**FRUITMEN AT THE FAIR
 ALSO STOCK BREEDERS**

Sir William Mulock Speaker at
 Directors' Luncheon—Monday's
 Paid Attendance 142,320.

The exhibition grounds yesterday by comparison with Labor Day had almost a cathedral calm, although 68,000 people or thereabouts passed through the turnstiles. But if the 22,000 folks who were about on foot yesterday were the only ones to see the busy animation of the scene, there were compensating advantages. It was possible to go through the grounds in comfort and from a slight seeing viewpoint. At the same time as the paid attendance was 600 above that of last year, the directors had no occasion for gloom. Stock breeders from all over Ontario and no small number from beyond its boundaries were in evidence. Men who would give an off-hand calculation within a pound or so of the weight of a Hereford or Galloway. They were occasionally seen to be looking at the cattle pens claimed most of their time. The consensus of opinion seemed to be that the live stock this year is much above that of 1908, especially in the Jerseys, and that with the standard constantly rising as it does, exhibitors who carry off awards in 1909 will have reason to congratulate themselves.

Fruit Show an Eye-Opener.
 Fruit-growers from far and near were there, too. They admitted that the British Columbia products were an eye-opener, but didn't admit a lessened confidence in old Ontario to heat the world in other apples are concerned. Of course there were visitors who neither raised stock nor entered into contracts with the fruit packers. Many were from the United States, being the advance guard of the American day contingent, which to judge from the report of the railways, will be away ahead of 1908.

It is hardly needful to say that the weather behaved. Every day was near the critical point in the exhibition history of 1909 has been passed, and that when it closes its gates Saturday night, it will have achieved a satisfactory success even though the million mark may not be reached.

The grandstand attendance last night was 21,000 or 100,000 more than last year. Monday's Special Figures.

The number of paid admissions to the exhibition grounds on Monday was 142,320, which means that including the army of exhibitors and attendants in general, there were at least 150,000 people on the grounds. Gate receipts were \$28,454. The paid admissions in the Midway shows, however, were 28,000 more than checked.

With the second week well under way, the size of the prospective audience is a live topic. Last year the civic coffers were enriched to the extent of \$40,000. As receipts are already about \$15,000 more than for the same period of last year, including the \$3000 more for concessions, it seems reasonable to look for a surplus of \$50,000 after making due allowance for increased expenses.

Fruit Growers' Day.
 The directors' luncheon was honored by the attendance of Sir William Mulock, who was with the Ontario Chief of the Ontario, but as a practical fruit grower. The entente cordiale between the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec was further cemented by the presence of a party of Quebecers, including sixteen farmer mayors of Montgomery, who are here on the grounds of agriculture in Ontario. The gathering of stockbreeders and fruit growers was a large and representative one.

President Gooderham called upon Mayor Oliver to introduce the speakers. His worship expressed conviction that there was no better stock raising in any fruit growing country than Ontario and cordially welcomed the visitors from the sister province.

Farmers and the Tariff.
 Sir William Mulock, after uttering the wish that the privilege of free speech which obtained in Hyde Park might be exercised in Canada, said that he wished to take issue with the remarks credited to a speaker (F. S. McKinnon) at a previous luncheon. This speaker had said that all Canada needed an absolutely prohibitive tariff. There were, however, more than manufacturers in the country. Sir William voiced the belief that there were no farmers. He believed that all wealth came from mother earth. His exhibition was to reflect the industry and conditions of Canada. He might advise the directors to see that the balance of control didn't fall into the hands of one class to the prejudice of the farming element. The exhibition was getting away from safe ground. If it forgot the part played by the tillers of the soil, it was in danger of being a year to Canada, yet that industry was not represented on the directors. Sir William declared that there was no part of Canada produced better apples than the northern part of Ontario, and referred to his own orchard of 100 acres as an evidence of its sincerity.

Good Fruit Display.
 W. T. Macoun, superintendent of the government experimental farm at Ottawa, congratulated the exhibition on its fine fruit display which was a powerful force in attracting immigration, and William Rickard, ex-M.L.A., Newcastle, Ont., declared that there was always a good market for fine apples.

The spokesman for the Quebec visitors, D. Watson, editor of the Quebec Chronicle, and D. O. L'Esperance, broker, Quebec, Mr. Watson's sentiment was that the fruit growing was growing as good as any of true Canadianism between the Provinces was warmly approved, and Mr. L'Esperance's declaration that there was no race cry in Quebec was applauded.

General Passenger Agent Lee of the Lehigh Railway said the interest in the exhibition was growing rapidly across the line and that visitors from New York and Pennsylvania were more numerous than ever before. Butter Making Competitions.
 The butter making competitions in the dairy building are unusually interesting this year because of the large number of competitors. Several dairy maids in neat caps and aprons yesterday went through the process of churning in the presence of an admiring throng, the celerity of their movements and the generally businesslike way in which they went to work being commented upon by the critical farmers who largely made up the spectators. The competitions will continue daily with prizes to be awarded at the end of the week.

Ontario Fruit Growers.
 A meeting of the executive of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association was held in the office of J. Lockie Wilson, provincial superintendent of agriculture and horticultural societies. There was a full attendance of delegates from the various parts of Ontario.

The chief business was the preparation of a program for the annual convention, which will be held on Thursday, Nov. 11. A number of good speakers have been secured.

While Manager Orr has cut out "thrillers" this year, a sensational incident was thrown on the program, occasioning a great deal of excitement. It was that the grand stand crowd gasped last night when Artilleryman Smith of the R.C.H.A., Kingston, was thrown from his horse during the dashing game ride. To the horrified onlookers it appeared as though he would be crushed to death by the heavy gun-carriage, but all will have reason to scratch on the head from a horse's hoof. It was, however, a very narrow escape. The emergency hospital doctors dressed the wound.

Several minor incidents marked the day. Thomas Doherty, 11 Dorset-street, fell from a car while on the way to the grounds, receiving a gash above the eye, which required treatment at the tent. Undue familiarity with some of the show dogs resulted in bites to several individuals who thought it better to get medical attention.

The R.C.H.A. now lead the R.C.D. by a few points in their competition. The Kingston team took the front last night by winning the section jumping. The bare-back wrestling resulted in a tie.

Cheap Tickets All Gone.
 The vendors of "six-for-a-dollar" tickets have ceased operations, not because of interference, but simply that their supplies became exhausted on Monday. One of these speculators sold 300 slips of tickets on the holiday at \$25 each, netting him \$105 for half a dozen tickets at the regular rate.

The regular commission for selling was 10 per cent, and the remaining 25c was "velvet." A single vendor bought 3500 slips, selling 250 at the regular rate and the remainder at \$1.25, making a profit of \$500. Altogether the exhibition sold 44,000 "six-for" strips to vendors, receiving \$33,600 therefor and allowing a margin of \$4000 to the vendors at regular rates. Owing to the opportunity taken, however, by the vendors to get a maximum 40 per cent profit, the speculators may have divided up between \$6000 and \$7000. Those who had disposed of most of their stock on the day described basis, were chagrined to discover how easily they could have sold at the \$1.25 rate.

Some of the vendors considering adopting a new method of distribution next year. One suggestion is to have exclusive employes handle the sale. There is a feeling that the present way means "easy money" for the speculators, as the avidity with which the public snaps up the premium tickets is an evidence of the simple problem. It is argued that the \$4000 given in commission this year would go a long way towards the expense of selling the tickets by exhibition officers.

Improving Employes' Conditions.
 So popular have the illustrated lectures on home gardening and neighborhood improvement become that in a minute-and-a-half after the doors of the free theatre in the woman's building are opened the place is packed—aisles and chairs are crowded. These people are particularly interested in the low platform. Graphically explained by Lecturer E. F. Reeder, the pictures illustrate many beautiful homes of the industrial life and how philanthropic business men have been led by observing little incidents in the factory employes' life, to forsake their homes and personally visit the homes of their employes for the purpose of improving not only their actual working conditions, but their domestic environments. John H. Patterson, president of the National Cash Register Co., thru seeing a young girl trying to heat some coffee in a factory radiator, was led to investigate the conditions of the plant. At the end of one of the corridors he saw hundreds of young women eating cold lunches, and he was moved with compassion. His first impulse was to issue orders for the equipment of dining rooms and recreation rooms for men and women, where hot tea and coffee would be provided free of charge and where they could enjoy a brief spell of pure ventilation. The whole plant was renovated, with a particular eye on the comfort of the employes. Later, as a result of the visitations to the various homes, forists were consulted and provision was made for night lectures upon gardening and the simple embellishment of houses. The results were immediate and astounding. The firm was soon impressed with the intense interest the employes took in their distinctive branches of the work, and rewarded by a highly superior product, an increased output and a higher moral standard amongst its working staff.

In Friendship, Love and Truth.
 Exhibition sightseers who pay an annual visit to the hospital tent, which the Oddfellows have provided in Society Row must be struck by the cosmopolitan nature of this great fraternity of men who stand out this year more prominently than usual. The Hon. Senator D. Derbyshire, president over the order as Grand Master, and among his men at the comfort in close conversation with visiting members from every walk in social life, and all of them display the same keen interest in the great work which the order has undertaken and is doing so well. 



POSTMASTERS' MEETINGS
HOURS ARE TOO LONG

Annual Convention Opens in Toronto—G. W. H. Burger, Welland, New President.

At the annual meeting of the Ontario Postmasters' Association, at the Temple Building yesterday, a flourishing condition of affairs was reported. The membership now numbers over thirteen hundred, and the finances are very satisfactory, a deficit of \$500 being converted into a balance on the right side. The receipts amounted to \$2177.

About fifty delegates were present and discussed various questions concerning the status of postmasters in the province. Complaints were made of the long hours which postmasters are compelled to work, one delegate stating that he often had to put in as many as fifteen and sixteen hours a day. The argument was put forward that a definite number of hours should be fixed and that those beyond that limit should be paid overtime rates.

Thos. Farrow presided at the two sessions, and amongst the present were K. H. Hopes, postmaster of Orchard Park, New York and president of the American National Postmasters' League; George Ross, Chief Post Office Inspector and Inspectors Henderson and Campbell.

The committee appointed to enquire into the question of issuing an official organ for Ontario, reported that they considered such a publication would be a great benefit and they decided to refer the entire question to the executive committee.

Secretary Proctor, of Aurora, in his report, denied the statement often made that questions of finance were the only ones which kept the members together. "I hope we have higher aims than that," he said, "and that in future our usefulness as an educational force will be fully recognized. We must, therefore, make efficiency and progress our watchwords, and appoint our departmental officers in the perfecting and developing of a postal service worthy, the high aspirations of this Dominion."

It urges that they be rigidly enforced, especially in the unorganized districts, and that if possible, a general disarmament be effected.

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LEAMINGTON MAN LOST
IN BUSH FOR 15 DAYS

Joseph Sherreh, Aged 69, Lives on Berries for a Fortnight in Wilds West of Fort William.

LEAMINGTON, Man., Sept. 7.—(Special.)—A man, faintly scarred about the face, hands, arms and legs, sat in the Tecumseh House this morning and told a story of his adventures while he was lost for 15 days in a wild world of bush, muskies and rocks north of the C.P.R. line, between Fort William and Leamington, Ontario. The C.P.R. track at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, and was given a square meal for the first time in half a month by one of the foremen employed on the double-tracking.

During the time he was lost he suffered, he says, solely on berries, which were bitter and, for all he knew, poisonous; but he took the chance. The man, according to his story, was panic stricken in his anxiety to reach human society, and states that he rarely ate more than one meal a day, drinking whatever water came handy, whether it was from muskies or lakes. As he staggered on, day after day, he thought he would go insane. Yesterday morning, in the dead silence of the bush his heart leaped when there was faintly borne upon his ears the long-drawn whistle of a locomotive. The man, who gives his name as Joseph Sherreh of Leamington, Ont., is 69 years of age, and has unkempt hair and beard, framing a gaunt hollow-checked face, which is bronzed and marked with red scars of healing wounds, gave him a pitiable appearance this morning. He called upon Belle Officer Kerr at the city hall and was sent to the Leamington, Ont. He is a widower and has two sons and a daughter living at Leamington. These have been communicated with. He says he was drunk when he got lost.

World Office. Tuesday Evening, Sept. 7. Further news over Harriman's physical condition unsettled Wall-street today, and had a slight influence on domestic stocks interested with New York.
