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# BYE-LAWS OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

## A Law to regulate the Elections of Aldermen, Councillors, and Constables, in the City of Saint John.

Passed 25th February, 1850.  
Confirmed 2d March, 1850.

BE it Ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John in Common Council convened, That in all future Elections of any Aldermen, Councillors, or Constables, to serve for any Ward in the said City, the Commissioner appointed to hold the Election in each respective Ward shall, at the time of holding such Election, and before proceeding to act, take and subscribe the following Oath:—"I, A. B. do swear that I will well and faithfully discharge my duty as Commissioner, to hold the present Election of Aldermen, Councillor and Constable of — Ward, in the City of Saint John, to the best of my knowledge and judgment, and that I will return such persons as shall have a majority of votes; which oath shall be taken before any Justice of the Peace for the City and County of Saint John, and shall be prefixed at the time to the Poll Book, and form part thereof.

II. And be it Ordained, That when a Poll shall be demanded at any such Election, the Commissioner for holding the same shall nominate and appoint a competent Clerk, who shall keep the Poll in the presence and under the direction of the said Commissioner, and the said Poll Clerk shall thereupon take and subscribe the following oath:—"I do swear that I will well and faithfully discharge my duty as Poll Clerk, at the present Election, and that I will well and faithfully enter and record the votes polled at this Election, according to the best of my ability;" which oath shall be taken before any Justice of the Peace for the said City and County, and shall be prefixed at the time to the Poll Book, and form part thereof.

III. And be it Ordained, That it shall be the duty as well of the Constables who have been elected, as of those who have been appointed by the Common Council, for the respective Wards in the said City, and they are hereby charged and required to attend at the time and place appointed for holding such Election as aforesaid, in their respective Wards, and shall remain there during the time such Election shall be held, and shall obey the orders of good order and assist the Commissioner in preserving good order at such Election; and in case any of the said Constables shall refuse, neglect or omit to attend or remain as aforesaid, or to obey the orders of the Commissioner, every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Forty Shillings.

IV. And be it Ordained, That no person shall be entitled to vote at any such Election, as a Freeman of the said City, unless he shall, in addition to the qualifications required by any Act or Acts of Assembly, have been a Freeman of the said City, duly sworn and registered as such, at least three calendar months before the day of such Election, and shall have actually resided in the Ward in which he offers to give his vote for one calendar month next preceding such Election; and no person shall be entitled to vote as a Freeholder at any such Election, unless, in addition to the qualifications required by such Act or Acts of Assembly, the Deed of Conveyance under which he claims such Freehold shall have been bona fide executed and duly registered in the Office of the Register of Deeds in and for the said City and County, for at least three calendar months before the day of such Election, (excepting in cases of persons holding their estate by descent or devise,) nor unless such Freehold shall consist of one whole Lot, if it be one of the numbered Lots as laid out on the original plan of Part Town, or of a tenanted dwelling house within the limits of the grants of either of the said Towns—or, if it be not one of the numbered Lots, unless such Freehold shall consist of some tenanted dwelling house, or else of forty feet square of land, if such Freehold lies in any other part of the said City.

V. And be it Ordained, That every Candidate for the Office of Alderman or Councillor of the said City, shall, at the time of holding the Election, and before the Commissioner shall proceed to take the votes, make and subscribe the following oath, that is to say:—"I do swear that I am possessed, as the owner thereof, of real or personal property, or both together, within the City of Saint John, over and above all mortgages, judgments, bonds to the Queen or her successors, and all other just debts and incumbrances whatsoever, to the extent of at least (if an Alderman, Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds, if a Councillor, One Hundred and Fifty Pounds), that I am a Freeman of the said City, duly qualified, and have been a Freeman of the said City, duly sworn, and registered as such, at least three calendar months before the day of this Election;" which oath shall be taken before any Justice of the Peace for the said City and County, and shall be prefixed at the time to the Poll Book, and form part thereof, and shall be publicly read before the Electors then present.

VI. And be it Ordained, That every person who shall present himself to give his vote at any such Election, shall state in what right he claims to vote, whether as a Freeman or Freeholder; and shall also distinctly name the several Candidates for whom he votes as Alderman, for whom as Councillor, and for whom as Constable; and if the person so presenting himself shall state that he claims to vote as a Freeholder, he shall, if thereto required by the Commissioner, or any Candidate at such Election, further state particularly the situation of the property on which he claims to vote, and whether he holds by descent, devise or purchase, or how otherwise, and any person who shall refuse, neglect, or omit to make any of the statements required by this Section, he shall not be allowed to give his vote at such Election.

VII. And be it Ordained, That if any person or persons, not having a right to vote, shall vote at any such Election, or having a right to vote, shall vote more than once, or shall vote in a feigned name at any such Election, every person so offending, shall, for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Forty Shillings; and provided always, that no prosecution for the said penalty shall be commenced after three calendar months from the time of the offence committed.

VIII. And be it Ordained, That if any person shall be guilty of any disorderly conduct, or disrespectful or contemptuous behaviour towards the Commissioner, or any of the Candidates at such Election, during the time the same shall be held, every person so offending, shall, for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Five Pounds.

IX. And be it Ordained, That the Commissioner holding such Election in each respective Ward, shall, at the close of the Poll, forthwith make and subscribe in the Poll Book, his return of such persons as have a majority of votes at such Election, and shall thereupon enclose and seal the said Poll Book, and shall deposit the same, so enclosed and sealed, before Six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, at the Office of the Common Clerk of the said City.

X. And be it Ordained, That all fines, penalties and forfeitures imposed in and by this Law, shall and may be prosecuted and recovered by and in the name of the Chamberlain of the said City for the time being, upon conviction of the offender before the Mayor, or Recorder, or any one of the Aldermen of the said City, upon the oath of one or more credible witnesses or witnesses, the oath of one or more of the Aldermen of the said City, upon the confession of the party offending, or in any other lawful method to be obtained, in the manner and for the uses directed in and by the Charter of the said City, and shall and may be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels, of such offender, by Warrant under the Hand and Seal of the said Mayor, or Recorder, or Alderman as aforesaid, and in case sufficient goods and chattels cannot be found whereon to levy, the said offender shall be committed to the Common Gaol of the City and County of Saint John, there to be imprisoned for the space of ten days, when the fine or sum to be paid shall be Forty Shillings, or twenty days, when the fine or sum shall be Five Pounds.

## A Law to prevent Nuisances in the City of Saint John.

Passed 27th May, 1850.  
Confirmed 14th July, 1850.

BE it Ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, in Common Council convened, That no person shall throw, put, deposit, or place, or cause to be thrown, put, deposited, or placed, in or upon any of the Streets, Lanes, Alleys, Highways, or Public Squares within this City, any Timber or Lumber of any kind, or any Stone, Brick, Lime, Mortar, or other material for Building, or any Earth, Stones, Rubbish, or any incumbrance or obstruction whatsoever, without having first obtained permission in writing from the Mayor, Recorder, or the Alderman of the Ward wherein the same may be placed, so to do, and such permission shall only be granted, to persons who are or shall be erecting or repairing some house, store, or other building, and shall not give authority to any person to occupy or encumber more than one-third part of the width of any such street, lane, or alley, nor to extend farther than the breadth of the Lot on which such house, store, or other building is about to be erected, and the person obtaining such permission, shall, at his own expense, cause such building materials as aforesaid to be enclosed with a sufficient fence, and shall keep the same so enclosed, and also, whilst such incumbrance shall remain, shall cause a lamp to be placed on some conspicuous part of such incumbrance, and keep the same constantly lighted during the night, so as to prevent, as much as possible, injury or inconvenience to persons passing that way, under the penalty of Forty Shillings for each and every offence.

II. And be it Ordained, That it shall and may be lawful for the Mayor, Recorder, or any one of the Aldermen or Councillors of the said City, at any time, to remove, or cause to be removed, any such incumbrance placed without such license, and at any time, after four-and-twenty hours notice, any such incumbrance placed with such license, and to cause the same to be carried to some suitable place, and, if of any value, to be advertised and sold, and the proceeds thereof applied, as far as they may go, to the payment of the penalties imposed by this Law, and the expenses attending such removal, and the surplus, if any, to be paid to the owner. Provided always, and be it ordained, that it shall and may be lawful, after four-and-twenty hours notice, to sell the said incumbrance on the spot, for the purpose of removal, if the said Mayor, Recorder, or any one of the Aldermen or Councillors aforesaid shall think fit.

III. And be it Ordained, That no Cartman or other person shall unload, put, or place any Firewood, Coals, or other incumbrance on the Foot-path or Side-walk of any street within this City, under the penalty of Ten Shillings, and all wood which may be unladen or placed on any other part of any street within the said City, shall be immediately piled up on the unloading of each cart, within two feet of the curbing towards the middle of the street, and in not more than one tier along the length of the street, under the penalty of Two Shillings and Six Pence for every neglect, to be paid by the person or persons for whom the said Wood may be hauled, and no wood so piled as aforesaid shall be suffered to remain on the said street for any longer period than a reasonable time from the time when the whole quantity may be hauled and completely piled as aforesaid, and if any firewood is suffered to remain more than six hours after notice shall be given by the Mayor, Recorder, or one of the Aldermen or Councillors of the said City, to remove the same, such wood shall be proceeded against as any other incumbrance or obstruction on the street, and the owner or owners thereof shall, in addition to the foregoing penalties, be subject to the like penalties and forfeitures as are hereby imposed on persons placing obstructions or incumbrances on the streets.

IV. And be it Ordained, That all Coals which may be unladen or deposited on any part of any street within the said City, not prohibited in and by the last Section, shall be removed immediately on the same being unladen from the carts, and if any coals shall be found on any such street within four hours after the last load shall have been unladen, the person or persons for whom the same shall be hauled shall forfeit and pay the sum of twenty Shillings for each offence.

V. And be it Ordained, That no person or persons who-soever, shall saw or cut any wood on any of the side-walks in the said City of Saint John, under the penalty of Five Shillings for being found sawing, and Five Shillings for each and every hour that he or they shall continue sawing after being warned to desist, or being turned off any of the said side-walks by the Mayor, Recorder, or any one of the Aldermen or Councillors of the said City, or of any person appointed to look after Nuisances in the said City.

VI. And be it Ordained, That all and every Sawyer and Sawyers, or person or persons for whom any wood may be sawed by such sawyer or sawyers, shall remove all sawdust and dirt made by him or them, by sawing any wood on any of the streets of the said City, and leave the place where the said wood was sawed thoroughly cleaned, under the penalty of Five Shillings for each and every offence.

VII. And be it Ordained, That no Lime shall hereafter be slacked or riddled on any of the public streets, highways, lanes, or squares of the said City, for any purpose or purposes whatsoever, under the penalty of Forty Shillings for each and every offence.

VIII. And be it Ordained, That no person or persons shall throw, put, deposit, or place, or cause to be thrown, put, deposited, or placed in or upon any of the streets, lanes, alleys, highways, or public squares, or on any part of the beach or shore of the harbour of Saint John, or upon any of the public wharves adjoining the said Harbour and within the said City, any dirt, filth, offals, garbage, or other offensive parts of any animals, or any rotten or offensive meat, fish or vegetables, or the carcase of any dead animal, or any other rotten or offensive substance, under the penalty of Five Pounds for every offence; and if any person or persons, having thrown, put, deposited, or placed, or caused to be thrown, put, deposited, or placed, or of having kept, or left any such offensive substance as aforesaid, shall neglect

or refuse to remove the same forthwith, when ordered or directed by the Mayor, Recorder, or any one of the Aldermen or Councillors of the said City, every person so offending, shall, for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Twenty Shillings; And further, in case of such refusal or neglect to comply with such order as aforesaid, or in case the offender cannot at the time be found, it shall be the duty of any person appointed by the said Corporation to look after nuisances, forthwith to cause the said nuisance to be removed, and the expense of such removal shall be paid, in addition to the penalty liable to be paid, by the person who had refused or neglected to remove the same.

Extract of a Letter dated Roscommon, February 20th, 1847, from the highly respectable Proprietor of the Roscommon Journal.

TO PROFESSOR HOLLOWAY.
