

THE PHILIPPINE REVOLT.

Insurgents Seem to Mave the Upper Hand,
Though They Have Suffered
Some Reverses.

San Francisco, Oct. 26.—The steamer Coptic brings additional details of the rebellion in the Philippines. The insurgents have suffered reverses, but the Spanish force is insufficient to suppress the outbreak. Twenty-five thousand rebels are practically in control of the Province of Cavite. Horrible outrages are of frequent occurrence, one form of torture being to cut a priest to death bit by bit, while the others are too revolting to bint at. The bodies of many friars have been seen floating down the river. The Spanish officers have discovered evidence that the revolt was secretly planned, the ultimate object being to form a republic.


Pedro Roasas, who escaped in a foreign steamer some days ago, was, it is said, to have been the president and a list of the elected military officers has been found.
