Announcement Is Made By L. P. D. Tilley, M.L.A., Today

FULL LIST SOON

List For Whole Province To Be Published In Royal Gazette

QUESTIONED on his arrival at noon today from Fredericton in regard to liquor vendors, Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, M. L. A., president of the executive committee, said that the Provincial Government had sanctioned the issuing of licenses in the city of Saint John to the following nine persons: Watson R. Dunlop, 135 Union street, West Saint John. Edgar R. W. Ingraham, 131 Union street, West Saint John. James E. Gorham, 68 Germain street, city. Samuel H. Hawker, 104 Prince William street, city. E. J. Powers, 109 Prince Edward street, city. Harry Cohen, 28 Dock street, city. Fullerton Bros., 297 Charlotte street. Walter Norman McKiel, 143 Rodney street, West Saint John. Stanley M. Wetmore, corner Queen and Carmenthan streets.

NO OUTSIDE NAMES.

Asked regarding vendor recommendations for other parts of the province, Hon. Mr. Tilley said that was a matter over which he did not feel he had any authority to speak. The entire list, he said, would be published shortly in the Royal Gazette.

The appointment of a Chief Liquor Inspector for the province, according to a Fredericton report, has been deferred for the time being and it is currently believed the capital that the present chief, Sheriff John B. Hawthorne, will continue in office for some time yet.

Hon. Dr. H. I. Taylor, St. George's, was named for the tenure of the University of New Brunswick to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Murray MacLaren, M. P., elected in 1923 and who had resigned because of pressure of parliamentary duties.

Through the Department of Agriculture, of which Hon. Lewis Smith is minister, an arrangement has been made with the Salvation Army with regard to immigration under which a limited number of boys and young women would be selected in the Old Country and be brought into this province.

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 12.—Rev. R. D. L. Keith. Dr. Fraser was the fourth son of the late Rev. W. F. Fraser, and was born in Bonhead, Ont., in 1849. His paternal grandfather was among the first settlers of Fleton, N. PLYMOUTH, England, Nov. 13.—The submarine M-1 was located today on the bed of the sea 12 miles southwest of Start Point, Devonshire. There is slight chance that the members of the crew of 68 are still alive.

AN ESTATE, the total probate value of which is \$141,000, all personal property, was left by the late Miss Murray of this city, the bulk of the estate being bequeathed to relatives. 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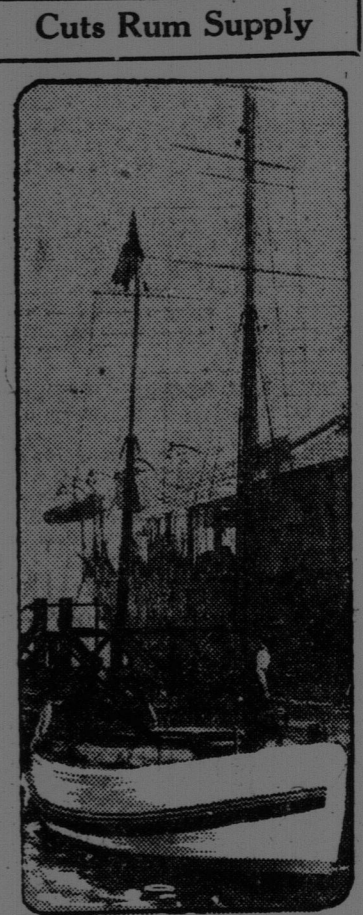

SUGGESTS CITY POOL GRANTS FOR CHARITIES

A. M. Rowan Makes Proposal at Associated Charities Session

W. S. Fisher Chosen President For 26th Time—Reports on Work and Finances

A suggestion made by A. M. Rowan, chairman of the Municipal Home Board, that all the civic grants for charities should be made one common fund and should be administered by a central board representative of all the churches and societies and welfare workers, having a central office and adequate staff maintained by the city, was freely discussed at the annual meeting of the Associated Charities held yesterday afternoon in the Church of England Institute.

EFFORTS APPRECIATED. A standing vote of thanks was extended to Miss Grace Robertson in appreciation of her splendid work. Her report showed there were nine board meetings and 16 conferences held during the year; 1,427 applications from those seeking employment; most of these were referred to the employment bureau; employment was found for 65; recommended, 110; records given, 107; seeking relief, 408; relief was procured for 464; clothing was given to 63; cases investigated, 143; asking for transportation, 21, and visits made, 1,090.

In the four months he had been in Saint John he had not found much poverty but very many cases of distress, where there was only casual employment. The adjutant was assured that the Salvation Army work would always have the sympathy and co-operation of the society.

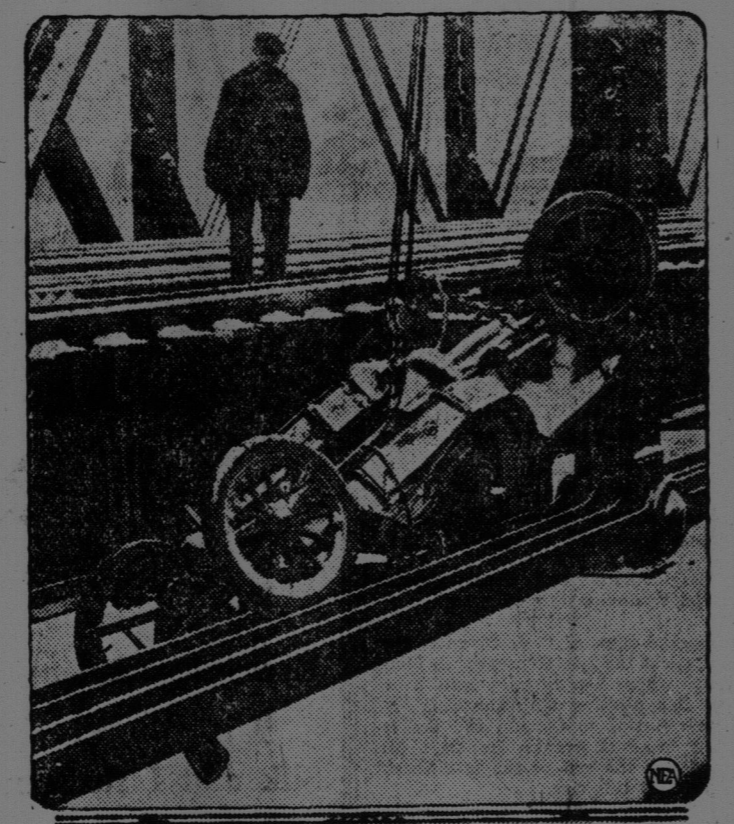

PAYS TRIBUTE TO LADIES. W. Shives Fisher paid a tribute to the work of the ladies of the society. He referred to the loss sustained in the death of Mrs. George F. Smith and said her bequest of \$500 had been added to the capital account of the emergency fund. He believed the society had been the means of reducing beggary and thought its work was becoming better understood.

Real Fire Prevention. (Christian Science Monitor.) Probably but relatively few people in the city of New York or out of it, are aware that on Manhattan Island south of Thirty-four street there is not a single fire engine. Is that region, with its vast accumulation of extremely valuable property, unprotected, then? Not a bit of it. In place of the throbbing engines and their belching smoke, and the clanging and roarings with which they used to screech through the congested streets, there are now two central pumping stations that feed a network of about 100 miles of high-pressure water pipes.

One of the stations is near the North River and supplies the west side of the downtown region. The other is beside the East River and takes care of the zone's eastern area. Each station contains electric motor pumps with equipment for automatic and safe operation. Each pump is of 500 horsepower and is capable of delivering 3,000 gallons of water a minute under a pressure of 30 pounds.

A famous fire chief of New York once said that whether a fire is a minor one or becomes a conflagration depends on the first three minutes. Much of these precious three minutes is lost in getting a fire engine into operation and taking into account the time-consuming street blockades. Under the new system the great pumps start automatically and are delivering a deluge at full capacity in 30 seconds. At its first test this system shot 30 streams of water at one 230 feet in the air without the source of this enormous power being visible.

Each pumping station is connected with the great electric generating plants on the river fronts by four separate feeding cables. Each cable has a capacity of 5,000 horse-power, enough to run the station. Each cable goes to its station by a separate route. This is a safeguard against a street disturbance, cave-in or explosion interrupting the operation of the station.

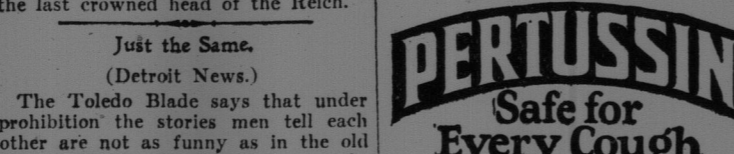

PARIS, Nov. 13.—There were scenes of extraordinary enthusiasm at a meeting a few days ago in the Grand Palais, Champs Elysees, where a gathering of 500 persons listened to addresses during which not a syllable was uttered, and the silence was broken only by bursts of clapping. The gathering consisted of deaf mutes attending a deaf and dumb congress, and during the intervals between the addresses the members held animated conversations, discussing, criticizing and approving the "speakers." Painters, sculptors, and poets took part. One of the most appreciated "orators" was M. Eugene Graf, the president of the congress, who has been decorated by the French government for his services to the deaf and dumb.

LADY'S TRIBUTE

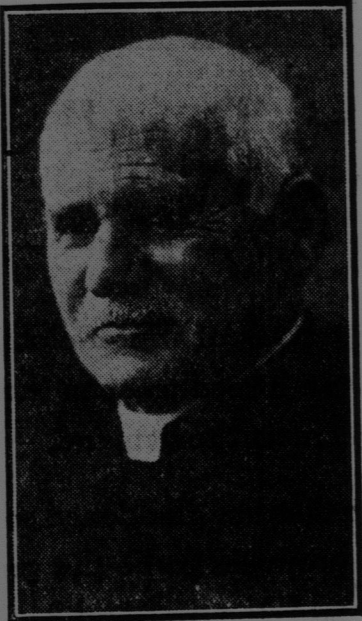

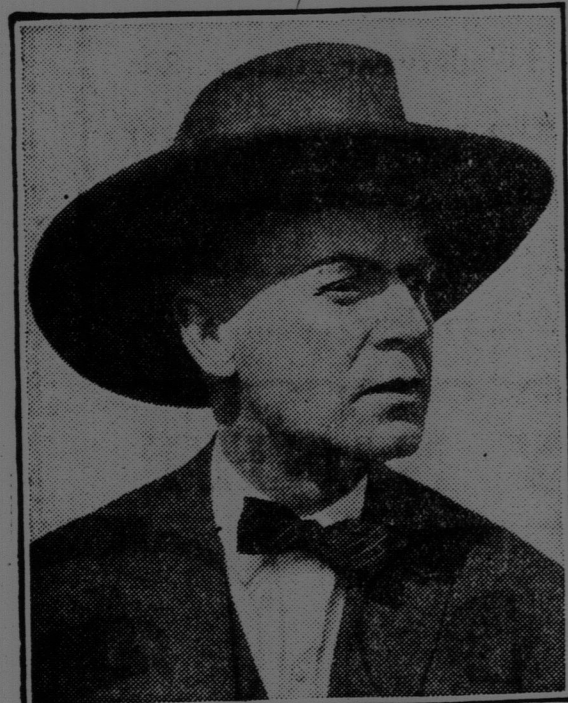

WESTFIELD DOES WELL. The result of the Red Cross drive for funds and membership in Westfield has been the raising of \$110 and the enrollment of 100 members.

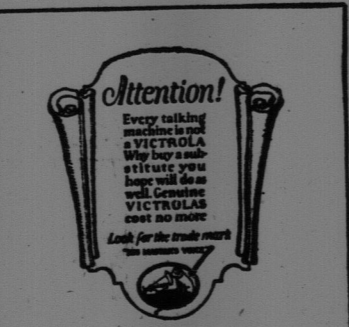

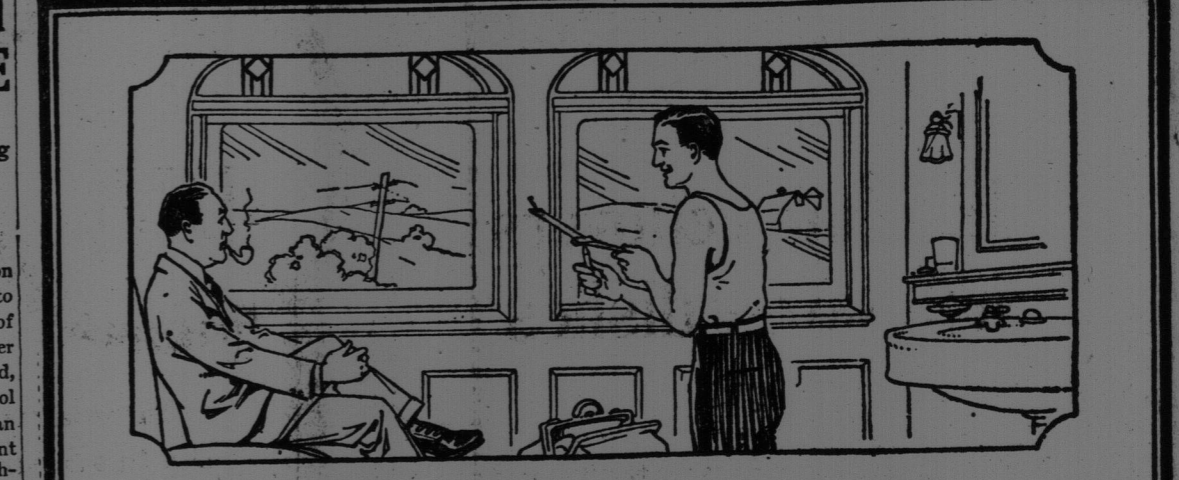

BY HEINZ COMPANY

PITTSBURGH, Penna., Nov. 12.—
After utilizing barges to float the
structure from Shappsburg to Pitts-
burgh, H. J. Heinz Company has
placed the modest dwelling where
the concern began business in 1859
in a court in the center of its big
group of office and factory buildings
in this city. On its trip, the building
traveled 3 1/2 miles by barge.

When the small building was placed
on its new foundations, the com-
pany's employees assembled to cheer
the sentiment which prompted Howard
Heintz, son of the founder, to give
the old structure its prominent
position.

When H. J. Heintz began business,
he leased a residence which he con-
verted into the first Heinz factory,
and three employees prepared the

garden. Today the company has
more than 10,000 people on its pay-
roll and approximately 150,000 are
engaged in growing crops for it,
while its factories and warehouses

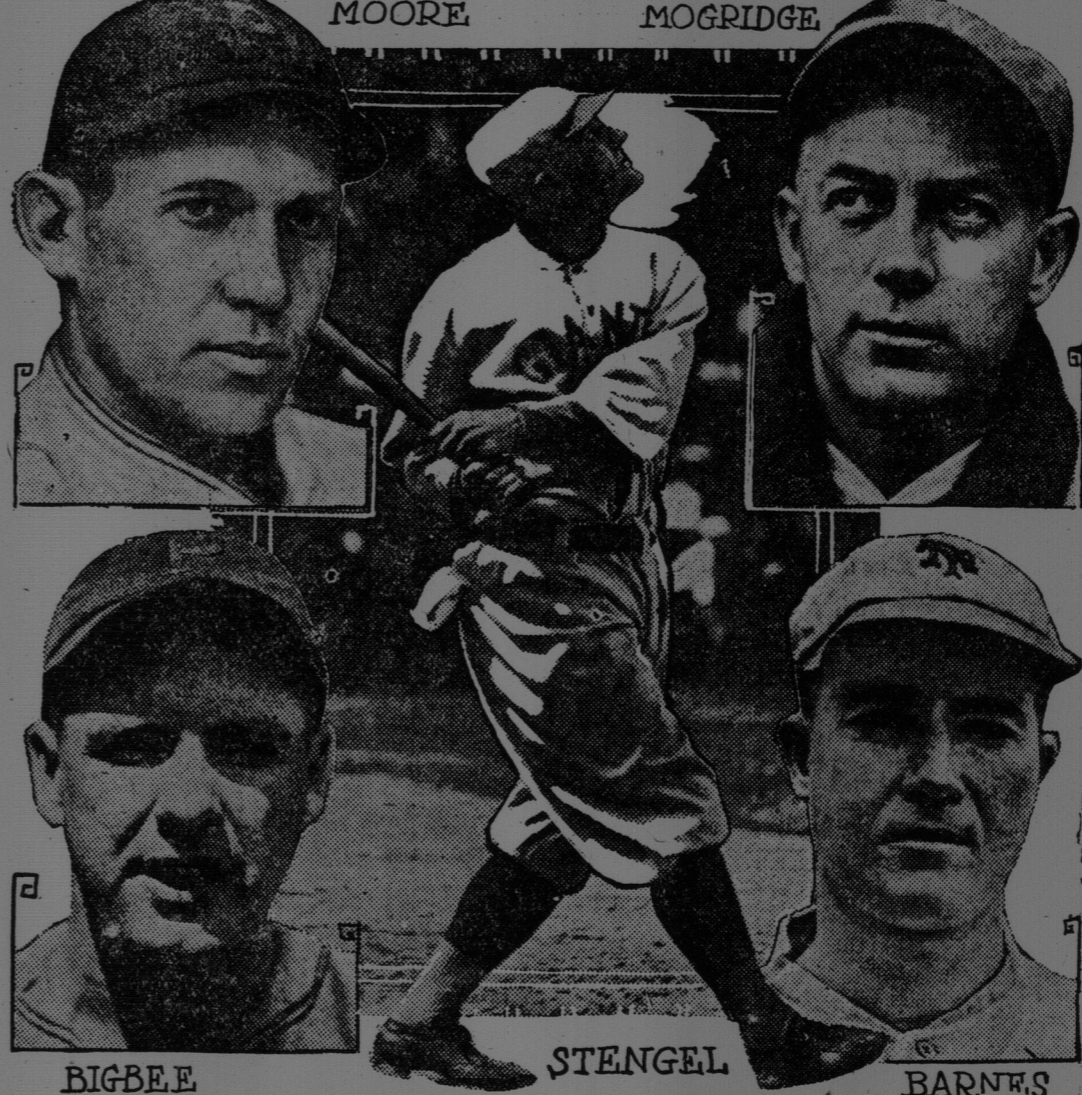

JAS. B. DUKE USED WITS TO GET SNUFF

Old Makers Thought They Sold Him Skimmed Milk, But He Showed Them

The best business story about James B. Duke is one I heard long ago from that veteran snuff manufacturer in Philadelphia, Henry D. Moore, of Haddonfield, N. J., says "Girard" in a recent issue of "The Philadelphia Inquirer."

Mr. Moore had made a snug fortune himself out of snuff, but Duke made a bigger one at the very time most of us imagined that snuff, like powdered hair and periwigs, was dead as bathing suit skirts for the beauties.

A considerable part of the \$40,000,000 which Duke gave to create a huge university in North Carolina came from what he called the "skimmed milk" gathered from Philadelphia snuff factories.

Duke a Trust Builder

In those halcyon trust-forming days about two decades ago, Duke was the leader in putting tobacco in a trust.

For a century or more Philadelphia had led the country in production of snuff. Such names as Levi Garrett, Henry D. Moore, Alexander Ralph, Sinton and others had for years stood first in that peculiar branch of the tobacco industry.

There were secrets in the compounding of snuff which were for generations handed down from father to son. I know of one case in Lancaster where such a secret was the most valuable asset in a considerable estate.

So it was natural that when James B. Duke was putting a collar and bridle on the tobacco business he should come to Philadelphia to harness our snuff factories.

He made an offer to buy them. The price was agreed upon, but when Duke suggested that the Philadelphia snuff men accept three-quarters of their pay in common stock of the new snuff trust they laughed.

Long haggling followed. Finally they


