





- 1. All subscribers of \$1.00 and upwards to the funds of the Society shall be members for the year.
- 2. Each member will be furnished with a Member's Ticket and three gate tickets.
- 3. Member's ticket good for one admission each day; checks entitling holder to return same day as issued may be had at gate.
- 4. All entries of stock or articles for exhibition must be made on proper Entry Forms with the Secretary on or before Saturday, September 10th.
- 5. All articles of manufacture, including ladies' work, shall have been manufactured during the present year. All Animals and Articles must be the **bona-fide** property of the exhibitor, and must be produced on the exhibitor's farm or holding the present year.
- 6. No animal will be allowed to compete in more than one Section or Class, excepting in Pens of Sheep and specials.
- 7. Cows must have had calves the present year, or be evidently well gone in calf.
- 8. No exhibitor will be allowed more than one prize in each section, excepting in Live Stock.
- 9. No sacks admitted with marks, names or initials thereon, so that they may be known.
- 10. All exhibits other than live stock must be on the grounds not later than 6 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, September 13th, and all live stock not later than 9 o'clock, September 15th.
- 11. No exhibit to be removed from the grounds before 5 o'clock p.m. on the last day of the fair.
- 12. That no person be allowed to attach any prize ticket or badge obtained at other fairs on any animal or article exhibited until after the judges have made their awards.

- 13. That all articles entered for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the prize list in order to secure a prize, the exact number or quantity stated in the prize list being strictly adhered to.
- 14. That every bull must have a ring in its nose; horses, colts, cows and calves be led on the grounds and be secured by the head; and pigs and sheep confined in peas; and that owners shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe custody and fair and complete exhibition as the Committee of Management may suggest.
- 15. That the exhibitors of cattle, horses and sheep do bring them forward when called upon hy the judges, otherwise they will not be noticed by the judges.
- 16. No competitor will be entitled to premium if the judges deem the stock or article unworthy of the same.
- 17. Any person interfering, by conversation or atherwise, with the judges until after judgment is passed, shall have no prize awarded to him.
- 18. Judges will please sign and hand in their list of awards to the Secretary, and remain until their books have been signed by the Secretary, in order that eases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right, and they are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in the classes they have judged.
- 19. This Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident occurring to any person or property on the ground during the fair. The Society will take all reasonable cure of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 20. Admission to the grounds 25c, children under 12 years 10c. All vehicles (not intended for exhibition) driving on the grounds will be charged 25c., and each person in vehicle the regular admission.
- 21. For the convenience of exhibitors the Secretary will be at the Court House Hotel, Hamilton, Suturday. Sept. 10th, to receive entries, from 1 o'clock until 6 o'clock.

- 22. All entries must be in by Sept. 10. After that date 10 cents will be charged for each entry. No entries received after Sept. 10th.
 - 23. All entries over 20 will be 5 cents each entry.
- 24. All protests must be in writing, and handed to the Secretary or the Director in charge of the class, to be acted on by the Board. Six days will be allowed for the entering of protests.
- 25. The Treasurer will be at the Court House Hotel on Saturday, Sept. 17th, from 1 to 6 o'clock, for the payment of prizes, and all parties entitled to prize money are requested to call or send an order for it that day.
- 26. These rules will be strictly adhered to and exhibitors are requested to comply with them.
- 27. All exhibitors of horses and cattle that win a prize must appear in parade before grand stand on Thursday afternoon, Sept. 15, at 4:30 o'clock, or else forfeit their prize.




