SLEEP FOUR DAYS AFTER BATTLE

Wounded Men Taken From Front Are Usually Completely Exhausted.

WORK OF HOSPITALS

Miss Bickell and Lieut. Forener Tell of Care Given Stricken Soldiers.

Hospital work at the front was vividly described in two intensely interesting addresses given at the regular meeting of the Chamberlain Chapter, L.O.E., by Miss S. Bickell, who has just returned from a hospital at Julliy, France, and Lieut. Reginald Forener, son of Archdeacon Forener of Hamilton.

Lieut. Forener has been home since August, convalescing from shrapnel wounds. His account of the splendid attention given the wounded from the preliminary "first aid" to the time when the men are discharged from hospital was most interesting, and the keen sense of humor which is so characteristic of the men of the C.E.F. was not lacking in the speaker.

Care of Wounded. "The care given and kindness bestowed upon the wounded men is all that could be wished for," said the speaker. "We have motors to take us everywhere, excellent meals, and the hospitals are so beautifully situated. The Canadians are quite spoiled, everyone is so good. The only regret the men have is that the Canadian hospitals receive only Canadians, and this deprives them of the best experience of convalescence—meeting the splendid British Tommies, and men from all over the empire. It is a shame to keep them to themselves."

Equipping Hospitals. Miss Bickell went into detail in telling of the preparation and equipping of the hospital at Julliy, situated 23 miles north of Paris, in the wing of an old 15th century college, renovated completely for its present use. It took two months to prepare the hospital, which has three wards, accommodating 50 patients in each. Miss Bickell described the order in which the wounded are taken off the field, carried to the clearing house, and transferred to the various hospitals.



DEPOSITS INCREASE IN CANADIAN BANKS

Eighty-Five Million Dollars Gain Over October of Last Year.

LOAN ENLARGEMENT

Call Loans Outside of Canada Also Larger—Note Circulation Decrease.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—The October bank statement, issued from the finance department today, illustrates in an interesting way the trend of finance in Canada. There is a continued heavy increase in the amount of money the people have on deposit in

LORD ST. DAVIDS HOTLY CENSURED

Earl of Derby Places Peer on the Same Level as Spy.

ANSWER BY ST. DAVIDS

He Modifies Criticism of Field Staff of Sir John French.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—In severe denunciation of freedom of speech, such as in the recent instance of the speech delivered by Lord St. David in the house of lords, in which he attacked the British headquarters staff, the Earl of Derby, in charge of British recruiting, speaking before the stock exchange today, declared that the house of lords needed a censor.

After stating that "no gentleman" would have made and no gentleman would believe Lord St. David's accusations, and subjecting Lord Ribblesdale's recent utterance to a like denunciation, Lord Derby spoke of recruiting. He said he had not come to enlist recruits from the stock exchange, but to ask the loyal

the banks, both to the credit of our own savings accounts. By the greater increase in the former, known as "demand" deposits, which are close to \$32,000,000 higher than in September, and \$48,000,000 more than in October of last year. All told, Canadian deposits have increased by approximately \$41,000,000, and \$45,000,000 over the preceding month, and \$20,000,000 over the corresponding month last year, respectively. Deposits outside Canada declined by \$17,000,000 on the month, but are more than \$20,000,000 greater than a year ago. Note circulation is at \$117,000,000 over September, but \$2,000,000 under that of October, 1914.

Call and current loans in Canada increased during the month by \$3,000,000 and \$7,000,000 respectively. The former are up \$4,000,000 on the year and the latter down nearly \$40,000,000. During the month the banks reduced their call loans outside Canada by \$14,500,000, but they are still greater than they were a year ago by \$39,000,000. Current loans outside Canada increased by half a million on the month and by \$7,500,000 for the year. Assets and liabilities have materially increased, the former being \$41,000,000 greater than in September and \$79,000,000 over October of last year. The increase in liabilities are \$44,000,000 and \$84,000 for the respective pre-statement follow:

co-operation of its members in the same had undertaken. A Futility Plea. "At the present time no man has a right to say he is indispensable in his present employment," continued Lord St. David. "I am sure the numbers we will get is the moral effect upon our allies and our enemies. In showing them that the voluntary spirit in England is as strong as at the beginning of the war, every man should go before a local tribunal, which will determine whether he is indispensable."

Lord Derby asked for patience, saying that those working under his scheme were endeavoring to do it in six weeks if the position of the voluntary system was to be made untenable. "We are going to win this war, whatever the cost," he added, "but it is no more than the duty of every man to do his duty at this crisis."

STRONG DENUNCIATION. A strong aftermath of denunciation is following upon the speech of Lord St. David in the house of lords upon the British general staff in France. Several letters have appeared in The Times from such men as Lord Ruthven, Lord St. David, Lord St. John, Lord Alfred Turner and Col. Arthur Lee, repudiating with indignation the serious charges made against the staff.

The Daily Telegraph calls upon Lord St. David to retract his criticism, saying which the country will write him down as a champion of a brave and hard-working body of officers.

LORD ST. DAVIDS EXPLAINS. LONDON, Nov. 24.—Stung by the vitriolic criticism of his recent attack in the house of lords on the British headquarters staff at the front, Lord St. David today said that a wrong construction had been placed on his words. When he spoke of the visits of the staff to the front, he meant, in his mind a single visit at the beginning of the war, he said.

Following Lord St. David's explanation, Lord Crewe, as spokesman for the government, expressed his pleasure at the manner in which Lord St. David had qualified his remarks, but the incident is not considered over.

Lord Ribblesdale is yet to be heard from, and others, both partisans of Lord Derby and of the army critics, are expected to take the matter up.

KINGSTON SUBSCRIBES HALF MILLION TO LOAN Money Offered by Private Citizens—Sydenham Cheese Factory Burned.

KINGSTON, Ont., Nov. 24.—Private Verville, just returned from the front, lost his father, mother and three sisters when the Germans destroyed Belgium, and he and his brother, who is training in Ottawa, wish to get to the front to avenge their deaths. Private Verville works with the Canadian Engineers, and is Belgian. He is in the Elmhurst Convalescent Home.

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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also fifty acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months' residence in each of the three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

LUSITANIA SINKING MADE HIM RETURN

But Pte. William Borrowman Was Arraigned on False Pretence Charge.

Pte. William W. Borrowman, sales manager of the Humber Heights, Limited, who jumped his bail last year and skipped to the States, appeared before Judge Winchester, yesterday afternoon on charges of stealing about \$600 from his former employers in April, 1914, obtaining \$50 from S. Cook by false pretences and a further charge of assaulting W. Stanback.

In his defence, Borrowman said that when he was arrested last year he lost his head and jumped his bail. When he heard of the sinking of the Lusitania he said he determined it was his duty to come back and fight for his country, and he appeared in the dock in his uniform. His honor fined Borrowman \$5 on the assault charge, allowed him to go on suspended sentence on the false pretences charge and gave him until May to make restitution of the \$600 on the other charge.





LOOK AFTER TROOPS OF AMERICAN LEGION

R. S. Hubbell Has Proposal to Or-
ganize All Americans at Pre-
sent in Toronto.

R. S. Hubbell, the manager of the
Carle-Rite Hotel, is quite enthusiastic
about the American legion, the organ-
ization of which is now under way by
standing committees of the American
Legion. "Do you know," said he to The
World, "there are thirty thousand
Americans living in Toronto, and if
we go in for this thing right, we can
make a big thing out of the American
legion. We are sending away the 97th
Overseas Battalion soon and will raise
considerable funds for it. But we
ought not to let them go without any-
thing. We should get organized, those of
us who don't go overseas, and lend
every assistance to those who do go,
and to their families."
"My idea of the legion is that all
Americans here should organize into
an American legion and attempt in the
future to get the money to move
every man who is going away to fight.
After the boys have left individual
members of the stay-at-homes could
keep in touch with some one enlisted
man, writing him occasionally and the
organization could keep the boys sup-
plied with necessities, which is neces-
sary when all the families of those who
have left for the front should be look-
ed after, and where assistance is need-
ed, the same given promptly."
"Returning soldiers of the legion
should be met, and each one carefully
looked after. All this funds will be
necessary, and Mr. Hubbell believes
that much money could be raised by
the sale of button replicas of the over-
seas battalions badge.

TRADING MODERATE ON DULLE EXCHANGE

Prices Reported Substantially Better With Several New Maximums.

OIL SHARES STRONGER

Anticipation of Allies About Ceasing Purchases of Munitions Disregarded.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—The approaching holiday afforded an excuse, if not an actual reason, for another lull in the stock exchange, although trading was well in excess of yesterday's small output.

All the oil shares were strong, Texas leading with an advance of 2 1/2 to 3 on the new high price for that stock, while South Porto Rico Sugar rose 5 1/2 to 13 1/2.

War issues were not materially affected by the intimation that the allies may cease further purchases of munitions in this market.

Stocks like Sears-Robinson, Woolworth and May Department Stores, were 2 to 5 points higher, also North American, United Fruit, Pittsburgh Coal preferred, and Virginia Iron, Coal and Coke.

Rails Irregular. Rails were irregular during the early session chiefly because of the persistent pressure against New Haven, which fell 3-8 to 75-3/8, but later recovered to 76-1/2.

Metal stocks were active for the most part at higher prices, with the exception of the benefit to derive from the distribution of Guggenheim Exploration holdings.

Future sales of Mercantile Marine at a slight advance were a feature of the firm bond market. Total sales per value, \$6,175,000.

DOMINION LOAN AFFECTS INVESTMENT AND INDIRECTLY AN INFLUENCE ON SPECULATION.

Two important subscriptions were announced to the Dominion Loan yesterday, one for \$1,000,000, and the Dome Mines, for \$500,000.

WHEAT DEPRESSED ON SLOW EXPORTS

Big British Orders Canceled and Resold at Atlantic Seaboard.

LIVERPOOL DECLINES

High Vessel Rates and Railway Congestion Affected Market.

CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—Lack of export demand put wheat values today most of the time on the down grade. Quotations finished nervous, 1-4 to 1-2c bet lower with December at \$1.03 1-4 and May at \$1.06 1-8.

Assertions that Europeans instead of buying were reselling wheat at the seaboard did a good deal to give nervous sentiment decided effect.

Wheat prices showed at one time a vigorous rally but the strength appeared to develop almost entirely in response to a bulge in the corn market.

Provisions made some sharp upturns and showed unusual activity among buyers, a large number of whom, however, were shorts.

Business Remained Quiet on Montreal Exchange With Slight Advances.

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—Canadian stocks were quiet firm today, leading issues for the most part holding firm or slightly changed either way.

Munition stocks were variable and displayed no uniform tendency, iron and steel, both, showed fractional gains, and final bid for Scotia was up one point at 97 1/2.
