

JUDGE PROTECTS WEALTHY CLIENTS

Decries Principle That Services to Wealthy Should Command High Pay.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Feb. 25—Declaring that "similar service has similar value for rich and poor alike," Judge Fuller of the common pleas court reduced an attorney's fee from the \$5,000 sought to \$1,000.

After making the observation regarding similar service, the court said that "while the poor may be charged less, the rich should not be charged more than the service is reasonably worth, for this would be unethical and unprofessional."

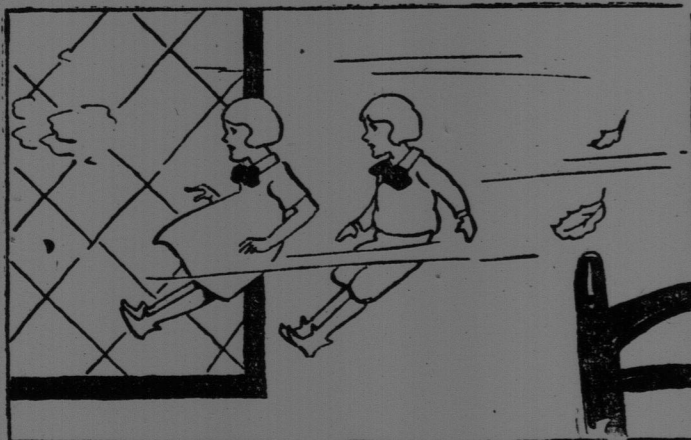

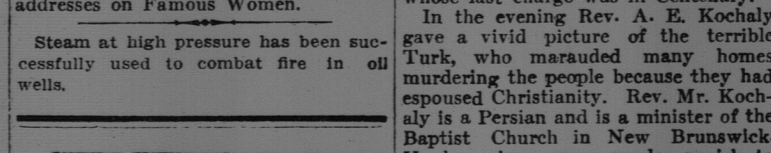

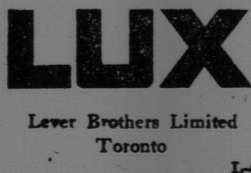

WOMEN DEANS TO HOLD CONVENTION

Representatives of Some 30 Universities and High Schools Will Give Addresses.

Chicago, Feb. 25.—Women in politics and ideals they should uphold, social standard and recreation for young people, and the promotion of closer relations between the high school, university and community, form the leading branches of study on the programme of the National Association of Deans of Women, to meet in convention here February 25-28. "Citizenship" is the subject of the

first general session to be held February 26, and the ideals women should uphold will be told by Helen Fraser, parliamentary candidate at the 1922 British election. Mrs. Frank M. Warren, regent of the University of Minnesota, will speak on women in politics.

A general meeting will be held with the National Parent-Teacher Association for the purpose of dealing with aspects of education for parenthood and the perfecting of means toward better relationship between the schools, the community and the parents. Women deans of more than 80 universities, colleges and high schools in the United States will make addresses.
