GORE AND WELLINGTON DISTRICT BRANCH ASSOCIATION OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY.

To be published by the Seciety for Promoting Christian Knowledge, London, England.

At the General Meeting of the Society on Tuesday, the 4th of April, 1865, a resolution was passed, declaring the opinion of the Ponid—"That it is most desirable that the Society should undertake the publication of one or more first-class periodicals; and that the Standing Committee be requested to take the necessary steps for carrying this object into effect." At a subsequent general meeting it was resolved—"That, in the first instance, a periodical be issued, chiefly of a secular character, especial regard being had to the working classes, such as artisans, domestic servants, &c."

The arrangements for carrying out the above resolutions of the Board are now in progress, and the first number, and monthly part, of the periodical will appear in the first week of the ensuing year, 1867. It will be published in weekly numbers, price one penny, in monthly parts at sixpence, and also in a volume at the end of each year.

The New Magazine will be an Illustrated Miscellany of Instructive and Amusing Literature for all classes, containing—

Original Stories of striking interest, and characterized by purity of sentiment, by eminent popular writers

Historical and Biographical Papers, describing the memorable events of history, or pourtraying the lives and characters of distinguished men and women.

Sketches of Life and Manners in all parts of the world.

Review of Current Events interesting to the working classes.

Records of Enterprise and Adventure by sea and land.

Information on Science and Art.

Notices of Inventions and Discoveries, especially of such as have a practical application to industrial and domestic purposes.

Papers on Associations tending to the Physical, Social, and Moral Improvement of the Working Classes; for example, the development of the Cooperative Movement in the great manufacturing towns, and, generally, on the philanthropic efforts of individuals in all parts of the Empire.

Domestic Economy, including Hints for the Sanitary Improvement of Dwellings, Gardening, Window Horticulture, Domestic Pets, and all that conduces to the comfort and well-being of the household.

Articles on Natural History, calculated to foster the love of Nature and the labit of observation.

Educational Information. both for adults and young people.

Illustrated Sketches of the Halls, Castles, Abbeys, Cathedrals, Country Churches, and Village Homes of England.

Original Poetry, and occasional papers tending to familiarize the reader with the Literature and popular Poetry of other lands and times.

Literary Varieties, including brief descriptive notices of new books, and choice extracts

Correspondence on subjects of popular interest will be encouraged and carefully noticed; and, generally, the tendency of the Magazine will be to give to its readers higher and larger views of human life; and in all questions of social importance, not only to increase knowledge, but to enforce the better performance of Christian dury

The Illustrations will be of a very superior character, and will include subjects pinted in colors. The Magazine will be printed on good paper, in clear, readable

type, and, when bound, will form a handsome volume of permanent value. In a word, as no expense or care will be spared in the general arrangements for its production, it is confidently believed that this will be the best and cheapest journal of its class ever published.

*. The New Magazine will be issued in Weckly Numbers at a Penny, and in Monthly Parts, with an Ocnamental Wrapper, at Sixpence.

LAKEFIELD CHURCH.

On Tuesday last the new Church, dedicated to St. John Baptist, in the village of Lakefield, was opened for the celebration of Divine Worship.

At 11 A.M. a procession of clergy including the Condjutor Bishop elect of the Diocese, and the Revds. Vince at Clementi, the Incumbent, Wilson of Grafton, Beck of Peterboro,' C. Bethune of Cobourg, and Alexander of Port Hope, vested in surplice, hood, and scarf, left the Incumbent's residence, and walked to the Church, where a special service prepared for the occasion, and sanctioned by the Lord Bishop of Toronto, was conducted as follows:

The Incumbent said the Morning Prayer, Mr. C. Bethune read the first Lesson, Mr. Alexander the second Lesson, and the Bishop elect commenced the Ante-Communion service. Mr. Wilson was the Epistoller, and Mr. Beck the Gospeller. The Bishop elect then delivered an admirable and appropriate discourse from Ezekiel xhii. 12: after which Mr. Beck read the Offertory, &c., the Bishop elect concluding with a Collect and the Blessing.

Mrs. Leigh kindly presided at the Melodeon and displayed her accustomed good taste, and the Choir rendered the chants and hymns, the latter consisting of "Christ is made the sure Foundation," &c., and "Jerusalem the golden!" &c., with more than their usual force and precision.

The congregation was large, and the collection in aid of the building Fund,

amounted to the sum of \$63.

The interior of the Church presented a very beautiful appearance. On the Alter stood, in addition to its ordinary furniture, two handsome vases filled with brilliant flowers. The weather was most charming, and the strangers who favoured the congregation with their presence gave abundant expression to their feelings of delight at all they witnessed, the fabric itself and the lovely scenery of the neighbourhood.

There is still a debt of \$1,000 on the Church, and it is hoped that, now that the work is completed, those who have promised contributions will meet their engagements without further delay, and that those who have as yet failed to render assistance in the good work will be induced to come forward with their aid for the purpose of relieving the congregation from the burden of the interest payable on the sum borrowed, and which at present presses heavily upon them.
