of the vote. Tammany Hall had at its command not less than a million dollars, and I believe that every purchasable vote was purchased. The shamlessness with which Tammany Hall taxed the civil servants and drew upon the resources of Wall-street, has never been surpassed. One of the marked features of yesterday's election was the breaking down, thru the use of money, by Tammany Hall, of the Hearst election machinery. If Mr. Hearst had had a good working organization behind him, the election would have been overwhelmingly elected. Mr. Hearst and Mr. Jerome have a great work cut out for them. The election is indicative of profound and very largely justifiable dissatisfaction with political managers, and with lawless corporate management.

The election of T. Jerome, independent, as district attorney, is a severe blow to the Tammany organization, which exerted all the force it next to command to defeat him. CITY WINS IN HIGHEST COURT. ST. BY MUST PAY MILEAGE

Privy Council's Decision Given—Ex-Ald. Frame Gets a New Job—Widening of Queen St.

According to a cablegram received yesterday the appeal of the Toronto Street Railway Company versus the Corporation of Toronto was dismissed by the privy council. The railway company contended in vain that as the street (Roncesvalles-avenue) was not part of the city at the time of making the agreement they (the company) were not liable for mileage upon it.

The decision is viewed with glee at the city hall, where it is expected it will serve as a precedent, as the city is given powers to collect mileage in annexed areas, it is also believed it will afford legal power to compel the laying of tracks where desired. This the city is trying to do on Avenue-road on that portion not in the city limits, when the street railway agreement was made. The decision carries with it a financial reward of \$3000 and the costs of the lawsuit. Every one who heard the case decided in the city's favor.
