They tell us that such things are to be condoned by the Democratic party. I canswer: "Never! Never!" I cannot believe it possible that they will be condoned by any convention calling itself Democratic. But if they should be then that convention is not truly a Democratic convention, whatever it may be called.

There are thousands of voters who There are thousands of voters who would welcome a third ticket if it gave them the chance to record, not only their protest against the decadence of the Republican machine, but their "sense of outrage" at the methods adopted by Hearst and masked by hypocritical pretence of a desire to fight the battles of the common people. Self-seeking, lying, blackmail, fraud, and bribery may succeed for a while; to believe that they can triumph in the long run would be to confess the failure of American institutions.

The Hearst campaign in New York goes merrily on. Mr. Hearst has summoned his Independence League in advance of the Democratic convention, and the League has nominated a full ticket, with Mr. Hearst at its head. Certain Democrats had written to urge that the League wait and endeavor to unite on a common platform with the Democrats before proceeding to nominate candidates, but Mr. Hearst evidently decided that it would be better to nominate a full ticket and then endeavor to overawe the Democratic consensus triumph in the long run would be to confess the failure of American institutions. In Hearst's case there are multiplying to realize just what kind of confidence game he has been trying to work.
