ECLIPSES OF 1850.

There will be but two Eclipses this year, and both, of course, of the S^t, in the manner following :

I. The first will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, Tuesday, Februar^y 12th, conjunction at 1h. 49m. 48s. mean time, in the morning and consequently invisible here. Central Eclipse on the Meridian, the Indian Ocean, somewhat to the southwest of the Isles of S^{da}, at 1h. 51m. 42s. morn. of our time.

II. The second will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, Wednesday, August 7, conjunction at 4h. 54m. 18s. mean time, in the evening, but visible by reason of ☉'s low N. lat. Central Eclipse on

the Meridian, in the North Pacific Ocean, somewhat to the south-east of the Sandwich Islands, at 4h. 53m. 36s. even. of our time.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS OF 1850.

The Planet *Venus* (♀) will be *Morning Star* till March 2; then *Evening Star* till December 16th; then *Morning Star*.—*Mars* (♂) will be *Evening Star* till November 29th; then *Morning Star*.—*Jupiter* (♃) will be *Morning Star* till March 8th; then *Evening Star* till September 26th; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.—*Saturn* (♄) will be *Evening Star* till March 31st; then *Morning Star* till October 10th; then *Evening Star* to the end of the year.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, Isaac Woodward, Hon. W. F. W. Owen, John Wilson, Lient. Charles Hare, R. N., and John James Robinson, R. N., Esquires.

Isaac Woodward, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.

This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N. N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

NOTE—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, here is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them

always above water, and which Light extends Westward from the House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Capo Sable Seal Islands S. and by W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly-

" Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.

" Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

" Northern Head of Grand Manan. N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

" N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

" Little River Head, N. by W.

" Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

[It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point, and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is fixed *white* light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet.—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass where they may be useful—both are fixed and *white*. The Light house is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43, 39, N. long, 66 8. W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Light Houses in Nova Scotia—in addition to those previously noticed
Sambro—Sambro Island, mouth of Halifax Harbour—a fixed Light,
Roseway—M'Nutt's Island, mouth of Shelbourne Harbour—two Light,
 one above the other

Liverpool—Coffin's Island, mouth of Liverpool Harbour—one revolving Light.

Canso—Island, Gut of Canso, two Lights, one above the other.

Halifax—Meagher's Beach, Halifax—one Light.

Pictou—Entrance to Pictou Harbour—one fixed Light, for eight months in the year.

Cross Island—Cross Island, near Lunenburg.

Low Point—Entrance to Sydney Harbour—one fixed Light

SIGNALS.

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.

One ball close, for one square-rigged Vessel.

One ball half hoisted for two ditto.

Two Balls close, for three Vessels.

Two Balls separated, for four ditto.

A Pendant of any colour, for five ditto.

A ditto under a Ball, for six ditto.

A ditto over a Ball half hoisted, for seven ditto.

A ditto under two Balls close, for eight ditto.

A ditto between two Balls separate, for nine ditto.

A Flag of any colour, for ten or more ditto.

The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, according to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their rig can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order:

A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
 " with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker.
 " with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate.
 " with a white ditto, for a small armed vessel.
 A blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship.
 A red ditto, for a Merchant Brig.
 A white and blue ditto, for a Foreign Vessel.
 A white ditto, [without a ball,] for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.
 A blue Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
 A Red Flag pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby.
 A Red Flag with a white square, for a Steamboat from Boston.
 A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress.

Should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In foggy weather a gun will be fired from Patridge Island, in return for each heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore. Should a vessel require a Pilot her descriptive Pendant will be displayed at a yard arm in the place of a Ball.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Patridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island bearing South South East, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.

HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 2s. 6d.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150 and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200 and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300 and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; Decked Vessels, under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30 and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50 and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75 and under 80 tons, 10s.

RATES OF WHARFAGE, established by Act 5 Vict. cap. 49, in the City of Saint John and Parish of Portland—For every decked vessel, or wood boat, of the burthen of 40 tons and under 1s. 6d. per day; above 40 tons, and under 50, 1s. 9d.; above 50, and under 60, 2s.; above 60, and under 70, 2s. 3d.; above 70, and under 80, 2s. 6d.; above 80, and under 90, 2s. 9d.; above 90, and under 100, 3s.; above 100, and under 120, 3s. 6d.; above 120, and under 150, 4s.; above 150, and under 180, 4s. 6d.; above 180, and under 200, 5s.; above 200, and under 220, 5s. 6d.; above 220, and under 240, 6s.; above 240, and under 260, 6s. 6d.; above 260 and under 280, 7s.; above 280, and under 300, 7s. 6d.; above 300, and under 320, 8s.; above 320, and under 340, 8s. 6d.; above 340, and under 360, 9s.; above 360, and under 380, 9s. 6d.; above 380, and under 400, 10s.; above 400, and under 450, 11s. 3d.; above 450, and under 500, 12s. 6d.; and 1s. 3d. for every additional 50 tons.

RATES OF SLIPPAGE AT THE CORPORATION SLIPS.

All Decked Vessels, same rates as for Wharfage; Wood Boats—Three halfpence for every Ton burthen, and allowed to remain six days each trip, for the purpose of discharging: if they remain longer to pay One Penny per ton additional for each day. No Boat to remain longer than twenty days.

RATES OF FERRIAGE.

Between St. John and Carleton—from Ferry Landing at the foot of Princess street to the Landing at the end of Rodney street, in Carleton—and to the Landing at Sand Point, called Steam Ferry.

Every grown person 2d.; Children under 14 years of age, 1d. every Horse, 3d.; every Ox, Cow or other large animal, 4d.; every Calf, Swine, Sheep, Lamb, or Goat, 2d.; every Waggon, Cart, Sled,

Carriage; or other Vehicle, (loaded or not loaded with goods) usually drawn by cattle, 3d.; every Hand Cart, Sled, or Wheelbarrow, 1d.; every Barrel, 1½d.; every Pipe, Hogshead, or Puncheon, 9d.; every Cask of Lime, 3d.; every Firkin, Keg, or Small Box, not exceeding in size a Firkin, 1d.; Grain, Salt, Potatoes, Turnips, or Vegetables, usually sold by the bushel, per bushel, ¾d.; Iron, Steel, Copper, and the like, per cwt. 1d. And the rates of Ferriage for the Short Ferry, so called, and also for Ferriage across the Steam Ferry, so called, when the Steamer is lying by to clean boilers, or other circumstances preventing the plying of the Steam Ferry Boat, as follow, viz.:—Foot Passengers, 3d.; Two Horses, with Waggon or Stage, 2s. 6d.; One Horse and Gig, Sleigh, Sled, Cart, or Waggon, 1s. 6d.; an Ox, Horse, or Cow, 1s.; a Swine, 5d.; a Sheep, 4d.; a Barrel of Flour, 2.; a Keg of Powder, 3d.

RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES.

Every Load not exceeding 1000 lbs. weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional cwt.; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

HACKNEY COACH FARES—For conveying not exceeding four persons, from any public stand to any other part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, One Shilling; and for every passenger over four, Sixpence additional; if the Carriage be detained, to pay additional, at the rate of One Shilling for every half hour.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND CART MEN.—For loading, carrying, and housing any goods, or any other articles, on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several Five districts, the rates of prices are as follow:—For the first district 3d.; second district 3½d.; third district 4d.; fourth district 4½d.; fifth district, 5d.

MARKET TOLLS.—Beef, per quarter, 2d.; Calf, Sheep, Hog, Goat, Lamb, Kid, or Sheat, 2d.; Tub, Pail or Jar of Butter, 1½d.; Firkin, 3d.; every 16 lbs. of Roll Butter, 1d.; Cheese, ¾d.; load of Potatoes under 15 bushels, 3d.; ditto over 15 bushels, 6d.; load of Oysters in shell or tub, 6d.; Turkey, Goose, or dozen of Pigeons, 1d.; pair of Ducks, Fowls or Partridges, 1d.; bag of Flour, Meal, Oats, Peas, or Beans, 1d.; Ham or Shoulder, 1½d.; Eggs, per 10 dozen, 1d.; and all other articles in like proportion.

FISH-MARKET DUES.—For every Salmon, 1½d.; Codfish, Pollock, Bass, or Shad, each 1d.; Halibut, not exceeding 20 lbs. 1d.; exceeding 20 lbs. and for every 20 lbs., 1d.; every Lobster, 1d.; dozen of Haddock, 1½d.; every 100 of Gaspereaux, Alewives, Herrings, or other small fish, 1½d.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS--(near St. John.)

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

MISCELLANEOUS.

RACES OF MANKIND.—Amidst the almost infinite varieties observable in the nations of the earth, naturalists have anxiously sought for well marked characteristics, which might enable them to class the whole under a few comprehensive appellations. They have arrived at very different results; Malte-Brun, for example, describing sixteen races which he considers as broadly distinguished from each other; while other writers reduce them to five, and even to three. The arrangement now most generally approved is that of Blumenbach, which divides mankind into five leading classes or races, each distinguished by such peculiarities in the skin, hair, eyes, and shape of the head, as to stand considerably apart from the rest. They are named the *Caucasian*, *Mongolian*, *Ethiopic*, *American*, and *Malay*.—Whatever may be thought of the phrenological doctrine in its details, it is at least scarcely possible to dissent from the moderate conclusion of Dr. Pritchard, that “fully developed brains indicate great intellect.” Hence, leaving out of the question the connexion of the development of the skull with that of the facial bones, the simple *capacity* of the cerebral case becomes in itself a matter of the highest consequence. We happily have it in our power, from the experiments of a most accurate inquirer, Professor Morton, to determine the comparative capacity of the skulls of all the varieties of mankind. The following are Professor Morton's conclusions: Having obtained a considerable number of the skulls of the various races of men, Dr. Morton measured their internal capacity by means of white pepper seed, and found the following results:

It thus appears that the aboriginal Americans rank fourth with respect to the size of their brains, the Ethiopians being lowest and the Caucasians highest. The *Caucasian* race is one widely spread on the face of the globe, and, in addition to physical beauty of the highest order, is distinguished for intellectual eminence. The skin of this race may be generally described as fair; but it is susceptible of every tint, and in some nations is almost black. The hair is fine, long, curling, and of various colors. The skull is a large rounded oval, and the brow full and elevated. The face is comparatively small, oval in form, and well proportioned. The nose is arched, the chin full, and the teeth vertical. The chief families of the Caucasian variety are the *Caucasian proper*, the *Germanic* branch, the *Celtic*, the *Arabian*, the *Lybian*, the *Nilotic*, and the *Hindustanic*. A small body of pure Caucasians founded the Roman nation. The personal difference between them and

the Greeks, arose, doubtless from the extensive admixture of the early Romans with the Sabines, and other surrounding tribes. The *Celtic* branch of the Caucasians formed extensive settlements, at a very early period in Western Europe. The whole, it may be said, of Italy, Spain, France, (called Gallia Celtica,) and Britain, was peopled by them. The successive commingling of races, caused by incursions of the Greeks, Romans, and Germans, did much to obliterate the traces of this variety in its pure state; yet the race, language, and name, still remain in their primitive condition on the outskirts of the original Celtic dominions. We allude chiefly to parts of Scotland, Ireland, and Wales; and in Brittany, Gascony, and Biscay, the traces of the people are also distinctly observable.

BRITISH MINT.—The British Mint does an immense business. The amount of gold coined in 1847 reached \$400,000,000; the silver coined was only \$11,300,000, and the copper coined was a little over \$3,000,000.

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EMIGRATION IN THE UNITED STATES.—The great West is the field for emigration, both from foreign lands and from the eastern parts of our own. In 1848, it is supposed that 300,000 emigrants landed from Europe on our shores; and in 1849, their number was estimated at an average of 1,000 per day. Most of these emigrate westward. From the older states, too, the stream is constant. Fifty years ago, there were less than 300,000 people west of the Alleghanies. Now, there are 10,000,000! The commerce of the valley of the Mississippi is estimated at the value of \$439,000,000; being double the amount of the whole foreign commerce of the nation. Our entire territory is 3,252,574 square miles, nearly equal in extent to the whole of Europe! Ohio would contain Massachusetts 5 times; Texas would contain it, 44 times; the new territory, 72 times; and the whole western country, 258 times! And all this vast region is to be filled up by emigration!—*Am paper*

THE BIBLE.—It is said that in 1804, according to the best estimate that can be obtained, there was in existence only about 4,000,000 copies of the Bible. Now there are more than 30,000,000. In 1804 the Bible had been published in 48 or 49 languages; in 1848 it existed in 136. In 1804 it was accessible in languages spoken by about 200,000,000 of men; in 1847 it existed in tongues spoken by 600,000,000.

AGRICULTURE AND WAR.—It is estimated that all the agricultural labor done in England in 1848, cost £18,200,000. Official returns show that the cost of her army establishment for the same year was £18,500,000. That is, £300,000, or a million and a half of dollars more are paid for preparations for consuming and impoverishing war, than for all her golden harvests, and to the 700,000 laborers who produce them.

NUTRIMENT IN DIFFERENT SUBSTANCES.—Dr. Warwick, an English lecturer, gives an interesting comparison of the amount of nutriment contained in different vegetable and animal substances, and the time for their digestion. Of vegetables, he considers that beans contain most nutriment. As to animal substances, he remarked that mutton contained 29 per cent. of nutriment, beef 26, chicken 25, pork 24, cod and sole 21, haddock, 18, &c. As to digestion, boiled rice occupied an hour, sago an hour and forty five minutes, tapioca and barley two hours, stale bread two hours, new bread three hours, boiled cabbage four hours, oysters two and a half hours, salmon four hours. Venison chops one and a half, mutton three, beef three, roast pork five and a quarter, raw eggs two, soft boiled eggs eight, hard ditto, three and a half.

LEARN TO COOK WELL. The health of the family depends upon it. We know there are those who associate luxury, effeminacy, and all dependant ills, with every attempt of the kind recommended. But we do not believe that health is promoted by eating raw carrots, or doughy bread, or that to secure long life, it is necessary to turn cannibal. Nor were men made to graze like cattle, or eat food like a dog. Nor is it necessary, in order to shun the errors of which we speak, to rush into the opposite extreme. Good cookery does not consist in producing the highest seasoned dishes, nor such as to foster a morbid appetite; but in preparing every dish well, however simple or common it may be. There are, for instance, families who never eat any good bread from one century to another, and have no idea in what it consists. Nor are meats cooked any better within their precincts. Those little, simple, and healthy delicacies, which the good housekeeper knows intuitively how to produce, are never seen here. Even a dish of potatoes cannot get themselves well boiled. A member of the family might as well fall among the Hottentots as far as any proper nursing is concerned. These things ought not to be, nor is there any need of their existence, if the housewife has any just notions of her obligations to herself and those about her. The science of bread making, of meat broiling, stewing, roasting, and boiling; of vegetable cooking, and of preparing the multifarious small dishes of all sorts, which go to make pleasant the table, and all about, are hers—hers to understand and practice.

YOUNG MEN.—It should be the aim of young men to go into good society—we mean not the rich, nor the proud, nor the fashionable, but the society of the wise, the intelligent, and the good. When you find men who know more than you do, and from whose conversation you can gather information, it is always safe to associate with them. It has broken down many a man to associate with the low and vulgar, where the ribald song was sung, and the indecent story was told to excite laughter or influence the bad passions. Lord Clarendon attributed success and happiness in life to associating with persons more learned and virtuous than ourselves. If you wish to be wise and respected, if you desire happiness and not misery, we advise you to associate with the intelligent and good. Strive for excellence and strict integrity, and you will never be found in the sinks of pollution, or in the ranks of profligates and gamblers. Once habituate yourself to a virtuous course, once secure a love for good society, and no punishment would be greater than, by accident, to be obliged for half a day to associate with the low and vulgar.

A ROARING FOUNTAIN.—The highest fountain in the world, is on the grounds of the Duke of Devonshire, in England, where a single jet is thrown up to a height of 267 feet, more than 100 feet higher than Niagara Falls. The eight acre reservoir which supplies it, is 389 feet above.

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TEA.—*How dried by the Chinese*—The following account, by an eye witness, of the mode in which tea is gathered and prepared for market, by the Chinese, will doubtless be interesting. It is taken from a letter addressed by a lady to her parents. "On the side of the hill, we found women and children picking tea leaves from the shrub, which are as high as ordinary currant bushes. They are set a few feet from each other, and the leaves in form and size are very much like those of a wintergreen. We passed through a village of a thousand inhabitants, where we saw large quantities of tea drying on mats on the ground. But I am forgetting to tell you what I presume will be more interesting to you than any thing else I can write about—the process of curing the tea. It is very simple, and the idea which some of you "outside barbarians" entertain, that tea is dried on *copper* is entirely incorrect. It is mostly picked from the bushes by women and children, into baskets, one person being able to pick about thirty "cattis" (or forty pounds) in a day. It is then spread on mats, and dried an hour or more in the sun, previously however, having some of the juice squeezed out, and the leaves somewhat curled, by rubbing them with the hand over a rough kind of matting, which lets the juice run off. After drying in the sun, it is ready to be "fired," which is an operation we watched some time with considerable interest. A dozen or more pounds are put into a kind of kettle, resembling a potash kettle, except that it is low on the front side, and runs up some two feet behind. A man stands in front, and keeps the tea constantly stirring while being heated, which he accomplishes by thrusting his arms as high as his elbows under the hot tea, and giving it a toss upwards against the back of the kettle. This operation is kept up two or three hours, by two men, who constantly relieve each other. When this process is finished it is ready for market, but tea that is intended for exportation is again fired slightly by the tea merchants before being shipped. We drank some that was growing on the bushes the day before, and might have obtained some that had been gathered and cured that day. This tea is of a fine quality, and is known as the "Tau-bah-san" tea, from the name of the mountain on which it grows. Some of the finest of it is prepared for the Emperor. It is the *green tea* of which I have been writing. The *black*, it may be, is subjected to a process in some respects different."

ENJOYMENT OF LIFE.—Two wealthy men, considerably advanced in life, were lately conversing in regard to the period when they had best enjoyed themselves. "I will tell you," says one, "when I most enjoyed life: soon after I was twenty one, I worked for Mr. —, laying stone wall, at *one shilling and three pence per day!*" "Well," replied the other, "that does not differ much from my experience; when I was twenty, I 'hired out' at seven dollars per month; I have never enjoyed myself better since." The experience of these two individuals teaches—1st. that one's happiness does not depend on the amount of his gains or the station he occupies; 2d. that very small beginnings, with industry and prudence, may secure wealth.

MAKING YEAST.—The following mode, which is found very convenient in practice, is given by a notable housewife. One quart of hops is boiled about three hours with about seven gallons of water; after that the resulting liquid is passed through a cullender on three quarts of Indian meal, or so much that the mixture will be like *batter*. Half a tea-cup of salt is added, and when cooled to new milk warmth, half a pint of yeast. After stirring well, it stands fifteen or twenty hours, and Indian meal added till of the consistency of dough, when cakes, three inches in diameter and half an inch thick are made from it, and dried on a board by a fire; much heat will destroy the yeast, and if not dried in two or three days fermentation will proceed so far as to destroy it. These cakes will be good for three months; one of them soaked half an hour in warm, not hot water, will be enough for a large loaf. The yeast prepared by the Hungarians is similar, and will keep, it is said, a whole year. During the summer season, they boil a quantity of wheat bran and hops in water; the decoction is not long in fermenting, and when this has taken place, they throw in a sufficient portion of bran to form the whole into a thick paste, which they work into balls, and dry by a slow heat.

RECEIPT FOR CURING HAMS.—7 lbs. coarse salt, 5 lbs. brown sugar, 2 oz. salt petre, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. pearl ash, 4 gallons of water. Boil all together, and scum the pickle when cold. Put it on the meat. Hams to remain in 8 weeks—beef 3 weeks. The above is for 100 lbs. weight. It is said that hams cured by this mode are of superior quality. It is called the "Newbold receipt."

CURING HAMS.—The following mode of curing Hams has been much admired. To every two quarts of a saturated solution of common salt, is added one ounce of summer savory, one of sweet marjorum, one of alspice, half an ounce of saltpetre, and one pound of brown sugar. The whole to be boiled together, and applied boiling hot to the hams, which are to remain in pickle three weeks.

MILKING CLEAN.—Experiment has shewn that the milk last drawn from the cow is from ten to twelve times richer than the first drawn portions, or contains from ten to twelve times as much cream.

DRAINING.—Imperfect underdraining is very common. A writer in the Hillsborough Gazette gives the following good rule: If water stands on the surface of a field three hours after rain has ceased to fall, that field is not sufficiently drained for the cultivation of grains.

WASTE OF MANURE IN CITIES.—The London sewers pour daily into the Thames, 115,000 tons of mixed drainage. One part in 30 is regarded as rich, fertilizing, solid manure, or 3,800 tons daily. This amount would richly manure every year more than fifty thousand acres of land.

CURE FOR HARD TIMES.—Cheat the doctor by being temperate; cheat the lawyer by being out of debt; and cheat the demagogue of whatever party by voting for honest men.

ACTION OF WHITE LEAD

WITH OIL.—Everyone may have noticed that paint in which white lead is mixed, after it has been applied awhile, cracks and scales off. This is explained by the fact that lead exerts a chemical action on oils, in consequence of which the oil, when in combination with the lead, continues to harden, until at last, under the various changes of the atmosphere, it becomes brittle, breaks into scales, and cleaves off. On account of this action, it is thought that no white lead should be put into what is called the "priming" coat, in painting buildings or articles which are not designed to be white. Black paint is more durable than white. This may have been noticed where, as on guide boards &c., black letters have been formed on a white ground. The black remains perfect long after the surrounding parts have mouldered away, leaving the letters standing in "relief." This is explained as follows: The black paint is made chiefly of lamp black, which substance is nearly pure carbon, and is known to be one of the most imperishable substances in nature—that it is not changed by the vegetable in combination with which it is used as paint, in consequence of which the slightest film of the compound is a most durable protection against the destructive influences of the weather. — YIELD OF WHEAT FROM A SINGLE REAP.—Mr. Jonas, of Cambridgeshire, England, in 1838, dibbled in 50 kernels, the produce of one year, 30 of which only grew. A TABLE

For Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each year forever.

(FORMED BY DR. HERSCHELL, AND REVISED BY DR. ADAM CLARKE.)

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection shew the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to *midday* or *noon*, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the *wind* is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good *vane*, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
