

# TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# Ladies' Protestant Home, of Quebec,

ESTABLISHED 1859.

Health, peace and general prosperity have prevailed in the Ladies' Protestant Home during the past year, and your Committee, with deep gratitude, acknowledge the protecting care of a Heavenly Father which has been new every morning and renewed every night.

During the year one who had long been an active member of the committee was removed by death. In her interest in the Institution Mrs. James Hossack took special interest in the spiritual welfare of each inmate, anxious that those who received here the shelter and care of a transient earthly home, might have a sure hope of that Eternal Home, to which, after a long and painful illness in the month of July, she, herself, passed.

Note is also made of the death of Miss Griffin which occurred in Ottawa, the 14th of March last.

Miss Griffin was first Secretary of this Institution; only those who were members of Committee at that time can correctly know the amount of work, and how efficiently, that was done by her. The drawing up of a constitution and the forming the rules which still guide in the management of the "Home" were her work. She retained the office of Secretary until the time of her leaving Quebec to reside in Ottawa.

Your Committee would pay a tribute to the memory of two other friends, Dr. Boswell and C. E. Levey, Esq., the former, Dr. Boswell, was for many years visiting physician and his kindness and care are well remembered.

All who may have seen or heard our Annual Report know how for many years past, the "Home" was so constantly, and substantially remembered by the late Charles E. Levey. Every Christmas brought a handsome gift to provide Xmas cheer for the inmates. Through his kindness the Conservatory at Cataraqui was for many winters opened to the public, and thereby a large sum of money realized, and as a permanent remembrance he has left to the Home a bequest of five hundred dollars.

In May last your committee most unexpectedly received the handsome Legacy of two thousand dollars left

by the late Miss Eliza Lane, of Montreal.

Miss Lane formerly lived in Quebec, but had removed to Montreal even before the Home was established, and we understand that her knowledge of the Institution and her confidence in it, as a charity worthy to be helped, was the result of her friendship with the late Mrs. William Newton, whose loss in our last report we had to deplore.

As remarked, by the Chairman of our Annual Meeting a year ago, "individuals die and their memory passes away, but corporations live on," and these remembrances of friends strengthen the sure hope that the usefulness of the Home as a peaceful and comfortable shelter for many aged and infirm will extend very far into the future.

Throughout the year the work of the Home has proceeded steadily, but the general routine of which life in an Institution is composed, furnishes but brief material for a report; we trust however there may be sufficient to encourage friends to continue their interest and aid.

The number of inmates during the year has been seventytwo; of these sixteen were new admissions, eleven were discharged, and three were taken away by death, leaving at the close of the year fifty-eight. Those who were removed by death were aged respectively 71, 82 and 90. They had all been some years in the Home, one having been received from the Military Asylum when that Institution was closed in the year 1872.

The training of the children has been receiving special thought and care. During the year the school has been re-

gularly maintained by the teacher, Miss Pierce, who is constant in the discharge of her duties. While the children are receiving a good common education, they are also taught to be useful in the ordinary work of a house—much of the work of the Institution being done by them.

Through the year one of the ladies of Committee has had a sewing class every Wednesday. This has been of the greatest benefit to the children. A few specimens of the work done are exposed for view.

The Infirmary Ward has constantly been filled, and even then it has been found quite impossible to accommodate in it all those who were ill and requiring attendance; not that any special sickness has prevailed, but the feebleness and ailments of age press heavily on many. Your Committee would repeat again this year their confidence in the Matron, Miss Bissett, both in the arrangements carried out by her for the comfort of the sick and in the general management of the various departments committed to her charge.

The Sunday School has been held regularly every week, and thanks are expressed to those ladies who continue to take charge of it.

Towards the close of the year the valuable addition of a Cabinet Organ was made to the furniture of the Home. It was through the efforts and kindness of Mrs. William Poston that this gift was received, and your Committee take this opportunity of repeating their thanks to those friends who, by their contributions, generously aided Mrs. Poston in the purchase of the instrument.

Thanks are also expressed to Mr. R. Morgan, for a large discount allowed, and also for the gift of a piano stool.

Reference is also made to the case for fancy work which has been kept supplied, almost wholly, by Mrs. Poston and Miss Hamel, and by sale of articles therein exposed, forty dollars have, during the year, been realized.

In reference to the building, your Committee are glad to report that, with the exception of repairs to the chimneys, not much further outlay has been necessary. The garden and field attached to the Home were very thoroughly worked last summer, and, as a result, there was a good supply

of vegetables.

One rule of the Institution, when first established, was, that the friends of those admitted should, when able, pay a small sum monthly to the Home. As will be seen by the Treasurer's statement, it is only for a very few that any payment is now received. Also, that the money realized by sale of work of inmates is but small. In reference to this item, it has to be remembered that many are too feeble either to sew or knit, and that much of the work done by the others is required in .the Home. Where all who are able endeavour to occupy their time in some useful manner, it hardly does to single out any special cases, but still a reference might be allowed to one woman, who, even with fingers bent with rheumatism, has made thirteen, and to another who, since she has been in the Home, has made one hundred and ninety patchwork quilts.

There was a fear that the Annual Collections would this year have been smaller than formerly, but the very generous subscription of two hundred dollars (\$200) from two gentlemen, of whose kindness the Home has already had many proofs, raised the amount above that received last year. Your committee desire to acknowledge their indebtedness to Mr. W. Clint and Mr. Walker who kindly did the work of collecting in the Lower Town.

The Annual Government Grant voted last summer was paid during the past month, and thanks are expressed to the Hon. the Provincial Legislature and also to the Hon. H. G. Joly for his kindness in having the petitions to Government presented.

Your committee gratefully acknowledge a collection from St. Matthew's Church of forty-eight dollars (\$48) and desire to thank the Rev. Chas. Hamilton, for bringing the claims of this charity before his congregation.

This was the only Church from which a collection was

received during the year.

Thanks are tendered to the visiting Physicians Doctors Sewell, Parke, Richardson and Montizambert, their care and medical oversight relieve the committee of much responsibility.

Your Committee are indebted, to the Clergymen of the various denominations of the City who from time to time visit the Home, to Mr. T. S. Cole and members of the Y. M. C. A. and other friends for services held on regularly appointed Sundays during each month, and to the Rev. C. W. Rawson for a service held in the Infirmary every week and for frequent visits to the sick.

A copy of the Morning Chronicle is left daily at the Home, and thanks are expressed to J. J. Foote, Esq., for this and other favours received.

Notices accorded by other City papers are also acknowledged.

In the month of July the children had a trip to the Island of Orleans, and Captain Pinhey, with his usual kindness, took them on his boat free of charge.

Many more tokens of the thoughtfulness and remembrance of friends have been received during the year.

From the members of St. George's Society a donation of fifty dollars (\$50); Thirty dollars from P. McEwan, Esq.; from Mr. R. Morgan, six framed texts and a large framed coloured lithograph.

A treat was provided for the inmates by Captain and Mrs. Jephson on the occasion of the Anniversary of their wedding day.

Twenty-three volumes for the Library from a friend, and twenty-seven from Miss Gilmour.

In addition, Christmas also brought its usual bountiful supply:—Vegetables from Mr. Waters, St. Foy Road; barrel of flour from Mr. Hetherington; large quantities of fresh and salt beef from Mr. Delaney and Mr. J. Smith; beef, poultry and apples from Mr. T. Andrews; poultry from Miss Joseph; Xmas Cards from Mr. R. Morgan; poultry from Mr. Swift; barrel of flour from Mr. Brodie; tinnet of butter from Mr. Gillespie; and many other donations of fruit, sweets, poultry, etc., all acknowledged at the time and thankfully received.

At all times visits to the Home by friends and subscribers are gladly welcomed.

During the past year Mr. and Mrs. Müller of Bristol, England, paid a visit to this Institution.

Mr. Müller is so well known in connection with Orphanage work in that City that his opinion is of much value. He approved of the various arrangements in the Home, and while he believed we had sufficient occupants in each Dormitory, did not find in any case too many.

Twice Dr Racey kindly admitted cases to the Jeffery Hale, in answer to the request of your Committee, though believing that both were incurable even by regular Hospital treatment.

While endeavoring wisely to use all the gifts bestowed, the hope is cherished that when necessary there will be the ability to enlarge the usefulness of the Home.

One object to be kept in view is further accommodation for cases such as two or three of which have already been admitted. Those, who besides the burden of poverty must also all through their lives bear the heavier burden of sickness and disease, and to whom greater attendance and accommodation than are at present available, would require to be given.

In conclusion, your Committee would again express their gratitude to the friends whose support has carried the work so prosperously through the year. Their thanks are but a small return for so much kindness, but these are the gifts which bring the double blessing,—to the giver, as to the receiver,—and which bear the commendation of Him who ever "had compassion on the multitude."

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# BY-LAWS.

# Section 1.—Constitution.

1st —The Society shall be called "The Ladies' Protestant Home, of Quebec," and its objects are to afford a temporary home to destitute and unprotected women, and female children of all Protestant denominations in the city and for, their spiritual welfare may also be promoted by moral influence and religious instruction. The Committee of Management shall also have a distional funds shall have been inadequate to meet all demands, but in all poor-fund shall be required, testifying to the amount already afforded by said

2nd.—The objects of the Society being more for industrial employment, than for reformatory efforts, all immoral characters, as well as intemperate persons of hopelessly confirmed habits, shall be deemed inadmissable.

3rd.—All persons, being Protestants, subscribing one dollar annually, shall be members of the Society, and shall be entitled to a vote at the annual meeting; provided always, that their subscription shall have been duly paid to the Treasurer at least one week before the said annual meeting.

4th,—The affairs of the Society shall be managed by a committee of ladies, consisting of a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and at least twenty-four other ladies, who shall be elected at the annual meeting.

5th.—The said committee shall have power to draw up rules for their own guidance, and to maintain the discipline of the Home, as well as to fill up shall be enacted in said rules which is inconsistant with these, the constitutional laws of the Society.

6th.—A Committee of nine Gentlemen, being members of the Association, shall be appointed every year at the annual meeting of the subscribers, whose duty shall be to take charge and care of the real estate of the Institution, to control the application and investment of moneys known as the Building Fund, and any increase thereunto made, and to advise with the of said committee, and all acts relative to real estate or Building Fund, or a quorum thereof, before they shall have force to effect. The said Committee, or tee shall act as Auditors of the accounts.

7th.—There shall be an annual meeting of the members of the Corporation in the month of February in each year, when the managing committee of ladies retiring shall present their report, embracing a retrospect of the transactions of the past year, a cash statement of the affairs of the Society to the that they may have to submit.

8th.—The assistance and co-operation of all clergymen is to be invited, to promote, by their pastoral visits, the religious instruction and spiritual welfare of the inmates of the Home.

9th.—As persons of all denominations are admissable to the Home, all services or proceedings of an exclusively sectarian character are discountenanced; it being provided, however, that every possible facility shall be afforded to any visiting Protestant clergyman to assemble those of the inmates who may be members of his Church.

10th.—That wards for both male and female patients shall be organized so soon as the funds of the Institution will permit.

11th.—None of these laws shall be altered or repealed, and no new law shall be added except at the annual meeting of the members of the Corporation, and not unless two-thirds of the members then present shall vote in favor of it.



#### Section 2.—Committee of Management.

1st.—The Committee of Management shall meet on the first Monday in each month for the transaction of business. Five shall form a quorum. At this meeting the ladies for duty for the month shall be appointed.

2nd.—The office-bearers of the Society, with the four visiting ladies, shall form an acting committee for the month, and shall meet every Monday for the transaction of ordinary business. Three shall form a quorum.

3rd.—Special meetings of the Committee of Management may be called by the President, at the request of not less than five members of the Committee. Special meetings of the acting Committee may be called by the President at her discretion.

4th.—The Vice-President, in absence of the President, shall act in her stead; in absence of both, the committee shall elect a President pro tempore.

5th.—The duty of the President shall be, to preside at all meetings, strictly to preserve order, to appoint committees, and to be arbitress in all debates.

6th —The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive all subscriptions and donations, and make all payments authorized by the Committee. She shall keep a list of the inmates of the Home who are entitled to relief from Church or other funds, and the amount of such relief. In the event of her absence from the meeting, it is expected that her book shall be sent for examination.

7th.—The duty of the Secretary shall be to take the minutes of each meeting, to keep a register of members' names, to notify special meetings, to answer all letters on the business of the Society, and to read the weekly reports. The duty of preparing the annual report shall also devolve on her. She shall also keep a register of all admissions to, and dismissals from the Home.



#### Section 3.-Order of Business.

1st.—The meeting shall open and close with prayer.

2nd.—After the meeting is called to order, no person to speak except on the subject under discussion.

3rd.—After the reports are read and the books examined, each lady in rotation to lay before the Committee any proposition she may have to make.

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4th.—Any member bringing forward application for admission, must make full enquiry into the case, with a view to discover the character and circumstances of the individual before affording them relief.

5th.—All orders for admission must be signed by the Secretary, except in irgent cases which have not been brought before the Committee.

6th-Vacancies for inmates cannot be preserved beyond a month after the order for admission has been granted.



# Section 4.—Rules for Ladies on Duty.

1st.—The four ladies appointed for duty for the month shall arrange amongst themselves the division of their duties.

2nd.—One or more shall visit the Home daily, examine the matron's books, note in their own book any event of importance, and take special care that order, cleanliness and industry exist in every department.

3rd.—They will examine all work done and received, and see that the same is entered by the Matron in the book kept for that purpose.

4th.—They will give out all supplies according to the ratio laid down; to obviate confusion, one lady of the four keeping the key of the pantry for a


5th.—In the last week of the month they will examine the inventory of the Home property, and note down any losses reported by the Matron.

6th.-No inmate to be discharged without a written order from one of the ladies on duty, with whom will also rest the power of admitting; though, except in extreme cases, it is not desirable to receive any one whose case has not been brought before the weekly board of management.

7th.—They will give permission to inmates to go out when necessary, limiting the hour of return to 4 P. M. in winter, and 9 P. M. in summer.

8th.—They will read the Scriptures to the inmates daily, and make arrangements each Saturday for the going to Church on the Sabbath.

9th.—All observations to be noted down for the information of the weekly board of management, in whose hands will rest the power of redressing complaints and altering existing arrangements.



# Section 5.—Duties of Matron.

1st.-The Matron will carry out all the rules of the establishment, and endeavor in every way to obey the orders of the ladies of the committee.

2nd.—She shall render a faithful account of all the stores and property placed in her charge, note down in her book all events of importance, all donations and visits, and keep in a separate book, an account of all work

3rd.—She will read prayers to the inmates each night and morning, and as far as possible, give them spiritual advice and instruction.

4th.—She will be personally responsible for the administering of all medicines ordered by the Physician, and for the carrying out of his orders concerning the sick. She will see that all meals are properly cooked and served, and promote in every way the health and comfort of the inmates.

5th.—At the end of each month, she will report to the ladies on duty any loss or breakage that may have occurred in the house property since the previous examination of the inventory.

6th.—She will not receive or discharge any inmates without a written order from one of the ladies on duty, or from the secretary.

7th.—She will examine the person and boxes of all the inmates on first entering, and on dismissal, and, when necessary, cause a thorough ablution.

8th.—Whenever an inmate has been absent, the Matron will be especially careful to see that she does not bring back with her any spirituous liquors.

9th .- She will read the rules to each inmate on their entering.

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#### Section 6.—Rules for Inmates.

1st,-Hours for rising five o'clock in summer, six in winter.

2nd.—Hours for morning prayers, eight o'clock in winter, seven o'clock in summer, breakfast immediately afterwards.

3rd.—Hour for dinner, twelve o'clock.

4th.-Hour for supper, six o'clock.

5th.-Hour for evening prayer, eight o'clock.

6th.—Hour for retiring to rest, nine o'clock. No light allowed after half-

7th.—A daily routine to be carried on with regard to the sweeping, dusting, scrubbing and making beds. Each room to be well aired every day.

8th.—All general work of the house, such as cooking, washing, bringing in wood, making fires, scrubbing, &c, to be done by such women as are appointed to the work by the ladies on duty.

9th.—The work of the establishment to be diligently carried on till supper time; after that, each woman may attend to the mending of her own clothes.

10th.—All visits to friends, and from them, to be asked permission for, from the ladies on duty. The bringing of spirituous liquors into the house, or the use of them at all, is strictly forbidden. Any trangression of such rule to render the offender liable to expulsion.

11th.—Drunkenness, dishonesty, open contempt of religion, or disobedience to the Matron and rules of the establishment, to render the offender liable to expulsion.

12th.—Each person on entering must signify to what Church they belong, and there they will be expected to attend on every Sunday.

13th.—No property admissable except wearing apparel, and in the event of the owner's death while in the Home, such apparel to become the property of the Institution. All money to be given in charge of the Matron.

14th.-All complaints are requested to be made to the ladies on duty.

The above rules to be read to each inmate on their entering the Home, and it is to be understood that they will obey them before they can be received.
