YOUNG WOMEN'S LONELY TRIP TO THE FAR NORTH
 (North Sydney Herald)

Among the notable passengers on board the S.S. Stanley, which sailed yesterday evening for the Hudson Bay, is Miss Edith Griffin, of Winnipeg, who after several years' hard work among the foreign element of that city, is leaving for the far north to teach the Indian and Eskimo children for four years.

Miss Griffin is being sent by the Manitoba government to this outstanding post, where there will be no white women, except the factor's wife and maid, to impart to these children the knowledge that they stand so surely in need of, and which Miss Griffin is well able to extend to them.

With her Miss Griffin is taking countless numbers of books, medicine, toys, beads and clothing to these people, of whom the outside world knows almost nothing.

This is Miss Griffin's first trip to Cape Breton, and she cannot find words to express her pleasure in admiring the beautiful surroundings of North Sydney, and her wonder at so magnificent a harbor. Particularly striking is the wealth of flowers that every residence, however humble, seemed to have in abundance.

Miss Griffin's only means of coming from the outside world will be by dog trains from Winnipeg to York factory.

Those on board are G. M. Foster, M.P. of Ottawa; Mr. Brodeur, M.P., topographical surveyor from the Bureau of Mines, Toronto, and Mayor, Melton.

THEY MAY RETALIATE BY BOYCOTTING THE SAN FRANCISCO FAIR

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 9.—Angered by the action of the United States senate in discriminating in favor of American vessels in formulating rules for the conduct of the Panama canal, British Columbia will probably boycott the American fair exposition in San Francisco in 1915. A. B. Erskine, president of the Vancouver board of trade, in a statement at the weekly meeting of the board, said: "A special meeting of the board will be called to discuss whether the people of this city will participate in the fair with participation in the San Francisco fair. I see that the British government is considering a similar action, and I am convinced that this is the only dignified thing to do in view of the action of the United States senate in repudiating American treaty obligations. The exposition would mean much to us locally, but the issue at stake is too big for minor considerations to weigh heavily."

A SUGGESTION FOR PUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS IN CROWDED CITIES

"The time is not far off when providing for and regulating children's play will be regarded as one of the most important duties of the state. There is not only the natural right of the child to that kind of employment, which no community may rightly deny him, but the need of it, if the race is not to deteriorate physically and morally. Not only will supervised play-grounds need to be provided within reach of such children as can avail themselves of them, but in all places where poor children abound provision should be made that the only open-air exercise they get at their doors shall not be in front of street cars and automobiles. Where land is worth from four to forty dollars a square foot, provision should be made for regular play-grounds for casual outdoor sport offers an exceedingly difficult problem. It might be thought that where it is not that it imperatively must and therefore will be solved. A citizen who has been delighted at the sight of children enjoying a see-saw where some building operations furnished the wherewithal, asks why there should not be search made through the congested districts for sports where a see-saw or a swing could be installed without much apparatus supplied and supervised for a time. After some hours he would have the single apparatus moved on to where it would be a fresh attraction. Where play of any sort comes under the heading of things forbidden, children will not so much as learn to play in any well-ordered way, and will spend their time and thoughts on doing things by stealth, or equally bad, doing nothing. When play is provided for and becomes a habit, the policeman becomes the protector and not the hater of the small boy, there will be a wholesome moral atmosphere in our byways as well as a generation physically better developed."

OPPOSITION TO APPOINTMENT OF FATHER LeBLANC

At a largely attended meeting of the Irish Literary and Benevolent Society, held in their rooms last evening, the members after discussing the reported elevation of his lordship Bishop Casey to the Archbishopric of Vancouver, and the appointment of Rev. Father LeBlanc as his successor, passed the following resolution:

Whereas, the Irish Literary and Benevolent Society of St. John (N. B.), has learned with sorrow that our beloved bishop, the Rt. Rev. Timothy Casey, has been removed from this diocese; and

Whereas, it has been reported in the public press that his lordship is to be succeeded in this diocese by an Acadian bishop, and whilst we are not opposed to the appointment of an Acadian in any section of this province where the Acadians reside, we particularly desire to draw the attention of the constituted authorities of the Holy Church to the fact that the Catholic population of St. John and vicinity is almost exclusively of the Irish race; and

Whereas, since the formation of this diocese the Irish Catholics have without assistance from the Acadians not only provided magnificently for the bishop, but under the wise administration of their bishops erected many fine churches and charitable institutions; and

Whereas, the Irish Literary and Benevolent Society are firmly convinced that the best interests of the Catholics of St. John and our Catholic faith demand the appointment of a bishop who is of our nationality; therefore,

Resolved, that we respectfully request the Most Rev. Francis P. Sagan, Apostolic Delegate to Canada, and the Most Rev. Edward J. McCarthy, Archbishop of Halifax, to use their influence with our most Holy Father the Pope to appoint a bishop of Irish descent to the Episcopal See of St. John.

TAFT STANDS BY THE BIG TRUSTS; VETOES WOOL BILL

Washington, Aug. 9.—For the second time within a year President Taft today vetoed a bill to revise the wool tariff, Schedule K of the Payne-Aldrich law.

With a message of disapproval he returned to congress the bill evolved as a compromise between the house and senate holding that its low rates would bring disaster to home industries. He appealed to congress, however, not to adjourn until it had enacted a measure to "substantially reduce unnecessary existing duties" without destroying protection for the wool industry in the United States.

The president's disapproval of the wool bill is to be followed with similar vetoes of the steel bill and the cotton bill. The sugar bill is likely to be vetoed, as is the excise tax bill, the latter probably on the ground that the president believes it unconstitutional. "I shall stand by my pledges to maintain a degree of protection necessary to offset the differences in cost of production here and abroad and will heartily approve of any bill reducing to this level," wrote Mr. Taft.

"Most of the rates in the submitted bill," wrote the president, "are so low in themselves that if enacted into law, the inevitable result would be irreparable injury to the wool growing industry, the enforced idleness of much of our wool combing and spinning machinery and of thousands of looms and the consequent throwing out of employment thousands of workmen."

The bill sent to the White House imposed an ad valorem duty of 29 per cent on raw wool and on cloths of 39 per cent. Both rates Mr. Taft held insufficient to protect the wool grower and the manufacturer.

IRELAND'S WAR FOR ORGANIZED SOCIAL REFORM

Women Have Accomplished Much in Past Half Dozen Years

ROUGH ON COLLECTORS Campaign Against Immoral Literature—Bomb Outrage—Tragic Death of Four Children

(Times' Special Correspondence)
 Dublin, July 27.—This is an age of organized social reform, and there was never a time when women were doing more valuable work for the community. The women's National Health Association of Ireland may be described as a social welfare army with Her Excellency the Comptroller in command. Detachments are stationed all over the country. One hundred and fifty branches of battalions are engaged in attacking disease, poverty, misery, and dirt. Twenty thousand women are enrolled under the banner of health and hope, and it would be difficult to over-estimate the value to Ireland of these women's work.

Ireland, half a dozen years ago, was virgin soil in the sense that there was no definite philanthropic organization for tackling the problems of tuberculosis, infant mortality, and public health. Any remedies were merely palliative. Preventive work had not been started. The infant mortality and tuberculosis death rates were appalling.

So Lady Aberdeen started babies' clubs and a pasteurized milk depot for supplying pure milk in Dublin. In the poorest quarters of the city, places were rented by the association to be used as "clubs." Voluntary helpers and trained nurses were obtained, and the good offices of the doctors were enlisted. Thus the preventive work for infant mortality was organized on a professional basis. The association begins with the babies and the mothers, and the education of motherhood and the protection of infancy this problem can be solved.

Playgrounds Opened

But the energies are extended in all directions. Just lately the children's playground scheme has come into being. District spaces in the slummiest parts of the city are being transformed into garden playgrounds for the babies and the children with astounding success. St. Monica's Playground was opened a little while ago by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and the children of that neighborhood have come to regard Lady Aberdeen as a personal friend.

The next move is to be the formation of a Boys' Camp on the site of Ormond Market at present a scene of mouldering walls, falling masonry, crooked lamp-posts, huge heaps of stones, tin cans and refuse of all kinds. Lady Aberdeen has secured it at a nominal rent. It is to be entirely cleared and made into a camp, where destitute boys from crowded houses will live and sleep, going by day to their work or their schools and returning in the evening to a veritable Boy Scout's Paradise. The effect of a multiplication of such camps upon the questions of juvenile crime, hoodlums, and delinquency is surely self-evident!

A great deal has already been said and written about the tuberculosis campaign of Ireland. People are fairly familiar with the propaganda of the association. They are aware that sanatoria have been constructed, that travelling health caravans tour all over Ireland, teaching the laws of health and hygiene to the people. The association also provides nurses for the treatment of consumptive patients in their homes under a system of voluntary notification.

As a result of the work, the death-rate from tuberculosis is the lowest recorded since 1861, when the registration of deaths was introduced. Every day there are five or six fewer deaths from the dread disease than there were in 1907. That is, the association is saving 40 people per week in Ireland, and this does not give any idea of the saving in health to countless cases.

It is generally recognized that there are about seven or eight patients suffering from tuberculosis for each death. Thus the decreasing mortality shows that there are perhaps 14,000 fewer people suffering from tuberculosis in Ireland at this date than there were in 1907.

OIL LADEN STEAMER WRAPPED IN FLAMES ON BROAD PACIFIC

Only Heroic Efforts of Crew Saved Vessel From Destruction and Passengers From Death

Eureka, Cal., Aug. 10.—Aflame from her bed plate, her cabins dripping with oil and severed from the world by the failure of her wireless, the North Pacific steamer Kibara was saved from destruction last night by the heroic efforts of her crew.

Two girls narrowly escaped suffocation; an oiler fell and broke a leg; the chief engineer, E. G. Clough, and Sidney Astor, the steward, who rescued the girls, fell heavily on the oil-drenched decks and were badly bruised.

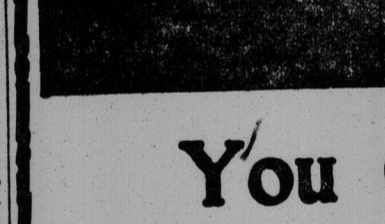

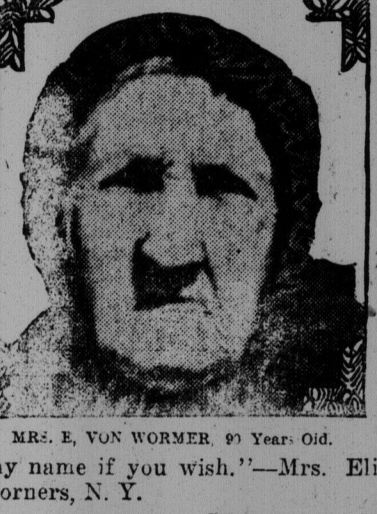

BLYS FAMOUS CHATEAU FOR ART MUSEUM

Life of Brilliant Young Naval Officer Ends in Tragedy

LETTER FROM PARIS

Postal Employees Insult Their Chief—A Novel Escape -- Protecting a \$1,200,000 Pastel -- When Thieves Fall Out.

(Times Special Correspondence.) Paris, Aug. 1.—The beautiful chateau of Malen-Laffite, which was once the property of Marshal Lannes, and where Louis XIV. was entertained, was purchased by the state some seven years ago for the purpose of turning it into a museum, which is now about to be opened to the public.

The chateau was built between 1612 and 1640 by M. de Malen, superintendent of the King's finances, and when it was finished the Marquis received the whole court, including the king and the queen.

The chateau passed out of the Longueil family and was purchased in 1818 by the Duke of Artois in 1777, who paid \$600,000 for it. During the Revolution it was confiscated and sold, and finally in 1818 it was purchased by Marshal Lannes, who had part of the estate along the river laid out to resemble the battlefield of Austerlitz.

On the 10th of August, 1898, the Duke of Artois, who was then a young man, was killed by a bullet fired from a rifle which he was carrying in the park that once formed part of the estate.

The victim was a young naval lieutenant on sick leave, who had returned that day from Paris. On hearing that his mistress had been summoned before the courts for keeping an opium den at Brest and Cherbourg, the officer, who had just returned from a campaign in the East, approached one of the magistrates and implored him to dismiss the case against his friend.

On being told that the law must take its course, the disappointed, weighing on a mind already weakened by a month's confinement, decided on a resolution against M. Chaumet, the postmaster-general, coughed in most insulting terms, and, in a fit of rage, he hurled a glass of wine at the magistrate.

Such an example shows to what a lamentable extent Socialism corrupts the untutored working classes, leading to a complete ignoring of all the principles of administrative hierarchy and discipline. There is always some danger of an act of clemency like the pardon of M. Heve being construed as a sign of weakness, but in the present instance there can scarcely be any risk of misconception, and M. Heve at liberty is probably looked upon by the government as less objectionable and less a subject of reproach to themselves or an object of admiration to his comrades than when a prisoner in the Conciergerie and a pretended martyr to his convictions.

A military prisoner at Grenoble has succeeded in making an extraordinary escape from the barracks jail. Soldiers in prison were allowed to cut wood, and bind it up in bundles for sale. A wagon was brought into the prison yard to carry away the wood. A heavy sack was loaded on the wagon, and a sergeant observed that the sack looked very bulky.

The prisoners were a mixture, one of them was missing. Messengers were sent in the night after the wagon to inspect the load, but nothing was found except an empty sack.

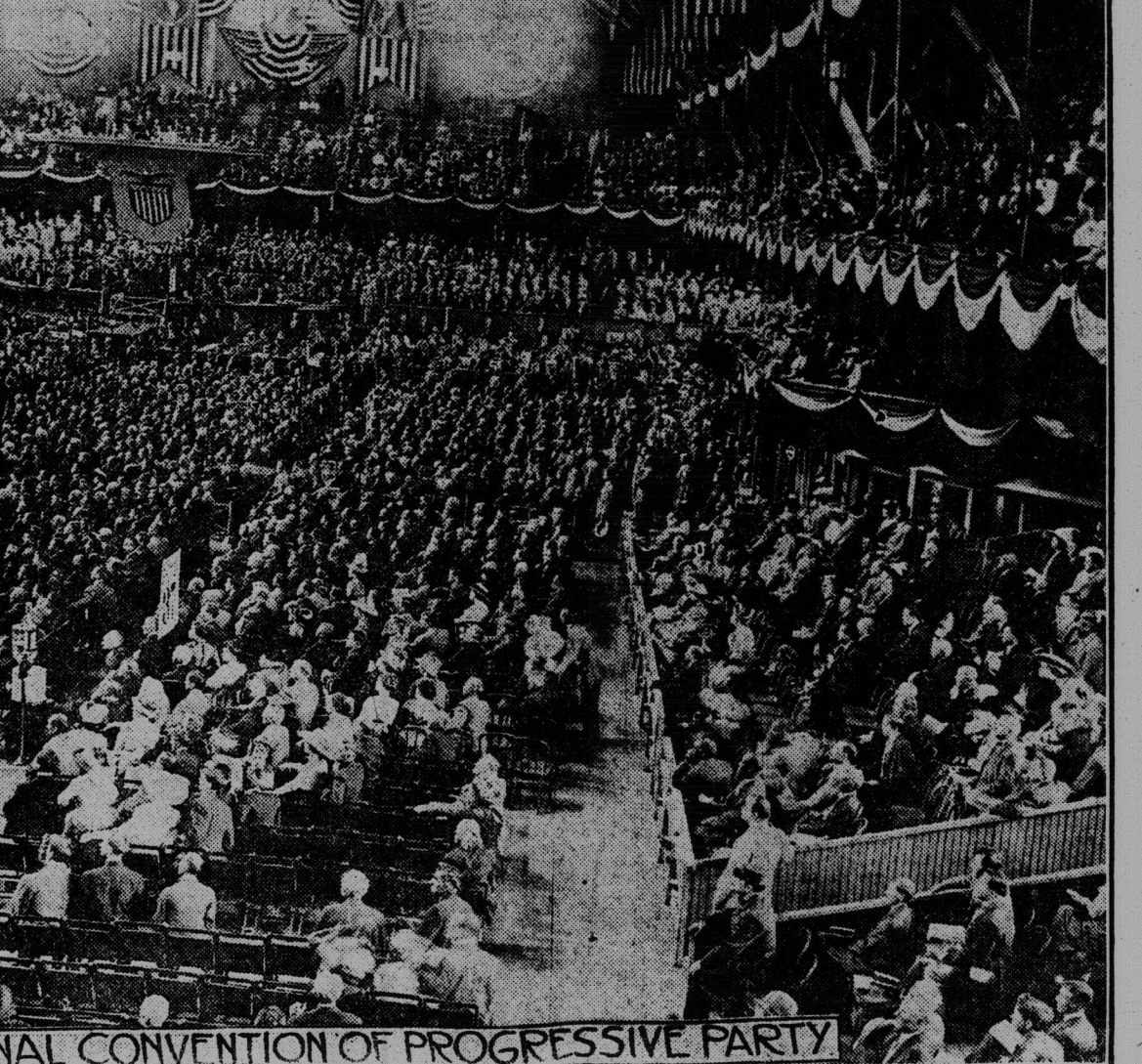

BELGIUM'S INJUSTICE IN THE CONGO

Leopold's Dead Hand Leaves Its Mark on Stricken Land

ALMOST IN SLAVERY

Tribal Rights in Land Ignored For Selfish Ends—Natives Kept in Servile Condition—A Short-sighted Policy

(Times Special Correspondence.) Brussels, Aug. 1.—Viewed from every standpoint—from that of the native or the merchant, from the past, present, or future—the cardinal injustice of the Leopoldian "regime" remains in practice unaffected by Belgian annexation. The greatest crime of the old Congo state, which looms as the supreme danger of the future, was the confiscation of native rights in land and upon that fundamental injustice was created the whole superstructure of the infancy of the past. It remains today as the foundation of a potential system of servitude, but one degree less oppressive than the old slavery of the Congo State. Leopold's cardinal injustice in Belgium appears as incapable as local officialdom of forming a generous conception of the indigenous possibilities of the Congo natives. It can comprehend the laborer, the serf, the domestic slave, but the free, independent, and successful colonial citizen is apparently beyond the mental horizon of those who control the destinies of the Congo.

While the native remains landless he can only occupy the position of serf; while ownership and colored labor is at present the motto of the Congo. In the years preceding the establishment of the Congo State, rights in land were clearly defined, the boundaries of fishing grounds, the limits of hunting areas, the territories within which periodic removals were permitted, were all delimited; the hill, the stream, the palm plantation, all played their part as nature's boundaries to the common lands and rivers of native tribes. Upon the chiefs of the Congo State, the duty of maintaining intact these tribal lands, and any encroachment by alien races was the immediate signal for an inter-tribal war.

Three Convulsive Movements. The early eighties witnessed in the Congo basin three convulsive movements—the entrance of the white man from the west, following on Stanley's journey across the continent; the entry of the Arabs from the north; and the Lokelo war towards the south. The latter movement was the most serious, for it threatened the equatorial regions south of the main Congo. The Lokelo, probably pressed by the Belgians, had advanced into the "low" with their southern neighbors, which ran right through the south, reaching the coast at the mouth of the Congo. They sought each other for the maintenance of their ancient boundaries until the whole of the Equatorial regions were in a state of anarchy. Even so, the whole situation claimed victims by the thousand.

It may be argued that, with twenty-five years of Congo government, the natives have forgotten their boundaries, and consequently they could not be definitely established today. Such an argument is evidence of a profound ignorance of the elements of native social life. The natives do not so readily forget what are to him his most sacred rights. The white man's pillars may decay, artificial boundaries may be removable as the hills and watercourses which constitute them, unaffected by the elements of time. Africa has lately seen such boundaries, scores of them, away north in the Bangalla, south in the Fouta and Senegal, and further south and west in the Kasai Valley. A circumstantial report has reached me that a punitive expedition has been sent against the Essanga tribe of the Maringa river. This trouble has arisen because the Essangas have crossed over into adjoining territory ever which the Bokeri tribe has possessed common rights since the Lokelo land war.

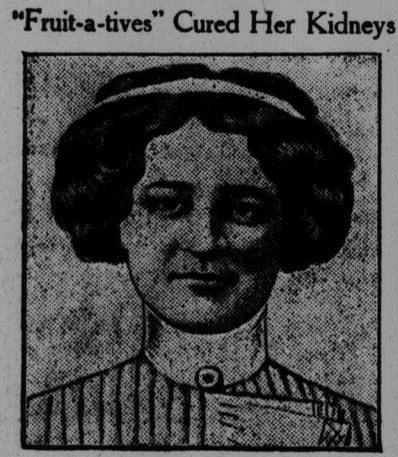
A Sisyphus Task. If the Belgian Government is desirous of doing justice in this matter, it will recognize communal tenure, and recall its agents from the Sijehpan class of planting miles of wooden posts around the villages, which serve only to supply the natives with ready-cut firewood or the white ants with a meal.

There is too much reason to fear that none of the foregoing superficial reasons are the real motive of Congo land legislation. The reason is more subtle and of a different order. Only upon existing principles can Belgium rest its claims. It files can Belgium rest its claims upon the practices of the past, but recently we have seen nearly two million acres of the poorest of Belgium lands apparently removed from native ownership. The precedent once established, it will be difficult to refuse others, when in turn, may be extended to guni copai, and even to certain well-known rubber areas.

Finally, there is the question of labor, the greatest need of the white administration and of European Governments generally. Belgium knows that she cannot labor from other colonies, her labor force must be obtained from internal sources, and any general agricultural development among the natives themselves would greatly restrict the flow of labor towards the white employer; hence, one of the chief reasons for refusing to recognize communal tenure in land. This attitude and policy arises from the colonial conception of the Belgian Administration, whose official lack experience, both in theory and practice, of colonial development. There would be more hope for the Congo if Belgium were willing to employ all the colonial brains and experience of other nations, but none are apparently desired, and all applications are made the applicant is reminded that "all responsible positions must be held by those of Belgian nationality." "A natural attitude." Yes! but in the circumstances, almost fatal to real progress.

NEW PACKAGES INNOVATION IN LOCAL MARKET

Half Pound Tins of Salmon Introduced - Provisions and Prices - Crop Reports and Predictions

The local provision market during the last few weeks has seen but little change in the listings of most articles, prices having remained practically at a standstill for some time although in most lines of commodities there has been a marked firmness and tendency to strength. The outstanding feature of the local grocery market at the present time is the slump in the price of tinned salmon which was reduced 25 cents this week as already referred to in the Times.

There is no change looked for at present in Manitoba patents but it is almost certain that by the time the spring crop is assured, there will be a lower price prevailing. Reports from the west are to the effect that the harvest this year with a continuance of fine weather, will be unprecedented, and that the crop will have the effect of causing a decline in present quotations, is expected.

While there has been no change of late in the quotations on sugar, the heavy demand owing to the preserving season, has created a stronger tendency as to price and for the past six weeks has had a steady effect on the market. Sugar has not declined in price since June 1, although there have been one or two fluctuations on the New York market both in raw and refined. Molasses which is generally in sympathy with sugar is much firmer. Much higher prices are looked for before the arrival of winter.

The expected change in regard to canned salmon, at last the half-pound tins have been placed upon the market. Some time ago it was predicted by a prominent local wholesaler that with the steady rise in the price of canned salmon packers would be forced to send in this territory the half-pound cans, which they had already placed on other markets. The pack this year has advanced the price and with the advance in price has come the arrival of the half-pound tins to the local market, and there is expected to be a crop demand for them.
