EXPLANATIONS.

As several alterations have been made in the Astronomical calculations for the present year, and the whole adapted to mean time, some explanations may not be improper.

Mean time is that shown by a well regulated clock or time piece. Apparent time is that shown by a correct sun dial. The difference between mean and apparent time is called the equation of time. The equation of time depends upon two causes. 1st. The obliquity of the Ecliptic to the Equator, which causes an inequality in the daily increments of the Sun's right ascension. 2d. The unequal motion of the Earth in its orbit, while the motion on its axis is uniform. Mean and apparent time coincide only four times in the year, viz.—on the 15th of April, the 15th of June, the 31st of August, and the 24th of December.

It has been customary to give the rising and setting of the Sun according to the apparent time, and in another column to give the equation of time. In that case it was necessary, in regulating a clock or time piece by the rising, or setting of the Sun, to apply the equation to the time of rising or setting, given in the Almanac and also the amount of refraction, which in our latitude varies from two to four minutes. But as this matter is little understood by people generally, and is often done with some trouble, no notice is usually taken of these corrections, and in their endeavours to make their time pieces agree with the Sun, they find it necessary, if they run correctly, to alter them almost every day.

In the following Calendar, the times of the Sun's rising and setting are the times shown by a correct time piece, when the Sun is in the horizon. The column marked ② South contains the times by the correct time piece, when the Sun is on the Meridian, or in other words, when it is noon by the noon mark, or dial. For example, when it is noon by the sun on the 1st day of January, it should be four minutes after twelve by the clock. Again, when it is noon by the Sun on the first day of November, it should be only forty-four minutes after eleven o'clock by the clock, or time piece. The other matters are so plain as to need no explanation.

ECLIPSES OF THE SUN AND MOON.

There will be five Eclipses in the year 1837, three of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I.—The first will be an eclipse of the Sun on the 5th day of April, visible. This eclipse will be seen only from a small portion of the Southern Ocean.

II.—The second will be a total eclipse of the Moon, on the 20th day of April. This eclipse will end a little before the Moon rises and therefore be visible in Canada.

III.—The third will be a partial eclipse of the Sun, on the 4th day of May, invisible at Montreal, &c. at 2h. 8m. evening. This eclipse will be visible in the north-western part of North America and in the South Pacific Ocean.

IV.—The fourth will be a total eclipse of the Moon on the 13th of October and visible as follows:

Beginning of total darkness,....	5 37.	
Middle of the eclipse,.....	6 23.	
End of total darkness,.....	7 9.	

Duration of total darkness 1h. 32m. Duration of the eclipse 3h. 33m. It is eclipsed 18° on the north limb, or from the east side of the Moon's shadow.

V.—The fifth will be a partial and invisible eclipse of the Sun, on 29th day of October. This eclipse will be seen from the southern parts of South America and from most of the Southern Ocean.
