Montreal, April 1.—(Special.)—Mayor Lloyd Manley of Grand Forks, B.C., was here today, and gave some interesting information about the Kettle River Railway bill, which is now pending at Ottawa, and which it is expected the Canadian Pacific Railway will oppose tooth and nail on Tuesday next, when the bill comes before the committee.

NO FIGHT WITH THE C. P. R.

The Mayor proceeded to state that he had no idea of fighting the C.P.R. and if the road was built, it would bring a very extensive trade to the big company's mill, both during construction and after completion. He declares that the Republic can be owned by Canadians, and it is very desirable that the ore from that camp should be brought over to the Canadian smelters for treatment.

WILL TAKE NO ORE OUT OF CANADA.

A CAPITAL SCHEME.

Proposal to Establish an Iron Shipbuilding Industry in Nova Scotia.

BRITISH FOREIGN OFFICE SAID TO BE SHOWING INCREASING ANXIETY BECAUSE OF IT.

DISTINCT THREATS OF FORCE ARE THROWN AT TURKEY—JAPAN IS ALSO WATCHING COREA—PORTS MAKE CONCESSIONS.

London, March 31.—The Russian aggression in the East is causing increasing anxiety to the British Foreign Office. It is now so great that there is little doubt that he will soon grant all the Czar's demands in Asia Minor. The Russian reports are now backed with a distinct threat of force, and it will be surprising if the Sultan is not soon forced to accede to the Russian port on the Red Sea is not an actuality before the war in South Africa is ended.

IN REGARD TO COREA.

The latest indications are that Russia's demands in Corea have been so far modified that she will obtain what she wants without offending Japan to the point of war. Corea itself, it is said, is now in the power of resistance, and the real dealings are with the Japanese government. It is definitely settled that Great Britain will not interfere.

Constantinople, March 31.—The Ottoman Government has made promises to the Russian Embassy, declaring that, in the event of the Russian not contracting railway lines in the Black Sea, it is bound by railways already completed to others, even concessions will be granted to Russia. It is considered that the Porte in this way settles the Russian demands in the premises.

A POLITE AND GENTLE NOTE.

In Which Russia Requests the Porte to Allow Troops to Pass the Dardanelles.

St. Petersburg, March 30 (via Paris, March 31).—The latest political rumor is high and diplomatic circles is to the effect that M. Sinoviev, Russian Ambassador at Constantinople, has secretly handed to the Turkish Foreign Office a polite and gentle note, requesting from the Sublime Porte permission for the transportation of a certain definite number of Russian troops, together with some warships, thru the Dardanelles.

ORDERS 200,000 NEW GUNS.

The British Government has ordered from the state rifle manufacturer 200,000 new guns for immediate delivery to the Imperial Arms Depot at St. Petersburg.

SICKNESS IN LONDON.

Nine Out of Ten Are Suffering From Colds—Society on the Way to Dublin.

London, April 1.—Sun weather! One death in this past week there were seven degrees of frost, and all thru the week there have been keen cold, bitter winds, with the result that nine out of ten people are suffering with colds and influenza. There is sickness everywhere.

ENGLAND'S NOBLES IN THE WAR.

The Reason the Catholic Duke of Norfolk Has Resigned and Gone to the Front.

London, March 31.—The Duke of Norfolk's resignation of the Postmaster-Generalship for a quiet subordinate post at the front has caused a sensation. He is influenced by several reasons. In the first place, he has felt keenly the pro-Boer tendencies of the Vatican, and as the first Roman Catholic in England he desired to show that he was a patriot and a Roman Catholic after the fashion of the British Empire.

DUKE OF NORFOLK SENT OFF.

Resigned His Portfolio to Go and Fight in Order to Prove Loyalty of English Catholics.

London, April 1.—The Duke of Norfolk received an affectionate send-off from a large party of friends today on sailing for South Africa. The real motive of his persistence in enlisting for the war, even at the cost of resigning from the Government, is believed to be an intense desire to prove that English Roman Catholics are loyal to the Queen and the Empire, and unaffected by continental prejudice.

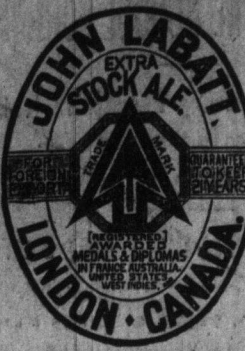
