 o'clock when the impatient audience in the hall of the Court for "Herman Mudgett, alias H. H. Holmes," accompanied by his counsel, W. A. Shoemaker and Samuel Rotan, a neatly-dressed, middle-aged looking man of medium build, walked across the room and stepped briskly into the prisoners' dock. He was slightly behind a man in a clipped brown Vaudeville beard, which, by contrast, only heightened the effect of the prisoner's pallor. He was attired in a double-breasted suit of black velvet and wore a turn-down collar and white necktie, and on the whole presented the appearance of a middle-aged, professional man, who would be more at home in a parlour than in the court room defending a prisoner, than in committing any of the numerous and bloody crimes charged against him. Holmes had been put upon the scales before being removed from prison to court yesterday, and his weight showed a loss of 24 pounds during his 10 months at Moynessing.

The Women Called Him "Mec." There were many women in the audience who appeared to be favorably impressed with the prisoner's appearance, and some of them openly expressed the opinion that he was a "real nice-looking gentleman." Holmes, however, appeared to be indifferent to the attention he was attracted to, except once or twice, when he stole a furtive glance around the room, slightly smiling, then resumed his stolid demeanor.

He read the eloquent and musical reading of the arraignment by Court Clerk Kintsey, who has the reputation of being melted by the heat of the sun, had no apparent effect on Holmes, and he only showed his teeth when the arraignment charged in the night of the third day of September, 1894, he had inflicted the wounds which caused Pitezel's death. Then came the question: "Pleaded Not Guilty."

"What say you Herman W. Mudgett, alias H. H. Holmes, are you a man, in any manner and form as you stand indicted, or not guilty?" "Not guilty," he replied in a low, hoarse voice, and the eyes of all present were turned on the prisoner. Lawyer Rotan leaned over the side of the box, whispering but two words to the prisoner, "Not guilty." Then the latter broke the silence by replying in a nervous and feeble voice that the clerk could scarcely hear.

"I am not guilty, sir." "How shall you be tried?" asked the clerk. "Again Lawyer Rotan held a whispered conversation with the prisoner, and following the prompting Holmes replied in a tremulous voice: "By God and my country."

"May God send you a safe deliverance," was the clerk's formal reply. This ended the arraignment of the prisoner, and District Attorney Graham immediately arising, asked the Court to fix Monday, Oct. 28, as the time for the trial of the accused, as the case was one of such peculiar character, and requires the marshalling of witnesses from so many States in the Union that it is important that a definite time in the future be set for the trial.

In reply to the District Attorney Lawyer Rotan said he did not understand that any arrangement had been made for a trial in October, and it was his duty to object. Continuing Mr. Rotan said: "The case is one that has widely divergent in the United States; it is a matter of public concern, and it is my duty to see that the public interest is protected. I therefore ask that the trial be held in this city on the 28th of October next. Therefore, I ask that the Court grant an extension of time to prepare the prisoner's case."

In reply District Attorney Graham stated that there were reasons why

day should be fixed for trial, and he presented the opinion that five weeks was ample time in which to prepare the defence.

As to the publication of sensational reports in the newspapers," said Mr. Graham with considerable emphasis, "most of these reports came from the prisoner and one of his counsel. If they are untrue, Holmes and his counsel are alone to blame. The Commonwealth has positively refused to give out any information from the start, and that policy has been strictly adhered to ever since. The jurors will be sifted by both sides as they come forward, and if any of them have any prejudice or bias they will be disqualified. The fact remains that Holmes will not be charged with any crime other than the murder of Benjamin F. Pitezel, a simple, ordinary homicide. The widow of Pitezel is in an exceedingly precarious condition, and if the case is postponed the State might lose by death this very important witness. This being the case it is imperative that a day be fixed for trial, and I ask that Oct. 28 be set down as the time. Witnesses can be brought from any corner of the country by then."

The Bones 1st Court. Judge Finletter replied that five weeks was sufficient time for the defence to get its case together; said that counsel had not presented any reason for continuance; that public prejudice would not prevent the minds of the jury, and in the absence of stronger ground for continuance the Court said he would have to deny the motion for a continuance.

The trial of Holmes will probably be the most sensational that has ever been heard in the criminal courts of this city. The bones of Benjamin F. Pitezel will be produced, and Mrs. Pitezel will be called to identify her husband by means of the teeth and other marks. Experts will be called to testify in the case, which promises to unravel the mystery of one of the most cold-blooded murders that has ever been brought to light.

PROPOSED BY-LAW. To amend By-law No. 2468, being "A By-law for regulating the erection of buildings of a certain class, and providing for vacant spaces at all dwelling houses."

Whereas, by an act passed by the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario in the 52nd year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and intimated to the Corporation of the City of Toronto, it is provided that the Municipal Council of any city having a population of fifty thousand or more may pass a general by-law of streets, alleys or other public places within the municipality wherein dwelling houses may be erected or occupied, and the minimum area of vacant land to be attached to and used with any dwelling house thereabout, and the mode of erection of buildings occupying or intended to be occupied as dwelling houses within the municipality or within any area or areas thereof to be defined by the said by-law or by any other by-law as may from time to time alter or amend or repeal any such by-law. And the said Act provides that before every such by-law is finally passed it shall be published in full twice in each week for four consecutive weeks in two newspapers published in the City, with a notice appended thereto proposing to take the proposed by-law into consideration: and whereas all notices have been given and all times have elapsed necessary to take the said proposed by-law into consideration at its meeting to be held on the 21st day of October next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto enacts as follows: I. No dwelling house or other building intended to be occupied for human habitation shall hereafter be erected, or any street, lane, alley or other public place within the City of Toronto, unless it shall be at least twenty feet in width.

Every dwelling house, or other erection occupied as a dwelling house, shall have attached thereto a vacant space having an area of at least 500 square feet, on which no building of any kind shall be erected or maintained.

Sections 4 and 5 of By-law No. 2468 are hereby repealed. Notice is hereby given that the Municipal Council of the City of Toronto proposes to take the foregoing By-law into consideration at its meeting to be held on the 21st day of October next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.
