Becomes Warden of York County Council by Acclamation—Mr. St. John's Final Rally.

For the second time in forty years, the members of York County Council yesterday elected their warden by acclamation. Alexander Baird, John Gardhouse, Charles H. Lundy and W. H. Johnston were placed in nomination, but the three last named retired, leaving the clerk to announce Alexander Baird the unanimous choice. Mr. Baird, who was led to the dais by his nominator and seconder, Councillors Pugsley and Hartman, thanked the council for the honor given him, which came as a double honor on account of the unanimous manner in which his name had been received.

He briefly referred to the questions that would come before council during the session, none of which were likely to be questions of great moment. He had confidence in the ability of the council to carry on the affairs of the county, and hoped that the pleasant cordial relations existing between himself and the councillors would continue throughout the year. Mr. Baird was born in Scarborough Township, located in the Toronto collegiate, and has been an industrious farmer of Scarborough all his life. He has been in the county council many years, and has served on the Industrial Home Commission board, as county commissioner, and has held all the important offices in the gift of the county.

A striking committee to appoint a special committee for the year was elected, consisting of the following: Councillors Lundy, Pugsley, Lev, McCullum, Woodcock, Gardhouse and Evans. Mayor Thomsen wrote asking co-operation of the council in petitioning the government to amend all charters granted to telephone companies, and to take over the long distance lines. Police Magistrate Ellis wrote, acknowledging Baird's appointment as police master over a wide district in the southern part of the county, in effect Jan. 1, 1905. A petition of residents of Mimico, asking to be raised to the status of a police village, was presented by Councillor Lundy. On motion of Councillor Turner, council adjourned until tomorrow, at 2 o'clock.

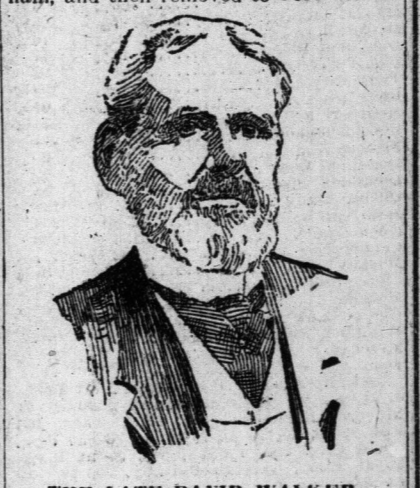
