WILL ASK FOR GRANT OF \$10,000 TO ENTERTAIN HEIR-APPARENT

According to Elaborate Program Mapped Out It Will Cost This Sum to Do the Thing Up Properly—What the Royal Visitors Will Do While in Toronto.

There will be a big time in Toronto when the Duke of York arrives. A sub-committee of the Reception Committee met yesterday afternoon, and drafted a program, which will be sent on to Council for final ratification. The report they recommended is to the effect that they have had an interview with the Premier of Ontario, at which he intimated that the government would decorate and illuminate the Parliament Buildings and Government House, and erect one or two arches, and that His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor would entertain the Royal Highnesses and some members of their suite at Government House.

Outline of Program.
Monday, Oct. 7.—Arrive at North Toronto Station in the afternoon. Will be met by the Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governor, and dignitaries, military band, and a portion of the school children, to be assembled in front of the Parliament Buildings. The Metropolitan Company will be in the reception committee of the City Council, and will be in charge of the city regiments leading, and the Toronto Garrison and visiting militia assisting and lining the streets.

JURY EXONERATES EMPLOYEES.

Inquest on Body of William John Lee Concluded, and Recommendations Contained in Verdict.

"We find that deceased came to his death accidentally on July 1, 1900, by being crushed under car No. 708, in charge of Mortimer Robinson and Conductor Brodie, the car traveling at about five miles an hour.

"We exonerate both motorman and conductor from all blame in the matter.

"We recommend that the government take immediate action and select the best tender available to properly protect the lives of our fellow-citizens.

"We also desire to protest against the disgraceful state of the city morgue, which is discreditable to a city of the size and wealth of the city of Toronto.

Such was the verdict returned yesterday afternoon by the jury empaneled by Conductor Brodie, in the case of the death of William John Lee, the British armorer, who was killed by the engine of the Queen's Hotel on Dominion Day. When the inquest was resumed yesterday considerable testimony regarding the man's car was given.

Michael Power, 73 Victoria-avenue, former car driver, said car No. 708 was in his charge on the morning of the accident. He said the car was an ordinary man in charge of the car. The motorman, Robinson, said he had no recollection of the accident, which occurred at about 10:15 a.m. on July 1.

Henry Moore, 216 Huron-street, solicitor for Macdonald, Man & Co., testified that he was instructed by the president of the Toronto Railway Company about a year ago to take the matter of the death of Lee into consideration.

He said that on June 20 last Mr. Moore wrote to the department of the Toronto Railway Company, asking for a view to having the twentieth century cars replaced by a more modern type. He said that no answer has as yet been received by Mr. Moore to this communication.

High Crown of 125 East Queen-street, former foreman of the Toronto Railway Co., said he went to the scene of the accident on Monday morning in response to a telegram from the coroner. He said that he found a body under the car, and it would not be struck by the truck.

Coroner Spencer in his charge to the jury commented at length on the disgraceful condition of the morgue, where the body was kept, and he said that it was a disgrace to the city.

At the close of the proceedings, the jury returned a verdict of "accidental death," and they recommended that the government take immediate action to improve the condition of the city morgue.
