



Chairman Emerson Says City Would Have to Supplement Grant by Outlay For Plant and Running Expenses



FIGHT IS ON IN ENGLAND FOR LAND REFORM

Preliminaries For Big Battle Between the Government and Landed Interests-Huge Organization For Rural People.

(Montreal Witness Cable)

London, June 2—Sir John Simon, at Oxford on Saturday, speaking on behalf of the Liberal party, formally spunded the first clarion note in the battle of land reform, and today rural England is rejoicing at the uncompromising attitude which he announced for the government on this question.

This, as Sir John said, will be the first time in the history of England that any real attempt has been made to satisfy the aspirations of the land-hungry poor.

That the fight for land reform will not be an easy one is evident. The landed interests are already drawing up their army for the fray, but the Liberals will enter the contest full of certain faith in the rightcousness of their cause.

The organization of a great Trade Union for rural England decided upon a few days ago, is to day supported by the "Daily News" which says that without the power such an organization will be instrumental in glving, the rural laborer cannot hope to succeed.

Cobden and Bright, the great apostles of free trade, always had in view, it says, such a crusade as the present one or breaking down the arbitrary restrictions on the land.

HOUSELESS POOR French Philanthropist Suggests Wood-

(London Daily News)

M. Rene Berenger, a famous French
philanthropist and social reformer, has
been stirred to action by the campaign of M. Cochon, with whose methods the veteran statesman does not

thods the veteran statesman does not agree.

In an eloquent appeal to the public M. Berenger points out that something must be done for the houseless poor. The cheap model dwellings are all very well for those who can afford to pay for them, but the cheapest lodging for a family consisting of father, mother, and two or three children cannot be had for less than £10 to £12. "How is this rent to be paid by a family that cannot find money even to pay for a hovel in a slum? The distress of such people will even be increased in proportion as model dwellings invade the ground hitherto occupied by the slums."

M. Berenger proposes to build wooden huts to shelter the houseless poor. Most of the big cities would, he says, willingly lease the necessary space at a nominal rent. At the same time, he would open labor exchanges for the fathers, and creches, schools, workshops, and playgrounds for the children.

His scheme will have the support of the municipality of Paris and of philanthropic societies, night-refuges, etc. It is recognized that millions of francs will have to be subscribed by the public, but M. Berenger is certain that the money will be found. He promises that the first thirty subscribers of £800 each shall have their names given to as many shelters to be erected in various parts of the paris.






